

Proposition three would be the construction of a modern gymnasium at the right of the new school building, and the issuance of \$140,000 in bonds to pay for it.

Included in proposition two is a provision to use \$25,000 for the renovating and improving of the existing gymnasium (in grade school building). It was explained that if proposition three passed (to build the new gymnasium) the \$25,000 for improvements will not be used and bonds in that amount will not be issued.

If proposition two is approved the present elementary school building would be converted into a vocational building and house the vocational agriculture department which is at present located in the barracks building just north of the high school. The site might probably be used for

The complex plan was first explained Tuesday night by Supt. Charles A. Johnson and later by Joe W. Smith with the First In-

It was explained that incentive aid money, which would pay off proposition two without any increase in taxes, can not be used for repair and maintenance.

It was further explained that if voters approve the three propositions (including the gymnasium) the tax increase would be less than 9c or 6%. It was also explained that the bond issue would absorb the (combined) indebtedness of the Flomot and Roaring Springs districts, about \$17,000.

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


