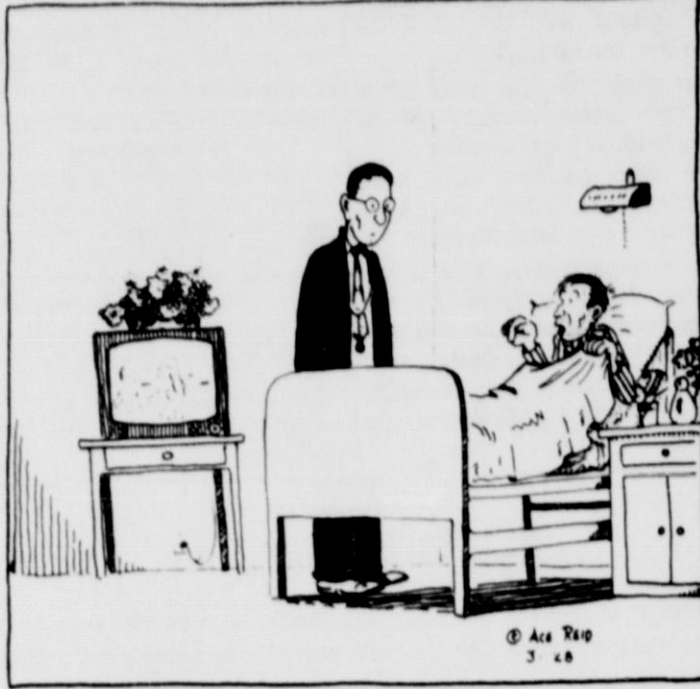

**SWCD District To be Divided**

The Upper Pease SWCD will be taken to the drawing board for a major overhaul within the next few days, according to W. D. Lipscomb, local director. The District, organized in 1945 to assist landowners in both Motley and Cottle Counties is being split at the county line into two districts, according to Lipscomb.

Motley County will maintain the Upper Pease SWCD name and Cottle County will be renamed Cottle County SWCD. The division will allow more local emphasis on Motley County needs and organization, according to Lipscomb.

Harvey Davis of the State SWCD Board in Temple will hold local hearings in both counties to determine any objection to the division. Following the hearings, elections will be held in the newly created subdivisions to elect three new directors to supplement Billie Slover and Lipscomb, current directors.
