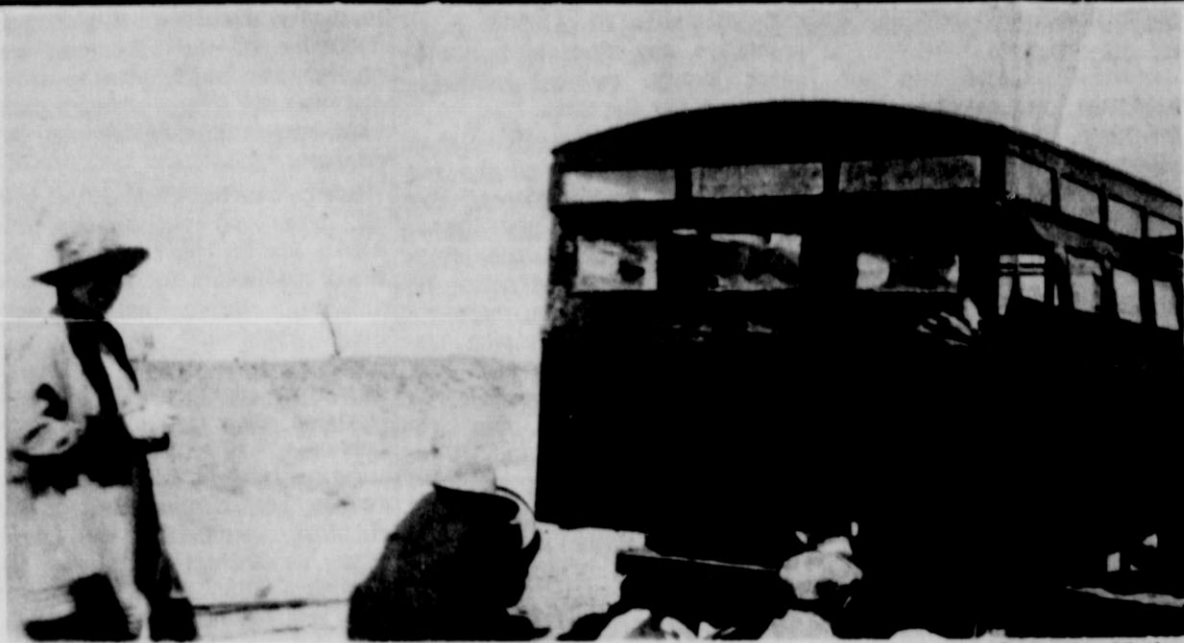

A release received from the office of Secretary of State Bob Bullock is as follows: "There has been some confusion relating to registration deadlines under the new registration system imposed by S.B. 51. As our former directives have pointed out, registration never closes.

"It will not cease on January 31, as it has in past years. Those persons who have registered by that time will appear on the initial list of registered voters.

The moisture content was .02 inch according to County Agent Bill Palmeyer, who records the weather in Matador. He said the total January moisture was .11-inch and about normal.

Bright sunshine Tuesday quickly dissipated the snow. A new cold front hit this area early Wednesday and sent the mercury tumbling to about 20 degrees.

Forecasters said snow is possible before the storm passes.

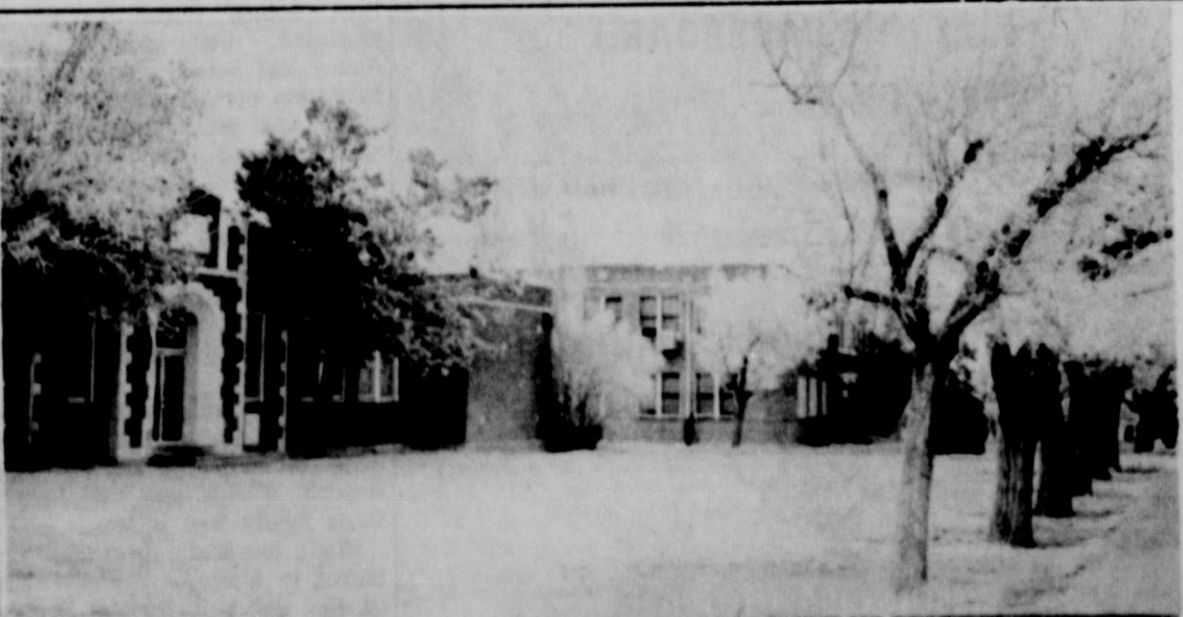

PALLMEYER SAYS:

Several important dates are approaching for farmers and ranchers who are on a calendar tax year. These dates are listed as reminders:

Jan. 31: Farmers and ranchers must file Form 943 showing the social security taxes on wages paid to hired labor during 1971. A payment of any tax due must be made at this time. If timely deposits of social security tax were made during the year, then you have until Feb. 10 to file Form 943. Copies B and C of Form W-2 should be given to each employee listed on form 943. Copy A is to be sent with Form 943 to the Internal Revenue Office.

Feb. 10: Employers who made timely deposits of social security taxes on wages paid to hired labor must file Form 943 and pay remaining social security tax due.

Mar. 1: If a declaration of estimated tax was not filed by Jan. 17, the 1971 income tax is due. All farm businesses must report payments of rents and interest amounting to \$600 or more to any one taxpayer other than a corporation. This is to be reported on Form 1096 and Form 1099, which are information returns.

Shortly, the Bureau of the Census will be mailing out "type of farm" survey report forms to a selected group of farmers.

There will be nine different survey forms used. One each for cash grain, tobacco, cotton, potatoes, sugar and other specialized field crops, vegetables, fruit, livestock, dairy and poultry.

Each form is designated to collect information pertinent to that particular type of farm enterprise. Each form is designed by selections so that if the answer to the lead question is "no" the farmer may skip to the next section.

The trends shown in the 1969 Census of Agriculture indicate that there is an increasing degree of specialization. The completion of the "type of farm" survey report forms will help obtain a truer and more complete picture of this specialization and may set the pattern for future censuses of agriculture.

Cash income to farmers and ranchers in Motley County should be more than \$7,049,200 by the end of 1976.

This will be an increase of more than \$1,761,700 from 1968-69, with feed grains contributing a large part of the gain. The projections are based on studies of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are part of the "3.76 in '76" program, a state wide project to increase Texas agricultural cash receipts by more than \$1 billion.

Total cash receipts from all agricultural enterprises in Motley County are about \$6,626,650. The most important ones are beef cattle, cotton and peanuts. They are expected to account for about 77% of the projected 1976 totals.

The county will be aided in its production efforts by the Rolling Plains Economic Program, with programs scheduled from time to time to assist local producers in solving their problems.

Producers will also have access to production information and techniques that will assist them increase their income which is a vital cog in reaching the Texas goal of \$3.76 billion in 1976.
