Tunnell Resigns School Position

Superintendent Ends 17 Years of Service In City

When classes are dismissed at the end of the 1946 term here next week, Superintendent B. F. Tunnell will relinquish his position of outstanding leadership of the Matador Independent school system for the past 17 years. "Generally known" facts concerning the resignation were not released for publication until last week, although Mr. Tunnell filed the following letter with the school board on November 7, 1945:

"Gentlemen: In order that you may have ample time for the selection of a superintendent for your schools, I wish to advise you that it is my plan to leave the position at the end of my present school year, June 30. In taking this step at this early date, I feel that the future interest of the schools will be best served, in that it will give you an opportunity for considering the qualifications of a greater number of prospects for the position.

"I wish to assure you that my reasons for leaving the position are purely personal and in no way due to any conditions under which I have worked, or any lack of cooperation from the board, students or parents. These war years have made the duties of the position so strenuous that I feel it best for me personally to relinquish the position at the close of this (school) year.

"Hence, at any time you care to do so, please feel free to take whatever steps you care to take.

THREE INJURED IN CAR CRASH

Three residents of Matador were injured late Tuesday when two automobiles collided near the P. B. Barton home in the north section of the city. Mrs. J. E. Russell, Mrs. Julia Cornett and Mrs. W. W. Bain were conveyed to the Traweck hospital after an automobile driven by J. E. Russell collided with an automobile driven by Bill Dirickson, belonging to his mother, Mrs. W. R. Dirickson. The three ladies were with Mr. Russell, returning from the Russell farm north of town. Mr. Dirickson was driving east from his mother's home. The three women were thrown from the Russell car when the right door swung open from the impact after being struck near the hinge.

Mrs. Bain did not recover consciousness until about one o'clock Wednesday morning. Examination disclosed her to be bruised and cut about the left eye and ear and on the head, also suffering undetermined internal injuries. Mrs. Russell sustained two broken ribs and chest injuries. Mrs. Cornett received severe arm and shoulder bruises and shock.

Neither Mr. Russell nor Mr. Dirickson were injured.

W. A. JOHNSON IS RECENT VISITOR

William A. Johnson, S. S. M. (L) 3-c has reported back to Seattle, Washington, following a recent leave which he spent here visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Johnson.

Johnson has seen action in the Pacific area on the U. S. S. Bon Homme Richard, having reported aboard that carrier on March 31, 1945. From June through August of 1945, he participated in carrier air strikes and operations on Kyushu, in support of Okinawa operations, on Okinawa, on airfields and industrial installations in the Tokyo area, and in Northern Honshu; bombardment of Muroran and Kamaishi; on airfields and shipping in Kobe, Osaka area; and off Hamamatsu, Southern Honshu, Shimizu, Northern and Central Honshu.

Until his discharge, which he expects to receive about June 15, his address will be William A. Johnson, S. S. M. (L) 3-c, U. S. S. Bon Homme Richard CV-31, S-2 Division, U. S. Naval Station, Seattle 99, Washington.

Mr. Ezzell's qualifications for the responsibility have been proved by his work here. He is well-known and well-liked by faculty, board, students and parents.

Vance Gilbreath, former resident and well-known here, has been elected to fill the principal vacancy in either the Matador high school or grade school, it was disclosed yesterday.

Mr. Gilbreath has been teaching for the past 12 years and prior to his entry in the armed forces, was principal of the Ralls Junior high school for four or five years.

MORE SHOWERS FALL IN AREA

Most of Motley county and West Texas continued to wait for the rainfall which may relieve the critical drought situation in time for planting. A rainstorm from the northwest late Tuesday was reported to have brought rain to some of Floyd county and some of the northern section of Motley county.

Unconfirmed reports late yesterday said that "a water-spout" struck part of the Northfield community and left between two and three inches of rain, with a good rainfall over much of that area. Only a sprinkle, accompanied by stiff winds, was received here.

Pipkin Appointed To Safety Group

An honorary directorship in the Texas Safety Council this week was awarded Justice of the Peace Henry Pipkin, a long-time member of the organization.

In the letter announcing the appointment, Pipkin was praised for his cooperation and loyalty in working with the council during the war. M. E. Gregory, secretary of the organization, wrote the letter advising Pipkin of the appointment.

Pipkin was also informed that the safety council is laying plans to combat a predicted rise in automobile fatalities. An estimation of 60,000 automobile fatalities annually was predicted.

Lions To Be Hosts

Each Lions Club member will play host to a farmer or rancher at the club's luncheon noon Tuesday at Methodist Church where Charlie Fisher of Spur Experiment Station will discuss mesquite eradication.

Fisher, an outstanding authority on mesquite eradication, will describe the latest methods of elimination of the shrub. His talk will be on research of the experiment station, particularly the mechanical and chemical phases.

Ranchers and farmers of the area have been discussing the mesquite problem recently in view of its increasing spread in the vicinity.

Boss Lion J. R. Emmons will be in charge of the meeting.

County Trapper Sets New Record In Coyote Catch

Records are made to be broken. Last year H. W. Fite (former Motley County trapper) set a record in Childress county of 500 coyotes.

Lewis McDonough, Motley county trapper, has to his credit a total of 523 coyotes between January 18 (when he was employed) and May 1. He took 41 pairs of wolf ears during the first 18 days of January, which would have placed him in the lead for the entire district, had he been employed at the beginning of the year. He is now rated for third place as a federal trapper in the district.

He is now engaged in digging out dens of coyote pups. Tuesday he located a den less than a mile south of the Matador city limits and killed two month-old pups. Farmers and ranchers who know of coyote dens, are requested to notify Mr. McDonough or County Agent J. R. Emmons.

With more than 660 farmers and ranchers in the county it will take much time to cover the entire area but reported instances of damage from wolves will receive attention as rapidly as possible.

Clinic Installs Air Conditioning

Installation of Matador's only mechanical refrigeration air conditioning unit was completed this week in the Stanley Clinic. Mechanism similar to that of the electric ice box is used, and ducts can change 5,000 cubic feet of air per minute in the 1,600 square foot building. The temperature of the structure can be lowered as much as 60 degrees.

Two thermostatic controls, one controlling the west side of the building and the other the east side, serve to create temperatures which will counter the path of the sun. The system begins automatically when the temperature reaches the mark indicated by the thermostat.

Dr. J. S. Stanley said that the usual climate would be kept at 75 degrees.

The clinic was completed in January, 1945. Ducts for an air conditioning system were provided for in the original plans.

The Dickens County Singing Convention will meet May 19, at the Midway Baptist Church at Elton, it was announced this week by B. D. Clifton, president of the organization.

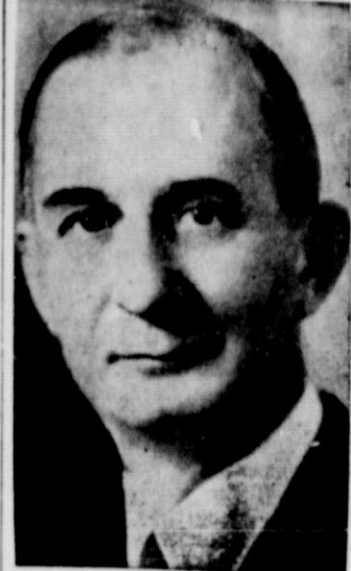
The singing will start about 6 o'clock in the afternoon, and several out-of-town singers and quartets are expected who will supply special numbers, Mr. Clifton said.

Clay and Gravel To Be Moved From School Campus

From twelve to fifteen cubic yards of pure clay and a similar amount of sand and gravel are offered free to anyone who will haul it from the Matador high School campus immediately, according to an announcement made this week by Superintendent B. F. Tunnell.

This material remained from the job of concreting the tennis courts on the campus, Mr. Tunnell said. The pure clay was bought several years ago near Roaring Springs and hauled here to surface the courts, and is being replaced on two of the four courts now with concrete.

Carload Of Cork In Locker Plant

A full car of pressed cork blocks was used in the construction of Spot Cash Locker System which opens Saturday. The large blocks of tropical tree bark which have unusual insulation properties, are very light in weight considering their size. They are used as a lining in all freezing and refrigeration rooms in the plant. After being secured to the walls with asphalt, attaining the appearance of large stone blocks, the cork walls were covered with plaster and painted.

Refrigeration experts declare that if the freezing equipment

failed to operate for several days, temperature of the rooms would drop but a few degrees, tion rooms are insulated, her-provided the doors remained closed. All doors to refrigera-tion roms are insulated and her-matically sealed with rubber flanges as the doors on a refrig-erator.

AAA FARM NEWS

BY MARVIN ALLEN
 Motley County ACA

Last week this column answered the question as to why public assistance is offered for carrying out conservation practices. Motley County farmers are offered assistance under the 1946 Agricultural Conservation Program for carrying out conservation practices which meet approved specifications between January 1 and December 31, 1946. We shall explain in this column from week to week specifications of AAA practices approved for this county. Hold on to that "Million-Dollar Rain"

That welcome rain that brings new life to your land, crops and livestock is the traditional "million-dollar rain" known to every farmer and rancher. There is an old saying, "You can't do much about the weather." But you can do a great deal about what the weather does to your land. Rain can bring relief after drought and is worth that million dollars—or it can be a savage enemy that "dashes off with grit in its teeth and tears down our soil like a billion furious buzzsaws."

Water that "walks downhill" is your ally in increasing the

production of your land. And one secret of handling rainfall properly is "farming on the level"—by strip cropping, contour farming, terracing. Cover crops, grassed waterways, dams and farm ponds also help control the destructive power of rain. Then you hold the rain where it falls. Surface run-off is slowed down to the point where it doesn't erode your topsoil away. And as your water "walks downhill", it soaks into the soil, makes plant food nutrients available to the roots of crops and, penetrating further, fills up nature's great underground reservoirs.

Water thus stored in the subsoil is source of the wells and springs which supply homes and farms and ranches. For several years this "water table" has been dropping very seriously in this section. But where soil conservation has been practiced over large areas, the lowering of the "water table" has been a less serious problem. Soil and water can never be divorced in any good land management program. These two great reasons are wedded for all time, and from this union comes the wealth of America's Agriculture and the prosperity of the Nation. The practices mentioned above are approved AAA Conservation Practices.

Specifications AAA Practices:

Contour Farming Row Crops

Your 1946 Texas Handbook gives the specifications of this practice as follows: This practice consists of planting and cultivating row crops following the contour as determined by a level or following terraces. If the land is not terraced, the rows must follow guide lines not to exceed twice the terrace interval. For payment rate see your handbook, page 9.

Strip Cropping on the Contour
 On land subject to wind erosion, the contour strips must consist of sorghums, millet, or summer legumes (except all peanuts), in rows or solid-seeded, or other solid-seeded crops alternating with strips of other row crops or fallow. Each strip must be at least 10 feet wide, but not more than 200 feet wide. The strips of sorghums, millet,

Trucks Pay Heavy Tax To County

Texas motor transportation industry last year contributed heavily toward the education of Motley County school children and in the construction and maintenance of the county's highway system, it has been revealed in an analysis of the industry's special tax payments released by Lynn B. Shaw, General Manager of the Texas Motor Transportation Association.

The 1,103 scholastics in Motley county benefited to the extent of \$3,970. \$3.60 for the education of every school child in the county, or in excess of 13 per cent of the total education

bill. Trucks and buses paid \$12,800 in special taxes that went toward construction and maintenance of highways in Motley county.

The industry contributed a total of \$39,000,000 in special taxes, a ten million dollar increase over the preceding year, and this figure represents only proceeds from gasoline and license fees taxes paid by more than 280,000 motor trucks and buses, both commercial and private, in Texas. It does not include federal or regular state taxes, such as ad valorem, which are paid by all industries.

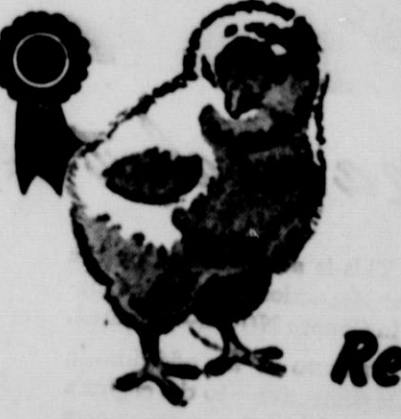
