DPS Says Drive Defensively For Thanksgiving Traveling

Thanksgiving is the most heavily travelled holiday of all. This has law enforcement officials pondering what can be done to raise traffic safety awareness during this critical driving period.

Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety stated, "We know that the potential for injury and loss of life is greater during holiday periods, especially a high-volume holiday like Thanksgiving. We are asking motorists to drive defensively."

Many motorists have heard the term "defensive driving"; however, it seems few know what it involves. "Much of the art of defensive driving comes from common sense and your own instinct. Training and knowledge of the proper procedure make these senses more effective," Snider explained.

Defensive driving can and should become a way of life for all drivers regardless of age or experience. Don't as-

sume the other driver will make the right decision. Be prepared for anything. Defensive drivers are in tune with their minds and bodies, as well as the road. They're ready for any situation the road might hand them.

But some drivers are out of tune. They give in to distractions, daydreams, fatigue, anger, stress, frustration or perhaps alcohol. They are not prepared to react when a dangerous situation arises.

Defensive drivers also make fewer mistakes. Drivers on the average make one error for every two miles they travel. While not every mistake leads to an accident, about 85% of all collisions are the result of driver error. "The most common mistake is probably speeding. Most people don't match an appropriate speed with driving conditions," Snider added.

Once again, State Troopers will be highly visible during the Thanksgiving holiday trying to make the roads as safe as possible. Let's all do our part to make this a safe and happy holiday.

Cooking Corner Tips To Help You

Old-Fashioned Memories From The Pantry
Gather Your Cranberries While You May



A well-bred harvest or holiday meal may well include this moist and marvelous cranberry pumpkin bread.

(NAPS)—From before the first frost right up through the holiday season, few things can warm up a heart and a home like the sight, smell and flavor of fresh baked bread. Among the most popular are special breads baked with the spicy touch of pumpkins and cranberries. By stocking up now, during the fall harvest, you can have all the fruit you need, all year long.

Here are a few hints to help you make the most of the fresh cranberries now at local stores:

- Although they are sometimes available as late as Christmas, this year's fresh cranberries endured weather conditions that may mean they'll be all gone by Thanksgiving.
- Fresh cranberries will keep in the refrigerator for up to two weeks.
- Just before using, sort and rinse fresh cranberries in cold water.
- You can freeze cranberries, without pre-rinsing, in a plastic bag for up to a year.
- If you're cooking with frozen cranberries, don't thaw them first. Just rinse them and use as directed for fresh cranberries.
- Chop cranberries by hand or process three cups (12 oz.) at a time.
- Use them in this smart but simple recipe:

CRANBERRY PUMPKIN BREAD

| 1 3/4 cups flour | 1 cup pumpkin |
| 1 cup sugar | 1/2 cup oil |
| 2 teaspoons baking powder | 2 eggs |
| 1/2 teaspoon baking soda | 1 1/2 cups OCEAN SPRAY® |
| 1 teaspoon cinnamon | Fresh or Frozen |
| 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg | Cranberries, |
| 1/2 teaspoon allspice | coarsely chopped |

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease and flour an 8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2-inch loaf pan.

Combine dry ingredients in a medium mixing bowl. Combine remaining ingredients, except cranberries, in a separate mixing bowl. Add to dry ingredients, stirring just until dry ingredients are moist. Stir in cranberries.

Spread evenly in loaf pan. Bake 1 1/2 hours or until a toothpick inserted into the center of the bread comes out clean. Remove from pan. Cool completely on a wire rack. Makes 1 loaf.

Social Security Tips

WORKERS' COMPENSATION BENEFITS MAY AFFECT YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

A young man who's getting both workers' compensation and Social Security disability benefits called our office to ask why his Social Security benefits are being reduced. We told him that ordinary disability payments from other sources don't affect Social Security disability benefits but that there are exceptions.

Social Security disability benefits are not affected by disability payments from a private source. Examples of such payments are private pensions or private insurance benefits, Department of Veterans affairs benefits, and supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments. In some cases, a disability payment from a Federal, State, or local government won't affect your Social Security benefits - only if the payment is from an agency where you worked and at least 85 percent of the work has during a period when the agency was paying Social Security taxes. (Many government agencies do not pay into Social Security.)

Examples of public disability payments that may affect your Social Security disability benefit are federal civil service disability benefits, military disability benefits, and State or local government retirement benefits that are based on disability. These benefits may cause the worker's Social Security family benefits to be reduced.

We told the caller that his Social Security benefits were reduced so the combined amount of the benefit he and his family receive, plus his workers' compensation payment and any other public disability payment, won't exceed 80 percent of his average current earnings. If this sum exceeds 80 percent of

those earnings, the excess amount is deducted from his Social Security benefit. The combined benefits will never be less than the amount of his and his family's total Social Security benefits before they were reduced.

Before determining the deduction, we first calculated his "average current earnings" - the highest of the following amounts:

— The average monthly earnings used to figure your Social Security disability benefit.

— Average monthly earnings from any work he did (including self-employment) that was covered by Social Security during your five consecutive years of highest earnings after 1950.

— Average monthly earnings from work or a business during the year he became disabled or his year of highest earnings during the 5-year period just before he became disabled.

All earnings covered by Social Security, including amounts above the maximum taxable by Social Security, may be used when figuring average current earnings.

The benefit reduction will last until the month he reaches age 65 or the month his workers' compensation or other public disability payment stops, whichever comes first. That's why it's important for him to let us know if his workers' compensation or public disability payment stops.

For more information on how workers' compensation and other disability payments may affect Social Security benefits, call or visit your local Social Security office or call our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. The lines are busiest early in the week and early in the month, so if your business can wait, it's best to call at other times.

STUDY LOOKS AT ENERGY AND CLOTHING CARE

The American Fiber Manufacturers Association released a study conducted by Franklin Associates relating to energy use, environmental emissions, and solid waste with the production, consumer use, and disposal of a woman's blouse made of 100 percent knitted filament polyester.

Key findings were:

— 80 percent of life cycle energy requirements are attributable to consumer use.

— 60 percent of laundering energy is used to heat the water; drying consumes 31 percent.

— Cold wash with line drying reduces laundering energy by more than 90 percent.

— Life cycle air emissions and solid waste generation parallel energy consumption.

— Consumer use of air emissions account for more than 88 percent of total life cycle atmospheric emissions.

— Consumer laundering accounts for 68 percent cycle solid waste.

— The longer the useful wearlife of a garment, the less the environmental importance of its source, and the larger the significance of consumer behavior.

NEW PRODUCTS

Some new products for future use have been introduced by different manufacturers:

— **Daisy Kingdom** has introduced a Battery-Powered Sewing Machine for aspiring sewers. It sews a chain stitch and uses a foot pedal or hand crank.

— **Tacony Corporation** has introduced **Pattern-Life™**, a 188 inch wide opaque white paper with a coating on one side and 1 inch grid lines on the other. The coated side is used to bond the paper to pattern tissue, making it more durable; the gridded side can be used to enlarge patterns.

— **Stretch & Sew Fabrics** has introduced a two-position Iron Rest from Polder. The iron rest clamps securely to the end of your ironing board and can be rotated to accommodate right or left handed people.

— **Acme United Corporation** has introduced **CraftKids**, a scissor with blades that cut wavy and crazy shapes - wavy, zig-zagged, or toothy.

— **Sullivans USA Inc.** has introduced **METAFIL** by Lasmertz of Germany sewing machine needles that is designed with a specialized eye and scarf that virtually eliminates stripping and splitting of metallic and other embroidery threads.
