NINE IN UNIFORM GET BALLOTS FOR COMING PRIMARY

First time in history of this nation, men in uniform are allowed to participate in elections. County and District clerk R. A. Seay mailed nine ballots Saturday to men in uniform of our fighting forces. Several of the ballots were sent to men overseas. Mr. Seay said he had applications for eleven ballots by men in uniform whose poll taxes had not been paid and under the existing law, are not eligible to vote in state primaries but will vote in the November general election.

Mr. Seay mailed 29 ballots in all Saturday, with 20 going to qualified civilian voters who had made application to vote absentee. He said that he expected a considerable additional number before July 19 (three days before election) when absentee voting will cease.

Servicemen ballots were sent by air mail to APO numbers and fleet addresses.

Expanded Program For Canyon Museum Outlined Monday

Two Motley county directors of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society, C. D. Bird and Douglas Meador, attended a called meeting at Canyon Monday afternoon, at which an expanded program for the now famous Canyon museum was outlined. An executive committee of five was selected from the more than 50 directors present from the Panhandle and North Plains. They were John L. McCarty, Floyd Studer and H. C. Pipkin of Amarillo, J. Evetts Haley of Canyon and John O. Colquitt of Dalhart.

The committee was empowered to carry out the wishes of the directors looking toward completion of the museum, a broad publicity campaign, a finance campaign and toward the general broadening of the society's interest and membership.

In the absence of President J. H. Hamlin, Dr. J. A. Hill presided. He reviewed briefly the history of the organization and pointed to its possibilities. He said the museum built by the society was the mother of many college museums in Texas and different from any other museum in the fact it was organized by cowmen and residents of a region for the preservation of their relics, records and artifacts while they were still living. He said also that the museum had been able to get the interest and be representative of the region.

"Time Becomes Visible"
Floyd V. Studer reviewed the collection in archaeology and paleontology declaring that "time becomes visible in the museum at Canyon." He urged cooperation of the board in getting the museum named a national monument in order to create greater tourist interest in the future.

Dr. L. F. Sheffy, secretary of the society, declared that approximately half a million people had already visited the museum.

Ralph Stapleton was also elected as a director of this county but was unable to attend the meeting Monday afternoon.

PROCEDURE IS OUTLINED FOR USED CAR SALE

Newly established ceiling prices for used passenger cars and certificates of transfer required on all completed sales may be obtained from local War Price and Rationing Boards or car dealers, the Office of Price Administration announced. Prices vary by three geographical zones.

After July 10 any seller and the buyer of a used car must jointly fill out a transfer certificate giving the applicable maximum price, the actual selling price and other details of the sale. The purchaser then files the completed certificate with his local War Price and Rationing Board.

Last Tribute Paid Dr. George Truett

Members of all denominations paid their last tribute to an internationally beloved Baptist as funeral services were held Monday, July 10 in Dallas for Dr. Geo. W. Truett, 77, pastor for almost 47 years of Dallas' First Baptist church. Dr. Truett died Friday night, July 7. He had been ill since July, 1943.

Under a broiling July sun, thousands streamed into the church as lines formed before noon for the funeral which was held at 4 p. m. Long before Rev. Louis D. Newton, Atlanta, Ga., pastor began his funeral oration, the auditorium, with a seating capacity of 3,000, was filled to overflowing.

At the front of the church was the flower-banked casket of the great preacher, and for hours continuous lines moved slowly past it. In all parts of Dallas and at the hall of state, flags were at half mast. Dallas county employees were released from work to attend the services.

At Baylor Hospital, a Baptist institution, contributions were being received for a memorial tower for the Baptist leader.

Dr. Truett has been declared by religious leaders many of other denominations, throughout the country as "an outstanding religious leader, not only of Texas and the nation, but of the whole world."

He is survived by his wife, three daughters, seven grandchildren and a brother.

APPORTIONMENT FOR 1944-45 SET AT 29 DOLLARS

AUSTIN, July 3—The State Board of Education today fixed the per capita apportionment for the 1944-45 school year at \$29.54 in excess of the Legislature's authorization, subject to approval of the attorney general.

Board Chairman Royall R. Watkins, Dallas, said members believed the increase could be paid out of about a \$6,428,000 surplus which the available school fund expected to have on Aug. 31, 1944.

While the board cannot demand that the increase be used for a certain purpose, it will recommend that it be used to raise teachers' salaries, Watkins said.

REVIVAL TO OPEN JULY 19

Annual revival meeting of the Matador Methodist church will begin Wednesday evening, July 19th, according to announcement made yesterday by Rev. G. E. Turrentine, local pastor. Services will be conducted twice daily, at 10 o'clock in the morning and 8:30 evenings. It is assumed the customary policy of local business firms to close one hour (10 to 11 o'clock) during week days will be observed to allow employees and employers to attend services. The meeting will continue through Sunday, July 30th.

An outstanding evangelist, Dr. Frank L. Turner of Ft. Worth, will conduct the meeting and direct personal evangelism work. Rev. Turrentine will conduct a personal workers' campaign on Tuesday, July 18.

Rev. R. Eugene Britain, assistant pastor of Wesley church, Dallas, will conduct the revival musical program. Rev. Britain is now conducting a revival in Union City, Tenn. Recently he assisted with music in a series of meetings held by "Gypsy" Smith Jr. and has been associated with Rev. Bert Culpepper.

Former McMurry President
President of McMurry college for four years, Dr. Turner resigned his position in 1942 to enter the field of evangelism. He was immediately appointed general evangelist and since that time he has held 35 meetings in two states, which have resulted in more than 500 conversions and additions to the church.

During the time he was president of McMurry college, Dr. Turner brought the institution out of debt, added more than \$50,000 in new improvements to the plant, including a \$12,000 home for the president, and placed the college on a sound financial basis before his resignation. Previous to his appointment to McMurry, Dr. Turner had been a pastor in the Central Texas conference for 15 years. He will come here from Meridian where he is now conducting a revival.

Scattered Showers Fall Over County

Scattered showers fell over Motley county late Tuesday and early yesterday morning. Heaviest precipitation was reported in a certain area in the neighborhood of Whiteflat, an estimated one inch.

George Springer declared his rain gauge registered 27 inch here in Matador, but the immediate surrounding territory received no rain. Reports from Turkey declared heavy rain-fall, in the neighborhood of two inches, was received during the night.

Food For Patients Grown By Hospital

Officers and enlisted men of a new General Hospital in England are working together on their own three-acre victory garden to provide fresh vegetables for their patients, and included on the roster of officers, nurses and enlisted personnel is Pvt. Harold F. Marler of Flomot, according to a special release to the Tribune from Headquarters, European Theatre of Operations.

Although the hospital is an army installation, there are Navy and Merchant Marines occupying beds in some of the wards, the release stated. One section of the hospital is devoted to the rehabilitation of seriously wounded soldiers and is employing the latest developments of the Army Medical Department to fit them for useful military or civilian employment.

DALLAS—The armed forces induction station at Lubbock will be closed July 31, 8th Service Command headquarters said last week and inductees from Lubbock and nearby communities will be processed at Fort Bliss, Fort Sam Houston, Dallas and Oklahoma City.

The headquarters previously had announced closing of induction stations in Tyler, Texas; Lafayette La.; Tulsa, Okla., and Little Rock, Ark., July 1, and the station at Shreveport, La., July 31.

The West Texas recruiting district, with offices in Lubbock, will remain in operation.

"I can't tell you much about our mission over Berlin," he wrote his wife, the former Miss Marjorie Moore of Matador, "but I will say I would certainly have hated to have been in Berlin that day. It looked like a total wreck."

Harper was promoted to first Lieutenant June 1 and is now flying strategic support of the Normandy invasion.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Harper of Gatesville and worked in Fort Worth for the Western Electric Corporation in 1941-42.

Pantex Exhibition Truck To Be Here

Tentative arrangements were completed yesterday for the appearance here of the Amarillo Pantex Ordnance Plant's large exhibition truck on the evening of (election day) July 22. The exhibition will be sponsored by the Matador Lions Club.

Pantex is being pressed by orders from the Army for more ammunition to be used on our wide battle fronts, but the plant is faced with a serious labor shortage. The truck is being used to better familiarize residents of the Panhandle with activities of the plant, to create interest and attract employees for the vital work in progress 24 hours daily.

Beginning rate of pay is 75¢ per hour. No experience is necessary and the minimum age is 18. Good physical condition is required. Places are open to both men and women.

Relative to the appearance of the truck in Matador, the Tribune received a recent letter from C. B. Payne, director of personnel, containing the following excerpt: "We have a large truck equipped with bomb and shell exhibition which may prove interesting and enlightening to the citizens of Motley county. We can send this truck to Matador on July 22 or any other date you may suggest. It is equipped with excellent public address system by which we can play popular transcriptions. We can also show very interesting battle movies, either indoors or outdoors free to the public."

Present plans are to erect a screen on the court house lawn and show the battle pictures and the plant exhibition to the large crowd usually attracted to Matador to receive election returns. More detailed arrangement of the program will appear in July 20 issue of the Tribune.

County Is Leader In "E" Bonds

In reaching its \$175,000 5th War Loan Quota last week, Motley county achieved the distinction of being the first county in the Amarillo district to reach its quota of type "E" bonds.

C. M. Smith, regional chairman of sales in the Amarillo district, advised Elmer Stearns, county sales chairman, Tuesday that complete tabulations revealed Motley county had exceeded \$90,000 worth of "E" bonds, which represented the "E" bond goal.

Sale of "E" bonds has been stressed by the Treasury Department as giving individuals of the nation a more direct part in the war effort, rather than the other types of bonds which usually represent large investors and corporations. Many areas in reaching their bond quotas, have been credited with bond sales other than "E" bonds. War financing is believed to be on a more substantial basis when a greater majority of the people in the smaller income brackets hold the "E" type of bonds.

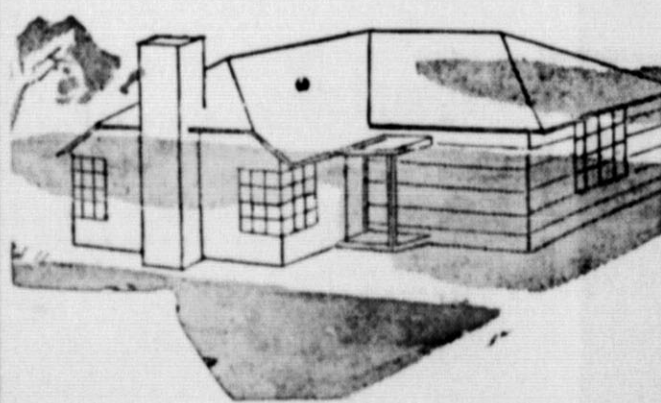

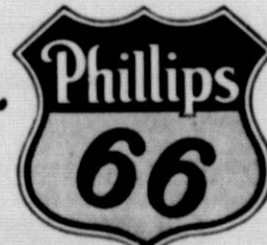
