Berlin and heard around the world via radio. Newspapers said 300,000 Germans attended the Berlin ceremony and that many wept.

War was in progress in two or more places on the globe during the United Nations programs but the symbol of the UN flag brought a new hope to the world that the brotherhood of free nations will eventually stamp out the greatest crime in the history of civilization—armed conflict between nations.

Original plans here called for a new flag pole on the courthouse lawn but an acute local cement shortage made it impossible to get the new pole erected in time for the important ceremony.
