TRAIL DUST

Man is a potter whose hands have shaped the hills and plains into beautiful and grotesque designs, leaving frequently cataclysmal testimony of greed and barbarous violence. Nature, the patient Mother, will restore all the hills and vales and heal the scars when the noisy, noisy world has clamored through a few centuries to oblivion.

On the road to Antigua from Guatemala City we stopped beside the ruins of a crumbling village clinging to a steep mesa in the wilderness of blue mountains. Children arrived out of the grey walls, the foliage and dusty streets; silent, bewildered children with soft eyes that spoke of pain and fear. One little girl who wore her ragged dress the daughter of a queen, advanced a little closer than the others. Her fingers touched the patch on my wrist. Like a hammer afraid of awakening the turned and walked away. Her thick dust puffing up between her toes.

Most of the pioneer cowboys have written their little chapters in the cattle country's early history, blotted the words with scarred and calloused hands and moved on into the shadows. The freighters, chuck-waggon men and homesteaders that were in the cast of empire-builders have resigned their roles. All of the essential property has been removed from the stage and its proper lost when progress shifted the scenes. A few remember the range wagon that was home to the cowboy even when the big herds were shipped north to Montana and Wyoming. Riders would dismantle the wagon, hoist the box to the top of the wagon and place the wheels inside. When the destination was reached, the wagon would be reversed from its lofty perch, reassembled and quickly placed to service. Its only monument of deep veneration in the hearts of men who followed the smoke of camp fires most of their lives.

The papers say a small grey-haired man sat in a New York theatre and remained serious while the crowd about him rolled in laughter at the revival of a silent motion picture made a quarter of a century ago. The man was Charlie Chaplin and the picture was "City Lights."

About the same number of years ago I worked two days for the "Great Circus." He was star, director and producer of the play. He never smiled during the two days I was at his studio although his every action would provoke laughter. He provided lunch for every member of the lot from an exclusive Hollywood catering establishment and walked about the studio with a sandwich in his hand, lost in thought. He sat on a pile of lumber beside me and finished his sandwich and I noticed the grey streaks in his black hair and the lonely look in his eyes. He was so very small and little stooped, as if some of the weight of the world might be on his shoulders; as if he might be carrying the burdens of others while they laughed.

A green twig is swayed in the direction of every breeze but the straight, firm tree is steadfast in the soil where its roots are fastened.

Clean-Up Is Planned For Next Week

A city-wide war on weeds and trash is scheduled to start here at seven a. m. Tuesday morning (August 8th). The drive is being sponsored by the Matador Lions and a committee has been named after the drive is completed.

Every individual is asked to cooperate and each place of business is asked to provide one or more workers on the drive to cut weeds during the three-hour campaign.

City of Matador has contracted for the use of a tractor-mower to cut weeds in alleys and streets. Use of the equipment may be had for cleaning vacant lots and private property at \$2 per hour. Residents wanting use of the mower may call Mrs. Gertrude Bloodworth at the city hall.

At present the city clean-up truck is hauling from three to five truck-loads of trash and rubbish to the dump grounds daily. Cost of this service is paid by water-users who pay 75¢ monthly (more for places of business). Trash and rubbish is collected from alleys daily in the business section and about twice-monthly in the residential area, but must be in boxes, barrels, sacks or other containers.

West Texas C of C Officials Here

Top Civic Leaders Are Guests Of Lions Club

Two high-ranking West Texas civic leaders, Jim Willson, President and Raymond Lee Johns, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, were guests Tuesday at the regular meeting of the Matador Lions. Mr. Johns made the principal address.

"Matador has a chamber of commerce," Mr. Johns declared, "because this Lions club is interested in the development and progress of the community and West Texas. Every businessman should be a member of a chamber of commerce because it is to his interest. At present we have about 6,000 members in 140 towns located within 113 West Texas counties. We need more."

He cited some of the benefits of the WCTCC including a reduction in cotton freight rates from West Texas to Houston of \$1.50 per bale as a direct saving to farmers of the Panhandle region. Mr. Johns also named the water conservation program, including the Canadian River dam project. "We help create opportunity," he declared, "and without opportunity there is no security."

Mrs. Clark will be opposed in the August 26 run-off primary by Walter Rogers of Pampa and White is opposed by present Agriculture Commissioner J. E. McDonald.

The convention accused McDonald of "consistently bolting the national Democratic ticket."

Both Mrs. Clark and White were furnished copies of the resolutions endorsing them.

Continued Rains Harass Farmers

Heavy Infestation Of Leaf Worms Is Due This Season

County Agent J. Rufus Emmons is looking for lots of leaf worms this season. He bases his expectations on a theory explained recently at Turkey by the state entomologist.

The leaf worm moth hatches in Old Mexico and flies north during the summer. Some have been found as far north as the Canadian border.

Rio Grande Valley cotton farmers poison for leaf worms in May when the moths are starting to migrate northward. A strip of approximately 200 to 400 miles is poisoned which kills the majority of the moths that would migrate to this area.

Due to weather conditions in the Valley this season that control program was not carried out effectively and therefore we can expect heavy infestation of leaf worms.

Farmers who have been able to get into the fields attest to the presence of leaf worms.

Weeds Choke Crops In Marshy Fields; Worms Showing Up

MOST UNUSUAL mid-summer in the history of West Texas is causing grave concern to thousands of farmers who wanted rain but not so much that they could not get into their fields.

Never before in the history of this country has so much rain fallen in the month of July. August started off here with 1.10 inches Tuesday morning, while many sections of the county received extra heavy precipitation.

County Agent J. Rufus Emmons said reports from the Bird ranch area indicated extremely heavy rain which extended through the Darden Canyon area. Rain south of town on the Charlie Keith farm was reported at two inches.

Flomot community which has been "washed away" several times since the rainy spell began, received another heavy rain Tuesday morning, extending north and east of the farm-to-market highway.

Agent Emmons said last night that he had received two reports of boll worms in fields far too wet to enter with tractors. He said farmers were planning to poison with airplane application.

Many fields in the county are being lost to the weeds which have continued to grow rapidly during the hot, rainy weather. In some parts of the county farmers have employed crews to pull up large weeds which could not be cut with hoes.

Water Superintendent Herman Stanfield said last night that the total rainfall registered in Matador for the month of July was 6.77 inches.

Baby Show Scheduled

Cash prizes are going to be awarded three classes in a baby show scheduled here for Saturday, September 2nd. The show is being conducted for Motley County 4-H Club girls to pay for a trip to the Dallas state fair this fall. Approximately 30 girls in the county are members of the 4-H Club.

Prize money will be paid by the Matador Lions Club. Sponsorship is by the Motley County Home Demonstration Club. Motley county has seven clubs and the Motley County Home Demonstration council. The council is composed of the chairman and a delegate from each club. Mrs. Fred G. Simpson is president of the council. Mrs. B. A. Tanner of the Flomot club is sponsor of the 4-H Club girls activities.

Out-of-town judges will decide the baby show winners. Three divisions are scheduled, starting with 6-month-olds to 18 month-olds as the first division. The second division starts with 18-month-olds to three years. The third division starts with three years through five-years. Two prizes will be given in each division. Also prizes will be given in boy and girl division, making a total of 12 prizes.

Every business firm in the county is welcome to enter a baby in any of the three divisions (boy or girl) or any individual may enter a baby in the show. Entrance fee is \$5. Admission to the show here will be without charge.

The Home Demonstration club council will make one entry in the baby show, it was announced yesterday.

"JACK POT" ADDED TO ROARING SPRINGS ROPING CONTEST

An added feature to last week's announcement of the roping contest to be held in the Roaring Springs Pioneer park lighted arena Saturday night, will be a "jack pot" roping to be held at the conclusion of the feature contest.

L. Anderson, Whitaker and...
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Farmers Must Cut Costs To Meet Poor Yields, Low Yields

COLLEGE STATION, July 20.—A mid-summer farm report says A&M college predicts farmers will have to tighten belts to meet this year's production conditions.

With production costs, the report said, along with reduced yields, poor yields and lower prices mean that "farmers must expend more money to produce the same amount of product as last year's production."

Gives Reasons

H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A&M, explained that poor crop yields and reduced acreage accounted for the decrease in production. He said that dry weather in the early spring handicapped

farming operations, and through late April, May and early June heavy rains slowed plantings in many sections.

Bates also pointed out the reduced acreage allotments, which affect chiefly wheat, rice, peanuts and cotton. He said that in 1949, 7,093,000 acres of wheat were harvested, while the allotment for this year is 6,096,000 acres with only 2,743,000 acres expected to be harvested in 1950.

Others Also Decreased

He cited similar decreases in other crops. The rice allotment is 54,000 acres less this year, peanuts 72,000 less, and cotton 2,229,000 less. And of the cotton allotment of 8,057,000 acres, only 7,200,000 are now planted.

"The reduced acreages," Bates said, "coupled with poor yield prospects at this time and with the prices of most crops somewhat lower than a year ago, indicate that Texas farmers can hardly expect the returns they enjoyed in 1949."

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He added a bright note, however, in reporting that pastures and supplementary grazing crops in general look very promising. Larger acreages of grain sorghum and corn have been planted, he said, and this extra grain and forage might be used for feeding out more livestock.

He advised that when possible farmers should market their grain and feed crops through livestock because the price outlook for livestock and livestock products is relatively favorable.

"Good planning and close figuring," Bates said, "may keep Texas farmers on the black side of the ledger this year, but the need for sound farming and business-like management is increasing by the hour."

He warned that now is the time when farmers study their business and work out definite plans for increasing income and reducing production costs in the overall operations of the farm.


