Memorial Address Is Made by Pioneer

A PIONEER himself, Rev. Con Davis of Lubbock, who pastors a church at Whiteface, made the memorial address at the opening of the 49th annual Old Settlers Reunion at Roaring Springs, Thursday afternoon.

Rev. Davis was born in Dickens County on his grandfather's homestead, August 25, 1900. The late C. D. Bird was his uncle.

"The Old Settlers had faith in the new land," Rev. Davis declared, "and it was this faith that has developed a great country... pioneers throughout the country have developed a super America... it follows in the faith in God after the emancipation of man's soul through the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross... our country was a part of the great advances that were to come through men and women of great courage and faith..."

Rainfall Doubles That of Last Year

RAINFALL recorded in Matador by Bob Stanley, almost doubles that of a year ago at this date.

Last year the rainfall through August was 10.25 inches, falling as follows: Jan. 0, Feb. .49, Mar. .10, April 1.51, May 1.99, June 2.55, July .27 and Aug. 3.34.

This year the total through August was 19.71 inches, falling as follows: January .17, February .21, March .32, April .82, May 5.27, June 4.72, July 2.23 and August 5.97.

The total rainfall here through August, 1970 was 7.91 inches.

Special Cloudburst

A special cloudburst struck the Furman Vinson farm in the White Star community Monday afternoon. Mrs. Vinson said the sky opened up to release 1 1/2 inches of moisture almost instantly. She said she did not have time to get the laundry in off the line. The cloud was small and the Vinsons could see dust rising where a neighbor was plowing.

The closing prayer was by Bob Morris of Plainview, a long-time Motley County resident.

President Sam Ross of Flomot called the business session to order and secretary-manager "Corky" Marshall, read the financial report, and conducted the election of officers. John Warren of Dickens and Guy Campbell of Matador were elected directors for a three-year term. Directors will elect a president and vice-president at their first meeting.

Mr. Marshall said the officers and directors wished to thank everyone who aided in any way during the three days.

He said that next year will be the 50th or Golden Anniversary of the founding of Old Settlers Association. He said also that the association is seeking suggestions for the event, and the name or names of persons who were present at the first meeting.

City to Observe Holiday Monday

Rites at Floydada For Jennie Conner

Funeral rites for Mrs. Virginia (Jennie) Conner, a native of Floyd County and resident of Abilene, were conducted Thursday, in the First Christian Church in Floydada. Mrs. Conner, 75, died at 1:30 a.m. Tuesday, August 22, in an Abilene hospital. She had been in failing health for several months.

Mrs. Conner was born March 27, 1897 on the Lewis Ranch in Floyd County, owned and operated by her late father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Lewis. She attended schools in Matador and Floydada and after graduation attended Hardin-Simmons before her marriage in 1929 in Floydada. Her husband, the late Paul Conner, was a Conoco distributor in Floydada at one time. Some two years following his death in Floydada, Mrs. Conner moved to Lubbock where she was employed at Hemphill-Wells for some 15 years or more.

In 1969 she moved back to Floydada and in December of 1970 accompanied her sister, Mrs. Minnie Smartt, to South Africa where they visited the Fred Martins until returning in October of 1971. At that time Mrs. Conner moved to Abilene where she resided until her death.

Survivors include one brother, Charlie Lewis of Floydada; and three sisters, Mrs. Minnie Smartt and Mrs. Betty Salyers of Abilene and Mrs. Green (Ruth) Bostick of Matador.

Dewayne Grimes, minister of the First Christian Church, conducted rites and was assisted by Dr. Floyd C. Bradley, Baptist minister. Interment was in Floydada Cemetery under the direction of Moore-Rose Funeral Home.

Hunters Warned to Keep Safety Rules

Hunting brings in several dollars to Motley County, but let's keep it from costing someone dearly.

Too often we "get carried away" and forget about safety rules, and this is where the trouble starts. Keep the rules listed below in mind, and act as if you were the person in front of the gun instead of behind it.

1. Is there any person, animal, bird or object that you don't intend to shoot in the direction that you plan to fire? If so, don't.
2. Do you know the boundaries of the land you are to hunt on? If not, find out before hunting.
3. Do you know the hunting laws applicable? If not, find out before hunting.
4. Do you know if the gun is loaded? Treat all guns as loaded, and don't point at anything that you don't aim to shoot.
5. Do you know the rules of gun and hunting safety? If not, learn them.

Many of our people like to hunt, and others don't. These complaints of hunters, both local and out of town have been made by local people. Remember these rules and observe them. You will find that your conscience is clearer and your neighbors disposition better.

Motley County pioneer, Mrs. Susan Pearl Martin, 89, longtime resident of Flomot, died about 1:15 p.m. Tuesday in Floydada Nursing Home where she had resided several months.

Services were held at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday in the First Baptist Church of Flomot with the Rev. Freddie Martin, pastor of Quitaque First Baptist Church, officiating, assisted by Dr. Floyd Bradley, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Floydada.

Burial was in Floyd Cemetery under the direction of Moore-Rose Funeral Home, Floydada.

Mrs. Martin was born Susan Pearl Merrell, November 10, 1883 at San Saba, Texas and came with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Merrell, to Floyd County in 1888, and to Motley County in 1901.

When the new concrete bridge was opened across Los Lingos Creek, (Quitaque River) in October, 1963, Mrs. Martin said she remembered the country first as a cattle country when her father traded all his cattle but 12 head, for a section of land on the Los Lingos, West of Flomot. They had previously lived in a half-dugout on Callahan Draw beyond Lockney.

She grew to womanhood on the river in the shadow of Quitaque Peaks and first attended a small school at Fairmont in Floyd County, about 1894. She was one of three pupils. Her seven children were all born and reared in the Flomot Community.

Mrs. Martin was present at the organization of the Motley County Singing Convention in 1892, and was the last of the charter members.

She is survived by four sons, Bruce Martin of Matador, Barney Martin of Plainview, Howard Martin of Sunnyvale, Calif., and Elwyn Martin of Fremont, Calif.; three daughters, Mrs. B. W. 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

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


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
