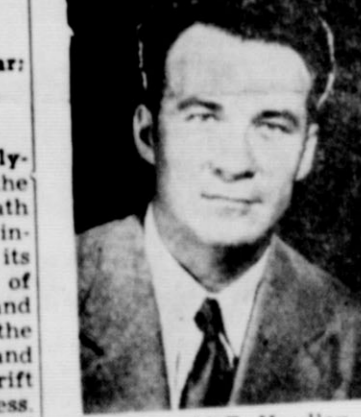
Guy Seigler Rites Held At Childress

Ranchmen also view the future with a more optimistic outlook with the range crisis relieved. Starting with a light shower about dark Thursday total rainfall registered here through Sunday was .98-inch. Reports from Roaring Springs state the rainfall there was about one inch.

B. F. Simpson of Northfield declared he estimated the rainfall in his community at about one inch. The precipitation was general over most of the Panhandle and South Plains, but lighter along the western state boundary.

Tornadoes Hit Plains Two tornadoes rolled out of boiling black clouds about 45 miles west and southwest of Lubbock early Saturday night to destroy four farm homes, numerous farm buildings, and an oil rig, and leave six persons injured, none seriously.

The savage winds caused heavy destruction in their paths and raised an area-wide alert throughout much of the Plains country. All four homes hit by the funnels were completely demolished. It was only by a miracle that residents of the houses escaped death or serious injury.

Highest Awards In History Provided For Saturday Show

MONEY is waiting, \$818 in cash, for the Saturday winners in Motley county's 8th annual Junior Livestock Show, which will be held at a central location in downtown Matador. The exhibition of fine Motley county livestock will include 58 calves and pigs. County Agent Rufus Emmons declared last night.

The calves and pigs are projects of 4-H and F. A. boys of the entire county. Feeding has been under the supervision of Mark Harvey, vocational agriculture instructor at Roaring Springs. Bill Moss, vocational agriculture instructor at Matador and County Agent Emmons. A total of 38 boys are scheduled to compete in the show.

A change has been made in the judge previously announced. T. L. Leach of Texas Technological college, Lubbock, will judge the exhibit. Mr. Emmons declared. All pigs and calves must be in town and registered with secretary of the show, Wayland Moore, by 11 a. m.

Tutt Garnett of Matador will contribute his annual service to the show by assisting (without pay) Moss and Emmons clip the calves and prepare them for exhibition. Judging will start about 1 p. m. in the following order: breeder hogs, fat hogs, heavy steers, light steers, grand and reserve champion calf.

Premiums Are Higher

Some mighty nice folding money is awaiting the winners. The grand champion calf will bring a \$40 prize and the reserve champion will draw \$25. The prize list for light calves will be the same as for heavy calves as follows: 1st place \$35, 2nd place \$30, 3rd place \$25, 4th place \$22.50, 5th place \$20, 6th place \$17.50, 7th place \$15, 8th place \$12.50, 9th and 10th places \$10. Each calf failing to place in the above list will receive \$7 for showing.

Plenty of prize money is also awaiting boys showing the top fat and breeding hogs. Prizes in each of the classes are as follows: 1st place \$17.50, 2nd place \$15, 3rd place \$12.50, 4th place \$11, 5th place \$10, 6th place \$9, 7th place \$8, 8th place \$7, and 9th and 10th places \$6 each. Each hog which fails to place will earn \$5 for his owner for showing.

Extra money will also be paid for showmanship. The boy who does best in showing his calf will receive \$15 and \$10 will go to the boy who does the best job of showing his hog.

Selling committee is composed of the following members: John Stevens, Matador Ranch, chairman, C. C. Jones of Flomot, Curtis Graham of Matador and John C. Russell of Matador. Sale of calves and pigs is optional. More than sufficient cash for the prizes was contributed, and present plan of the committee is to hold the surplus until next year, so that only a small amount will be needed to be contributed for the 1951 show.

Davis released his platform in Amarillo. It follows:

Agriculture—For price support program, with definite plans eventually to get agriculture able to stand on its own feet. Less bureaucratic control, with more emphasis placed on local control by local people. I believe in acreage allotments set up on a fair and equal basis for the farmers in all sections of the country. I am definitely for a government cotton classifying office set up in the 18th Congressional district.

Education—I believe in a fair and equal investment in education for our youth in the 18th congressional district, compared with any and all regions of these United States. I am strong-

ly for our continued control by the local people.

Business—More consideration for the small business man and his problems. I believe in less encroachments on his rights. Labor—I believe in less curtailing in the rights of labor to have their share of the income and freedom of our republic. I believe in more control of labor when and if they take undue advantage of more than their share of the income and freedom of this nation.

Veterans—I believe in being faithful to the veteran as prescribed by our state and national legislation. I believe that the educational program of veterans should be kept in line with sound educational principles. I believe in less red tape of any kind which causes hardships and delays for the veteran. Parents-Teachers Hear Safety Talk; And Name Officers

New officers for the coming year were elected by Matador Parent-Teacher Association last Wednesday, following a program which comprised a talk on "Safety" by Highway Patrolman Bill Saunders of the Public Safety Department of Plainview.

Mrs. Harold Campbell was elected incoming president for the organization. Other officers will be: Mrs. C. M. Barton, Jr., vice-president; Mrs. Freddie Welling, secretary; Mrs. Robert Darsey, treasurer and Mrs. Elbert Reeves, historian. Installation services for these officers will be held at the last meeting in May.

Warns Against Speed

"Speed is the main cause of so many highway accidents", Patrolman Saunders declared in his talk to the association. "People seemed so shocked at the number of boys who lost their lives in the late war", he said, "but there have been more people killed in car wrecks since 1907, than in all the wars beginning with the American Revolution, through World War II."

One person dies every sixteen minutes in the United States, in a car wreck."

Mr. Saunders stated that 85% of all accidents are caused by the driver and people between the ages of 25 to 44 have the most accidents. "But all it will take to stop these car accidents is a one-man crusade—the man behind the wheel", he pointed out.

Mr. Saunders urged parents to keep their children from driving until they obtain a driver's license and urged everyone to

drive within the speed limit. Pictures of wrecks that had occurred in Hale County were shown by Mr. Saunders.

The second and fourth grades tied for having the most mothers present at the meeting.

A home town newspaper, such as this one, is published only through the teamwork of people of many skills. It is doubtful if any other business or institution in the community surpasses the newspaper in its complexity, in the varied nature of the expert know-how its operation requires.

Modern drug stores, which require a combination of merchandising and professional aptitudes, come closest to the newspaper in the variety of demands made upon staffs. But in addition to merchandising and professional abilities comparable to those of the drug store, the newspaper's people must also have mechanical understanding and skill of a high order.

Newspaper mechanical staff people must know both how to operate a variety of machines, and how to maintain and repair them.

Editorial staff members are specialists who perform their daily duties within the restricting confines of a code of ethics fully as binding as are those of other professions. They must have ability, a liking for people, knowledge of words, a feeling for art, insatiable curiosity, willingness to work all hours under pressure, and be familiar with mechanical practices and limitations of the printing plant.

While sharing Always with their neighbors the enjoyment of a community event, the editorial worker must also cover it, taking notes, names, dates and data, so that while others relax afterward, the story of the event can be written. The editor and reporter, like doctors, are "on duty" every hour of every day.

Members of the advertising and business office staffs, too, are specialists, each in his or her own way. And they, too, are important to the community. Telling the local service and merchandising story is vital to the smooth functioning of professional and commercial sides of community life.

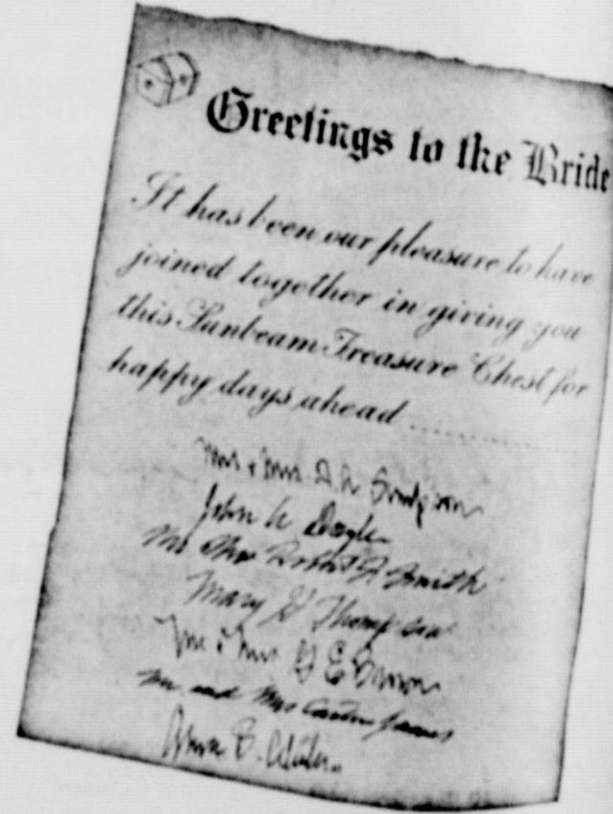

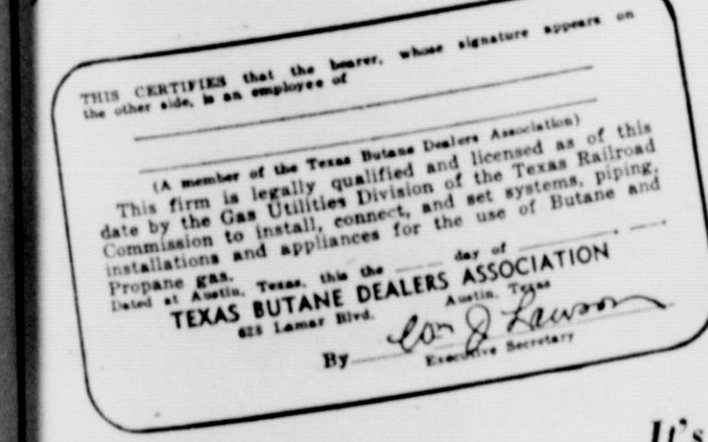

Early Diagnosis Needed To Curb Spread Of Cancer

Deaths from cancer in Texas reached a total of 7271 during the past year, indicating that a warning against cancer quacks and so-called cancer cures is justified by the State Health Department. Early diagnosis and competent treatment could have prevented many of these deaths, states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"There are but two ways of treating cancer. First, by surgery and second, by the use of radium or x-ray. Treatment must be started early and in the hands of a competent surgeon. Surgery is relied upon to remove cancerous tumors and is used in nearly two-thirds of the cases. X-ray or radium is used to

advantage for the remaining group. Frequently the two methods are combined. Self-medication, serums, colored lights, pastes, salves, and diets are valueless.

"The great protection against cancer is early diagnosis. Every case is an emergency and it is unfortunate that the majority of those with cancer do not seek medical advice early in the first stages of the disease. No hope

should be placed in fake cancer cures or treatments. Rather, the annual physical examination and an immediate reporting to your physician of any symptoms which may be suspected to be beginning of cancer should be relied upon. These symptoms are: any unusual bleeding from any body opening, any lump in the breast or other part of the body, any persistent sore, particularly on the face or mouth, and chronic indigestion. These conditions may not be cancer, but sometimes they are forerunners of the more common types of this disease. Where cancer is suspected, do not delay, but consult your physician at once."

WARNING

Extreme dry weather creates an emergency which is a threat to property throughout the city. Please give the Matador Volunteer Fire Department every cooperation.

When the fire alarm sounds while you are in your automobile, pull to the nearest curb immediately, leaving a right of way open to the fire truck. Remain parked until all members of the fire department who may be following in automobiles, have an opportunity to pass. Do not follow the truck. Do not park near the scene of the fire. Leave all streets and alleys open in the vicinity of the fire. Stay out of the way of the firemen. Do not attempt to aid in fighting a fire unless you are a member of the department, or asked to render assistance by a member of the department. Never, under any condition, drive over a fire hose, under penalty of fine.

As further precaution, do not place paper and other inflammable materials in alley trash barrels. When you must burn trash, wait until the wind is not blowing. Have a garden hose ready if you are burning a large quantity of material. Watch it during the time required for burning and wet down the coals before leaving.

Please use every precaution possible in avoiding unnecessary fires. Report any careless or incendiary action. You may save a life or a home — it may be your own.

Robert Kennedy, prominent Methodist evangelist will be shocked and grieved to learn of his death on March 24, at Neosho, Mo., where he was holding meeting at the Methodist church. Nationally known, Rev. Kennedy had preached in every American state except one. He conducted a revival at the Matador Methodist Church a number of years ago, and will be remembered by many here.

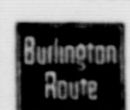

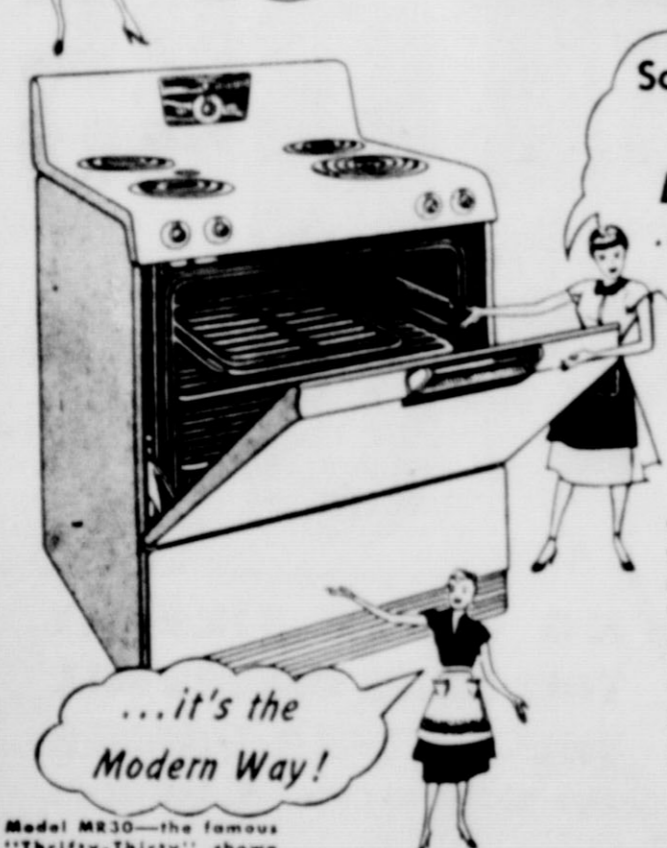

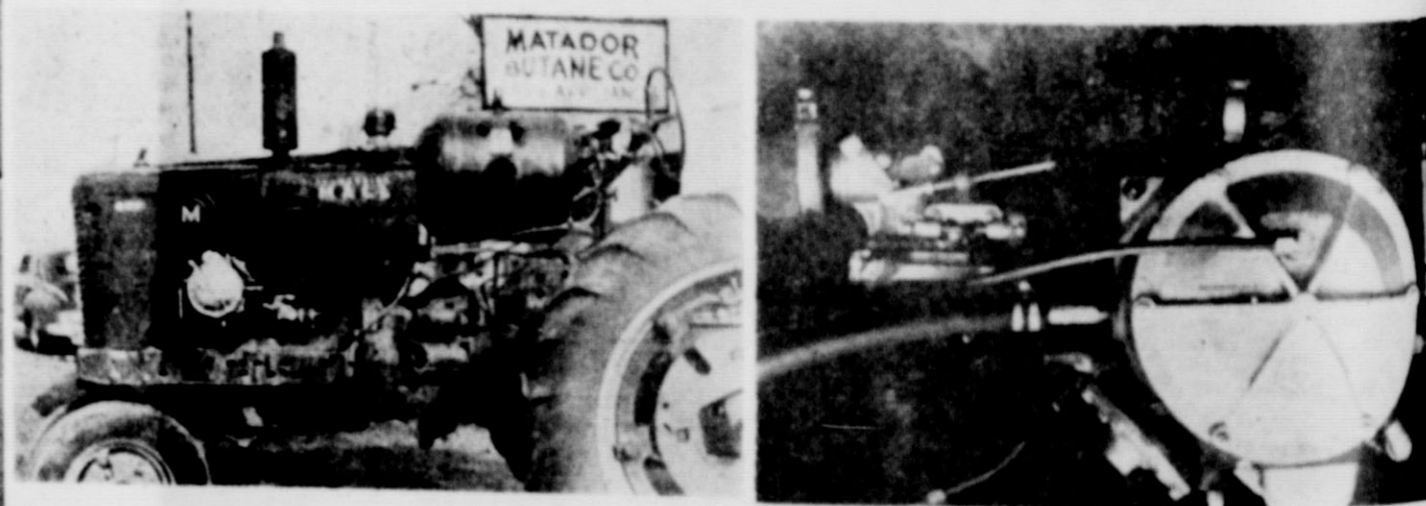
