MEXICO CITY
TENOCHTITLAN
 Mexico City, when I visited it, was already fast losing its old character. It was a city in a transition. The very old and the new were in juxtaposition with the modern. The panther of the Aztec has pounced on the spring body of the Mexican and is starting to devour it. Who knows a little about the vast past, this country has a palimpsest—records over others partially.

FLAMING PYRAMIDS...
 Where now stands the great Mexican Cathedral—the largest church in the Western hemisphere, formerly stood the great Aztec teocalli (House of God.) It was built on terraced heights, and from the summits of its pyramidal formation tongues of orange-red flickered towards the skies. Between these plumes of flames stood the great stone of sacrifice where hundreds, nay, thousands, of hapless victims were sacrificed. Four priests held the writhing body while a fifth one slit open his chest with an obsidian blade, inserted his hand and tore forth the still palpitating heart and flung it into a stone receptacle that stood before their god of war. The mutilated bodies were then cast

down from their pyramidal heights to be devoured in part by the frenzied mob of religious fanatics who stood about the base. Priests with blood-matted hair and with blood-soaked garments worked with a religious frenzy that bordered on insanity. And all this so that their gods might be placated. In the main, however, the blood of humans was to be exchanged for the "divine liquor from the skies." Without rain, their very existence was threatened. And thus long queues of victims—miles long—would stand waiting their turn to be sacrificed on the heights between the flaming plumes ascending heavenwards.

MOCTEZUMA'S PALACE...
 Where now stands the huge, handsome and imposing pile known as the National Palace, formerly stood the magnificent palace of Moctezuma. Here barbaric splendor held forth such as the world had never seen before nor since. Here Moctezuma held sway, in most imperious style, "monarch of all he surveyed." Innumerable servants catered to his merest vagaries and wishes. Resplendent in all the panoply of his gorgeous chromatic finery, he indicated that were placed before him in innumerable courses. THE MEXICAN VENICE...

In spite of all that can be done to prevent this, the magnificent marble pile known as the National Theatre or the Palacio de Artes is sinking.

Tenochtitlan was founded in the year 1325 and two hundred years more a magnificent city had replaced the mud and reed huts that were first built on the site. The Gods, themselves, if one can believe their legends, indicated these marshlands as a future site for their city. An eagle, with a serpent in its mouth, was seen here perched on a rock—this was the sign given from on high. In consequence, eagle, serpent and rock among the cacti have been incorporated in the National Seal of the Mexican Republic.

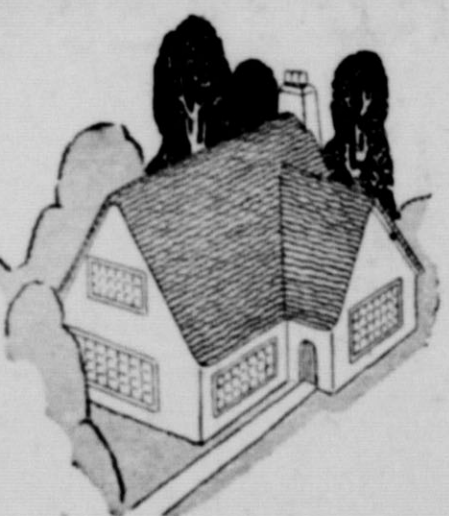
