### SERVICE STATION DAMAGED BY FIRE

Fire of undetermined origin at  
2:30 a. m. this morning left the  
Adams Conoco Service Station a  
charred hull.

The burning station was dis-  
covered by G. R. Ady, driver of a large truck for the  
Western Foundry Company of  
Tyler, enroute to Albuquerque,  
New Mexico. He roused resi-  
dents in the neighborhood of the  
station who turned in the alarm.

### POLICE HUNT MAN WHO WORKED HERE

Many residents of Matador  
were surprised last week when  
Edgar Fred Whitaker leaped into  
front page news after his wife  
smuggled a gun into the Dallas  
jail which enabled both to es-  
cape.

He was disclosed as an ex-con-  
vict from Oklahoma with two  
charges of robbery and three  
jail and penitentiary escapes to  
his credit. One of his convictions  
was for rape in 1933 and one for  
robbery in 1945. He had admit-  
ted four armed robberies in Ft.  
Worth between December 31  
and January 23.

Whitaker and his wife, Madge,  
were Matador residents during  
the fall and winter. First trace  
of them was during the cotton-  
picking season when they work-  
ed for Frank Montgomery. Later  
they were employed as cooks by  
Wayburn's cafe. They were  
well-known and well-liked in  
Matador. Apparently they paid  
all of their debts before leaving.

Montgomery said he made  
trips to the bank with Whitaker  
when he withdrew large sums of  
cash to pay pickers. He said,  
however, the ex-convict was a  
good worker. Almost all busi-  
nessmen in town remembered  
the Whitakers, especially the  
ex-convict's charming personality  
and good clothes.

John Irvin, manager of the  
Matador Implement company  
said he almost sold Whitaker a  
used car but could not secure a  
vehicle to satisfy his taste. Po-  
lice throughout the state are still  
alerted in effort to capture the  
pair.

Last year his dry lot steer calf (above) was named grand champion of the Floyd County Junior Livestock show and this year the young ranchman was on top again. He won first and fourth place in light steers and third places in heavy steers. His light steer weighed 840 pounds, sold for 41¢ and brought \$344.40. The 4th place light steer weighed 850, sold for 39¢ and brought \$321.50. The third place heavy steer weighed 1,100 pounds, sold for 32¢ and brought \$352., a total of \$1,027.90 for three head.

Stanley Burleson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Burleson (ranch in Floyd county) and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. (Doc) Burleson and Mr. and Mrs. Wilburn Barton. The calves are from the Doc Burleson herd. Young Burleson also won first with a pen of 3 pigs in the 1950 Floyd county show.

His achievements in the 1950 show resulted in a letter from Congressman George Mahon of the 19th District, dated April 12, 1950, as follows: "Dear Stanley: I have just observed that you are the first in the Milk Fed Division of the Floyd County show. It is now out of date, but since you are a student of agriculture, it will be interesting to know what was being said about agriculture in 1932.
