## FOUR PERISH WHEN CARS COLLIDE ON AMARILLO HIGHWAY

DEATH kept an appointment short before the first streak of dawn Sunday morning, in a head-on collision eight miles south of Tulia. Four were dead and four were injured when the entangled cars had been relieved of their tragic passengers.

Mrs. Julia Couch, 51, of Matador, sister of former resident John Lee, was one of the victims. She was killed instantly.

Others killed in the crash included: Leon Rusk, 29, Amarillo radio KLYN staff member and leader of the Tune Wranglers, western music band.

Lloyd Garrett, 23, also KLYN staff member, vocalist and guitarist for the Tune Wranglers.

Wynona Louise Parker, 27, of Amarillo. The injured, none of whom were listed as critical, are: Mrs. J. L. Dunn, about 22, of Amarillo, daughter of Mrs. Couch; James L. Hendricks, 16, of Amarillo; Bonifacio "Benny" Malacara, 37, of Amarillo, bass fiddle player for the Tune Wranglers and LaNell Brown, 21, of Amarillo.

The Tune Wranglers were returning to Amarillo after having played for a Saturday night dance at Floydada. Their 1948 Buick collided with a 1939 Chevrolet driven south by Mrs. Dunn, according to the report of investigating highway patrolmen.

Funeral Here Tuesday Mrs. Couch's body was brought here Sunday by McDonald Funeral Home ambulance, for funeral services which were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Clifford Potts in charge. Interment under direction of McDonald Funeral Home was in Matador East Mound cemetery. Pallbearers were: Bill West, Raby Webb, Roy Smith, Leon Smallwood, Loyd Latimer and Charlie Meador.

Julia S. Lee was born in Erath County, Texas, March 24, 1893 and died Sunday, May 14, 1950.

She was married in 1912 to Erazmuth Couch, who preceded his wife in death about twenty years ago. To the union were born 10 children, five of whom died in infancy and one, son, J. H. Couch, who died of injuries received in combat in the last World War.

Mrs. Couch was converted and became a member of the Baptist Church at DeLeon, Texas about seventeen years ago and her membership was there at the time of her death.

Besides Mrs. Dunn, Mrs. Couch is survived by two other daughters, Mrs. Charley Rich of DeLeon, Texas and Mrs. Toy Holt of Matador; and one son, Wesley Couch of Matador, all of whom were present at the funeral with the exception of Mrs. Dunn, who was still a patient in the Plainview hospital where she was conveyed following the accident.

Six sisters among the brother also survive, being Mrs. Bill Dollison of Dallas, Mrs. Minnie Allen of Matador, Mrs. Beula Hendricks and Mrs. Mollie Watkins of Amarillo, Mrs. Donie Rich of DeLeon; and Mrs. Lizzie Guthry and John Lee both of Soper, Oklahoma, who were unable to attend the services. Eleven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren also survive.

## Citizens School Group Names Southern Director

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—Southern interest in the work of the National Citizens Commission for the Public Schools has been so great that we chose Louisville, Kentucky, for the establishment of our first regional office, Henry Top, Jr., Executive Director of the Commission, said today.

Announcement of the opening of the Louisville office and the appointment of Maurice D. Bement as regional director was made at the beginning of the Commission's two-day meeting in Atlantic City.

The National Citizens Commission is financed by the Rockefeller Foundation and the Carnegie Corporation. It is made up of thirty-six prominent laymen Roy E. Larson, President of Time Inc., is chairman. Purpose of the organization, which was formed only a year ago, is the stimulation of local citizen interest in school betterment. The Commission also serves as a clearinghouse of information and works with a growing list of local school improvement groups, now totaling more than 200 all over the country.

The Louisville office, under Mr. Bement, will give particular attention to public education in the South and provide specialized assistance at the request of groups forming in this area.

"It is our belief," Mr. Bement said today, "that the responsibility for better schools is the local responsibility of each community. We want private citizens to organize with their neighbors to help the schools do the job each local community feels they should do. Citizens should, and must, meet that obligation if progress in education is to match that in other fields."

Mr. Bement has had wide experience in both business and public life. He is well-known throughout the South for his five years' service as Executive Director of the Committee for Kentucky, an organization which enrolled thousands of Kentuckians in a state-wide program of action for community and rural betterment. The Committee's campaign covered problems of public interest ranging from school im-

provement to political clean-ups, and has been credited with effecting civic progress throughout the state.

During World War II Mr. Bement served as employment supervisor for the Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corporation's Louisville division.

He was also a teacher in the public schools of Lone Oak, Kentucky, for six years. He is a graduate of Murray State Teachers College, with advanced work at George Peabody College in Nashville, Tennessee. He is married and the father of two children.

"We want to hear from all citizens who are interested in the cause of public education in the South," Mr. Bement said. "We hope to perform a real service, but the job can be done only in cooperation with local citizens in each community."

Market Place**

By William R. Nelson

PEOPLE who have visited market places in foreign lands find them picturesque, quaint and colorful. If they had studied them carefully they would have found them also most inefficient. To sell things there it is necessary to transport them to the market place, display them, wait for customers, and take home what remains unsold. Often considerably deteriorated in value.

Perhaps one of the very real contributors to our high American standard of living is the greater efficiency of our less picturesque market places, the classified or want ad columns of our papers.

Classified advertising brings together seller and buyer without the necessity of meeting at a market place. And goods that change hands need be moved only once, need not be exposed to deteriorating forces. Neither buyer nor seller need waste time awaiting the other.

People wishing to buy things not offered in the want ad columns can generally find it by inserting a "Wanted" announcement, thereby obtaining what they want when they want it.

Classified or want ad advertising gets its name, of course, from the way such information is grouped under headings.

Included in such columns is considerable life's every day pathos and drama, its failures and successes, its comedy and its irony. Even such items as "Eggs For Sale" may herald an up or down in someone's life. Certainly there is a story behind "Exchange, set of golf clubs for baby buggy".

What a clever one's problem, when using a classified ad to solve it, certain matters of technique may well be borne in mind. Number one is timeliness. Ice sales do not sell well in summer. Number two is convenience. Make it easy to respond to your ad. And number three is adequate description. The more you tell, the more you sell is an excellent bit of advice.

If tempted to keep the cost low by being too brief, remember that your reader knows only what the advertisement says, so telling a complete story is one way to assure success. Remember also how much time you are saving, by not having to go to a market place, and being willing to spend some of that saving on additional words in your classified advertisement.

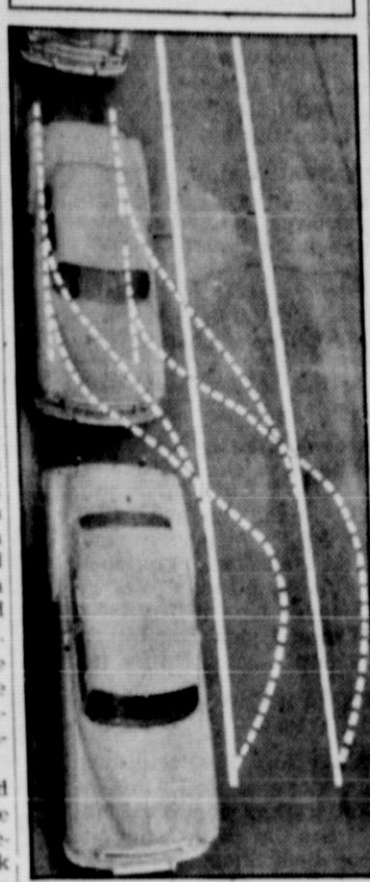

tion in the South, the natural market for this "new" product, up to such volume that importation of natural ice from the North began to diminish. As the methods were refined, the market spread, until in the winter of 1890 an unusually mild winter and short supply of natural ice brought a sudden mushrooming of ice plants in the north. With that unanticipated impetus, a national industry was born.

Today, virtually every community has its ice plant, a familiar and friendly part of the town's life—and an integral part of the nation-wide industry that produced, in some 7,000 plants, more than 50,000,000 tons of ice each year.

In Texas alone, 600 ice manufacturing plants produce for the Texas homes and industry five millions tons of ice per year. This means the opening of distant markets for Texas fruit, vegetables, meats, and sea-food—the preservation of foods for Texas families—the easing of Texas summers with cooling refreshments.

Marking the 100th anniversary of Dr. Gorrie's invention of the first American made ice machine, manufacturers of Texas observed "Texas Ice Day" May 17th.

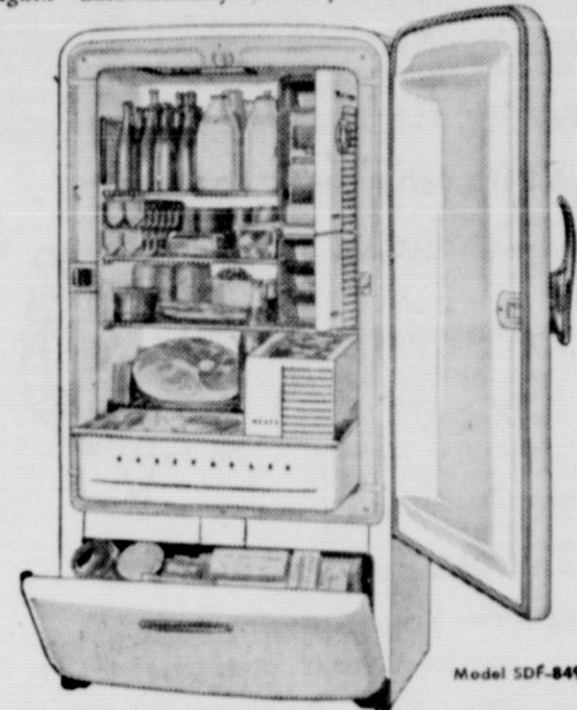

was being shipped by sailing vessel to Southern ports. In 1805 Frederick Tudor of Boston put the ice-marketing business on the map, establishing a thriving ice trade to the West Indies and even shipping some New England ice all the way to China.

Around 1850, the shipping of ice from Boston harbor to New Orleans was big business, and home delivery of "Boston Ice" was well established. The invention of an ice-making machine by an obscure small-town physician had no effect on the natural ice business—which, in the long run, it was to completely eliminate.

During the Civil War an ice-making machine using the ammonia absorption principle that is in general use today was smuggled through the Union blockade at New Orleans, and later was set up at Gretna, La. Invented by Ferdinand Carre' of Paris, the ammonia machine was first practical device for large-scale ice manufacture. The third ice-making machine put in operation in this country was located at old Jefferson, Texas, in 1875.

Combining the principles worked out by Dr. John Gorrie with those of the Carre' machine engineers soon had ice produc-

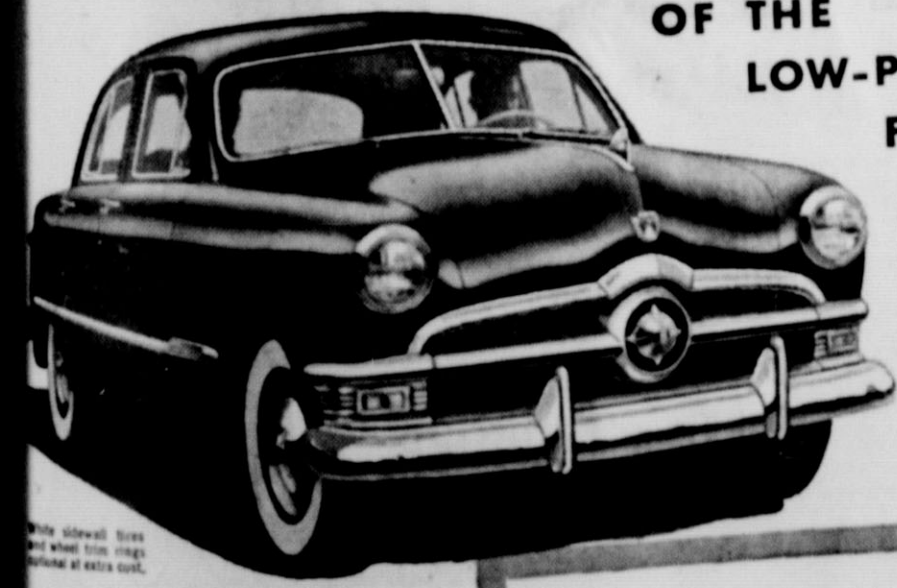

### Children Benefit Through School Health Program

Many Matador school children have benefited materially from the program of medical examinations and health education during the current year, according to records of school officials.

A total of three hundred and sixty-five students received free medical examinations from Dr. A. C. Traweck, Sr., Dr. A. C. Traweck, Jr., Dr. J. S. Stanley, and Dr. W. B. Spencer.

All medical information has been recorded on permanent record cards and filed with the students' permanent record.

A total of sixty-seven students were found with defects and of this number, over fifty percent have since received medical treatment.

Teachers have made every effort to acquaint the parents with the nature of the defects and in most cases parents have attempted to have remedial care given to the child. Many of the children with defects were found to have deficient hearing and this defect was the one in which
