**Home Demonstration NOTES**

The Motley County Home Demonstration Council plans to buy pineapple co-operatively this year from the Tropical Fruit Company at Laredo, Texas. These large Sugar Loaf Pine-

apples weigh 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 pounds and will cost \$2.40 per dozen plus a few cents freight charges. If you are a Home Demonstration Club woman turn your order in to the marketing chairman of your club. If you are not a clubwoman and would like to order some, send your orders to Mrs. J. R. Nall of Flomot, or leave them at the Home Demonstration Agents office. All orders must be in by June 1, 1950. Many of us nowadays want to

remodel our house and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Simpson can show us a good example of how well it can be done, as they have just finished moving and completely redoing their home.

First they took out the partition between the living room and dining room and made one large, airy combination room. Then they put hardwood floors in this room. The wallpaper is beige and cream with a tinge of pink and blue. Mrs. Simpson's furniture is rose beige and she re-upholstered a platform rocker and a foot stool to fit in with those colors.

They built cabinets on three sides of the kitchen and installed a large double sink. The cabinets are painted yellow and the cabinet top is covered with a marble green plastic which is heat resistant. Since the kitchen is small they built a table and two benches which fold into the wall when not in use. They finished the kitchen floor with green rubber tile.

There are three bedrooms in the house and Mrs. Simpson re-

finished an old cedar chest and mirror for one of those.

The bathroom is done in peach and gray. They had to install a tub and shower and again Mrs. Simpson insisted on plenty of cabinets.

The Simpsons have spent a lot of time and work on their house, but since they did so much of it themselves they feel that they will be able to enjoy it more, for it is more truly a part of them.

## Census of 1880 Listed Panhandle Total 1,607

Seventy years ago only 1,607 persons listed in the entire Panhandle of Texas region comprised of 26 counties, according to the 1880 federal census records. (Motley county was not listed as in the Panhandle, the southern border being Palmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Hall and Childress).

An interesting map has been drawn by Ernest Archambeau, Amarillo insurance man whose hobby is historical research. Six of the counties in the 1880 census, Palmer, Castro, Carson, Moore, Dallam and Sherman, had no population. Potter county (Amarillo) listed a population of 23: 23 Anglo, 3 Spanish and 2 Colored.

The four persons living in Swisher county listed "mustang hunting" as their occupation. In Hutchinson county one man named his chief occupation "re-cuperating health".

In the Fort Elliott census was listed a soldier who claimed no occupation and under "remarks" was written "insane".

A brick mason noted his occupation and then added, "Unemployed for one year".

Not a single person listed their occupation as "cowboy", but there were hundreds who named "herding cattle" as their occupation.

Out of the entire population of the 26 counties, only one teacher A. F. McKensie of Hemphill county, was listed. The only doctor according to the 1880 census rolls, was S. M. Cummings who lived at Tascosa. Of course the army had some doctors at Ft. Elliott but all the military personnel were listed as "soldiers".

Only 31 children were listed as attending school during the past 12 months. There were three lawyers, all living at Mobeetie. The nearest railroad shipping point was Dodge City, Kansas.

During the year of 1880 The Panhandle was new land and new people came trekking in chiefly from the midwest, Colorado and Western States. Only a small percentage came from other Southern States.

There were no public roads, no schools and law enforcement was primarily a local matter.

Wheeler county had the largest population. However, out of the 512 listed as living in Wheeler county, 296 were soldiers stationed at Ft. Elliott. Of the 26 counties by races, 1,198 were Anglo, 358 were Spanish and 51 were Negro.

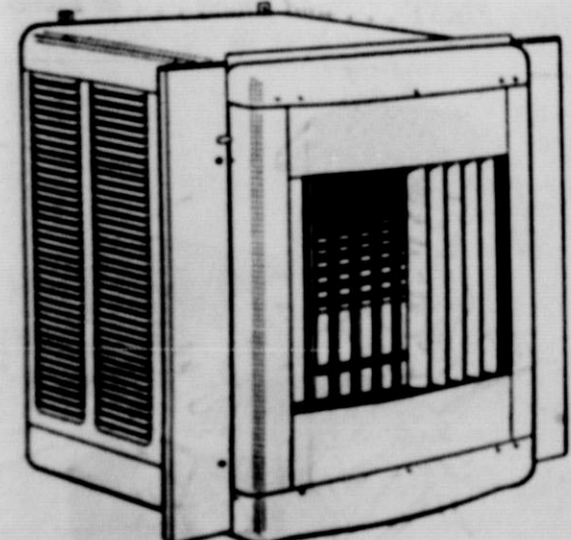

She received her degree with a major in home economics education. Marion has majored in agronomy.

Both entered Tech in the fall semester of 1946.

The age of the Baumgardners at Tech, which began in 1934, will not be over with the graduation of the two, Monday, however. A brother, David, enrolled this year as a freshman and a younger sister, Priscilla, a freshman in Wellington High school, is planning to attend Tech.

In the 13 years—for 3 years during the war there was no member of the family in Tech—that the Baumgardners have attended Tech, they have built up an aggregate of 27 years attendance.

### Leadership Noted

In those years they have been leaders among Tech students. John Henry, the first to attend Tech, was president of the Aggie Club in 1939. Haynes, another brother, headed the club in 1941 and Marion has been president of the club during the last year. Marion has also been a member of the international Crop judging team.

He has followed the Baumgardner line in campus religious work also, having headed the Student Religious council as president, as brother Robert had done in 1947. He has been president of the Wesley Foundation and Wesley Players club also.

Barbara, while blazing trails where the Baumgardners had not before held positions, has been active in the Home Economics club, is a member of Phi Upsilon Omicron, honorary Home Economics society, and has also been active in the Wesley Foundation and Wesley Players club. 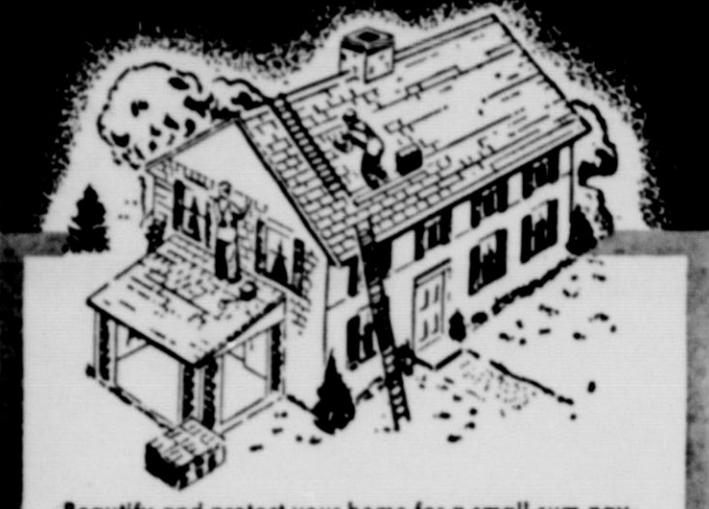
experience and all." (Moose used to play a little semi-pro ball.)

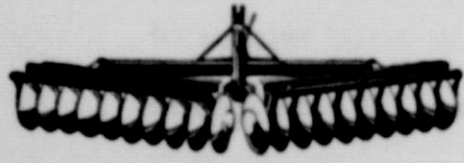

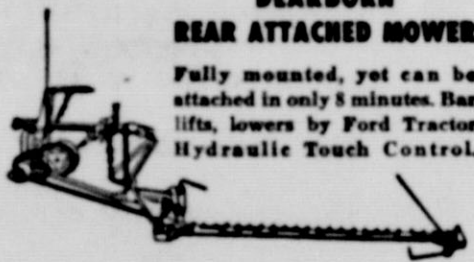

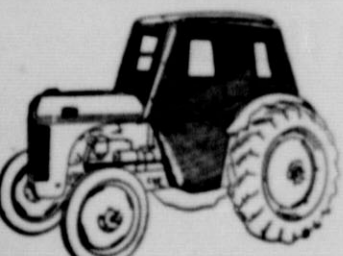

Five farmers, Bundy Campbell, L. C. Harp, Boyd and Jess Perkins and Thelma Casey have used a plane in spraying 410 acres of weeds with 2-4-D, at a cost of \$1.50 per acre.

Emmons warns landowners planning to use either of the chemicals, that they will kill or damage all broad leaf plants, such as cotton, flower gardens and trees. Fumes of the material have been known to drift 10 miles and legal action has resulted from damage.
