Lions Hear Report Of Convention

Report of the Chicago International convention held July 16, 17, 18 and 19 was made Tuesday by Boss Lion Forrest Campbell at the regular meeting of the Matador Lions club. Other official delegates of the Matador club who attended the international meeting were Lion Curtis Graham and Lions Sweetheart Miss Rachel Patton.

Lion Campbell said his first difficulty in Chicago was apparent when he picked up the dinner check in a swanky dining spot and discovered the cost of a meal for himself, Mrs. Campbell and Miss Patton was over \$18.

He related a profound impression of the necrology ceremony and the flag presentation in which the 28 nations represented by Lions International presented their colors. He described the "Texas night" in which Tex as International President Herb C. Petre was tendered leadership of the vast international organization. He said between 12,000 and 15,000 Lions paraded Michigan avenue. Once he was asked: "Does everyone in Texas belong to the Lions?"

Community Shaken By Tragedy Early Sunday Morning

DEATH emerged from the crumpled ruins of a 1950 Chevrolet automobile after it stopped rolling off State Highway 70 two miles south of Matador about 12:40 Sunday morning. Elvis Truman (Pos) Dillard, 31, operator of Bob's Oil Well service station, was killed instantly. Billy Joe McPeak, 28, employee of Dillard, was fatally injured and died about 4:45 p. m. Tuesday at Stanley Clinic-Hospital. W. R. Smelser, 39, owner of the car received a broken collar bone and minor injuries.

Sheriff John Stotts who investigated the accident, said the car turned over four or five times. Dillard and McPeak were thrown from the automobile. Smelser, who was in the back seat said he believed McPeak was driving at the time of the accident. The car left the level highway at a point approximately one and one-half miles south of Matador city limits.

Mr. Dillard has been a resident of Matador for approximately two years. He leased and operated Bob's Oil Well service station. Funeral services were held Monday at 3 p. m. at the Roaring Springs Assembly of God Church. Burial was in the Lockney cemetery under the direction of McDonald Funeral home.

He is survived by his wife; two small children, Carolyn Kay and Freddie, 6; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Dillard of Roaring Springs; three sisters, Mrs. Mickey Herndon of Amarillo, Mrs. Don Beck of Odessa and Miss Thelma Dean Dillard of Roaring Springs; and three brothers, J. W., Bennie Dee and Billy Joe all of Roaring Springs.

Mr. Dillard spent almost four years in the armed services overseas during World War II. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Olen Beauchamp of Lockney, assisted by Rev. H. E. Smith of Floydada and Rev. C. A. Strickland of Crosbyton. Pall bearers were Lawrence Masengale of New Mexico, Eldred Dillard of Lawton, Oklahoma, Leroy Durham of Lockney, Homer Starkey of Matador, Omer Watson of Roaring Springs, Flake Dillard of Amarillo, Don Beck of Odessa and Lindsey Skaggs of Lockney.

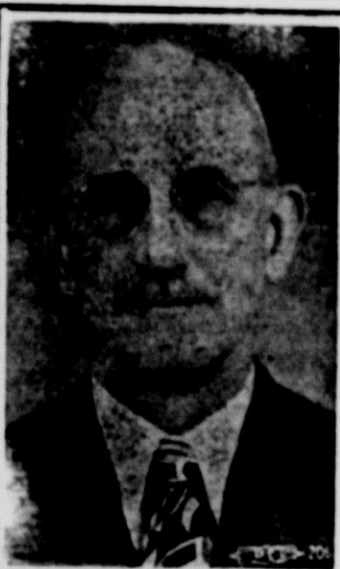

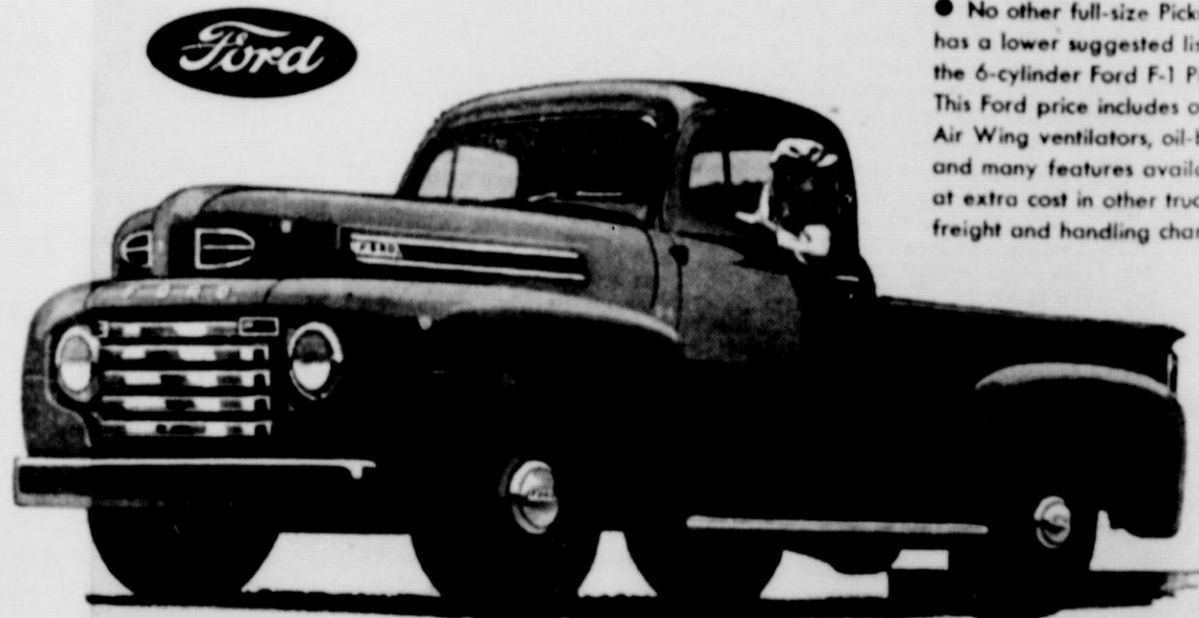

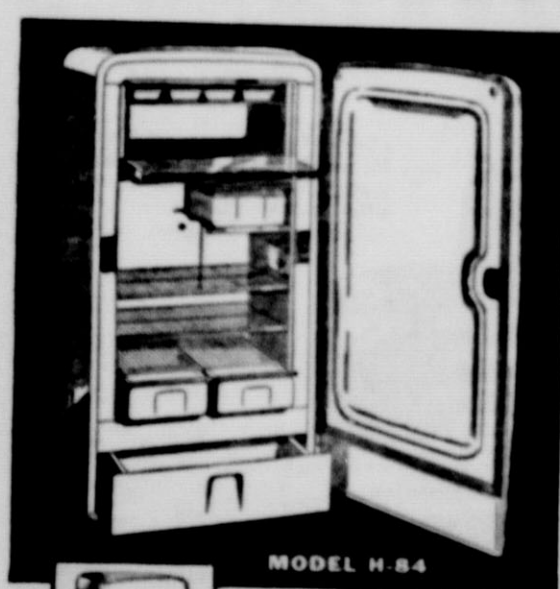
