### City Names Mrs. Smith Secretary

Mrs. Gertrude Smith was Monday night appointed by the city council to fill the unexpired term of retiring secretary Howard Edmondson. Mrs. Smith will not be a candidate for the office in the April 4th city election.

In an effort to provide complete fairness to all candidates for the top city office, the council decided to appoint an applicant for the unexpired term who would not be a candidate, so that voters could select their preference in the April election. Since it is assumed that "in office" places hold political favor, city officials felt that it would be unfair to the two ex-service men who have announced, and others who may announce later, to appoint a candidate. The choice will remain entirely with the voters.

Only three applications were received. They were: L. M. Cox, Clint Hicks and Mrs. Smith. Mrs. Smith is former treasurer of Motley county.

Perfect Tax Collection Almost perfect tax collection for 1949 was achieved in Matador. Total property valuation is now \$1,138,582. The city rate is \$1.35. Total collection would have amounted to \$15,370.85. Secretary Howard Edmondson collected \$15,259.13 — just \$111.72 short of 100%. ### Application Granted

Application filed in November by the Quannah, Acme & Pacific Railway Company to discontinue service of trains Nos. 1 and 2 (passenger and mail) between Quannah and Floydada, Texas, has been granted by the Railroad Commission of Texas. Dated in Austin, January 20, a copy of Docket No. 1070-RO, is worded as follows:

"After due notice the above numbered and entitled case was called for hearing at Paducah, Texas, November 3, 1949 at which time evidence and statements were presented in favor of and opposition to the granting of the application based upon such evidence and statements the Commission, is of the opinion and finds the application should be granted.

"It is therefore ordered by the Railroad Commission of Texas that the Quannah, Acme & Pacific Railway company be, and it is hereby authorized to discontinue the operation of its passenger trains Nos. 1 and 2, between Quannah, Texas and Floydada, Texas. Signatures are: W. J. Murray, Jr., chairman, Olin Culbertson and Ernest O. Thompson, with attest by O. D. Hyndman, secretary."

# High Plains Farmers Lay Future In Peril

**PUBLISHER'S NOTE:** This item is "lifted" from Wesleyan's column which runs regularly on the front page of the Amarillo News-Matador. Mr. Issard is editor of the Amarillo newspaper and recognized as one of the Southwest's outstanding newsmen.

Last Saturday we were out of town, and we passed up an event here on the High Plains that we think is history-making. Not until it was called to our attention yesterday by Garland Smith, The News farm writer, did we check up on it; and when we did we felt like sending up a great cheer.

**IT HAPPENED LAST FRIDAY** down in Dimmitt. Two farmers, just back from Washington where they checked into the government's cotton program, reported their findings to a hundred or so other farmers at a meeting in the Castro County courthouse.

These men are Posey Cunningham...

ham of Dimmitt, former county judge, and Curtis Traweck of Hereford. The stand they took indicates that American agriculture will not be completely socialized without a fight.

Here are some of the things these men said, as reported by Farm Writer Smith in The News:  
Mr. Traweck: "Unless farm administration is placed in the hands of the people at home, we face complete socialization. We don't realize how close we are to socialization right now."  
"The bureaucratic way of thinking is partly responsible for the injustices to new growers under the present allotment law. Mathematical mumbo-jumbo would work fine if people were a bunch of numbers. But we're still individuals."  
"Let's get away from this something-for-nothing philosophy. Let's run this program on a county and precinct basis. If we don't get local control, it won't be long until the farmer will have no land in this county to call his own."

Judge Cunningham: "Before the depression the farmer wanted nothing free—nothing he had not earned. He twisted his conscience some to accept the handouts during hard times. Today he would be better off without these little payments he tracts into the PMA office to get."  
The PMA is the Production Marketing Administration.  
"The practice of taking government payment for conservation practices we ought to do anyway, is going to kill our farm program. Labor and the

The 40th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America will be observed Feb. 6 to 12 in every part of the nation by more than 2,300,000 boys and adult leaders. "Strengthen Liberty" is the birthday theme. The Boy Scouts' "Crusade to Strengthen the Arm of Liberty" continues through 1950. During Boy Scout Week, Units will hold "Crusade Night" meetings when 1949 Crusade Awards will be presented. Representing the 12 Scout Regions, 12 outstanding Boy Scouts will make a "Re-

port to the Nation" at Washington, D.C., where the Movement was incorporated Feb. 8, 1910. They will also take part in an impressive ceremony at Independence Hall in Philadelphia. The highlight of 1950 will be the Second National Jamboree which will see 40,000 Scouts and Leaders camping together at Valley Forge, Pa., from June 30 to July 6, including Scouts of other lands. Since 1910 more than 16,500,000 boys and men have been identified with the Boy Scouts of America.

big city fellow will gang up on us. There aren't enough farmers to beat them."

These statements call to our mind a term used in aviation. It is "point of no return." When an airplane starts across the ocean it reaches a point where it cannot turn back because of lack of fuel—a point from which it can only continue ahead.

Price supports and other federal aid have become an inescapable part of American agriculture. But farmers are approaching the point of no return

—the imaginary line beyond which there would be no turning back from complete socialization. If they cross this line, they are sunk.

The British farmer has passed the point of no return. Today he cannot call his produce his own. He cannot even sell his land un-

less the government approves and sets a price on it. In short, Socialism has caught up with him and there's no turning back.

**UNLESS THE AMERICAN FARMER**, of his own accord, puts a halt to the growing federal regimentation of agriculture, he may slip past the point of no return without knowing it. Unless, as Farmer Traweck says, the farmer can get more control of his activities back on the local level, the Socialists—certain bright young men of Washington who claim they know best about what a man should do with his farm—will take over.

And so, more power to real farmers like Curtis Traweck and Posey Cunningham, who see where we are heading and who are determined that their children and grandchildren shall continue to call their land their own.

#### About Water

Have several letters and some engineering reports on the underground water situation hereabouts. R. L. Cross, the agricultural agent of the Santa Fe here in Amarillo, brought over the latest report of the Texas Board of Water Engineers on the South Plains ground water situation.

**SINCE THE THEORY WAS RAISED** in a letter to this column that the South Plains water sands are recharged by runoff

from the New Mexico mountains, a chart in this new report is of interest. It shows the water strata on a line running south-east from the Canadian River above Tucumcari through Plainview to Roaring Springs. According to this chart, the direction of movement of ground water is northwest from the Texas-New Mexico line—sloping toward the Canadian River; but becomes southeast from Garcia Lake, just over the line in Texas. This would indicate that mountain runoff does not directly supply the Texas South Plains sands.

100% perfect. Of the taxes collected 52% is set aside for sinking funds to retire city indebtedness which includes water system bonds, street improvement bonds and waterworks warrants.

None of the above tax money goes to retire the sewer system and water department improvement bonds. This issue of \$95,000 is a revenue issue (included purchase of sewer system and expansion of water and sewer systems) and is being retired out of revenue from the sewer system. Revenue from the sewer system has shown an increase since its purchase by the city altho rates were reduced 50¢ per month per customer immediately after it was acquired.

**Budget Is Adopted**

A budget was adopted Monday night by the council for all departments under city government. Salaries which total \$1,000 per month were left unchanged (include city secretary, water superintendent, sanitation department, night watchman, and council).

Total revenue for the city in 1949 was approximately \$43,000.

The amount includes all taxes, water and sewer revenue and the city's "plumbing business" which last year had a gross of \$2,000, and the voluntary payments to the clean-up service. Revenue for the clean-up truck paid cost of labor and operation of truck, or a total of about \$3,000.

The budget adopted at the Monday night meeting allows the same "fixed expense" of last year and some increase in most departments.

Other action of the Monday night meeting included the calling of an election for April 4th at which time a mayor, two councilmen, a secretary and marshal will be elected. An audit of books was also ordered and a more detailed report of city business will be published at a later date.
