Contributions at Harvest Festival Exceed Set Goal

Contributions made Sunday at the Harvest Festival Thanksgiving worship service of the First United Methodist Church, exceeded the budget goal beyond highest expectations, according to Rev. Douglas Gossett, pastor. Approximately 120 persons were present for the service and more than 100 stayed for the church dinner following.

The Rev. Vernon O'Kelly, pastor from Balls, spoke on "Rebuilding the Temple." In this he recounted the longing in the hearts of the exiles to return to Jerusalem where they could worship God freely. "It has been America's faith that has made it great," he declared.

He also recounted some of the things which the benevolent giving of the church is doing for others in the country and the world.

Roaring Springs Masons Pay Honor To Melton Thacker

THINGS were different 50 years ago when Melton Thacker and his brother, Guy, (now deceased) joined the Masonic Lodge No. 1171 at Roaring Springs. The lodge hall was in the second story of a wooden building, which later burned, and entrance was gained by an outside stairway.

Approximately 50 persons registered Monday night in the brick building lodge hall to pay tribute to Mr. Thacker as he was awarded a 50-year membership pin. The pin was placed on his coat lapel by his wife, Lillian. An identical emblem was presented to Mrs. Guy Thacker during the ceremony.

"The influence of a good man is lasting," declared Furman Vinson Grand Senior Deacon of the Grand Lodge of Texas, in an impressive address. "The shadow of a good man extends indefinitely and there is no shadow without light." He based his remarks on the Scripture and from famous writers. "Melton Thacker has cast a wide shadow over this community," he declared.

The meeting honoring Mr. Thacker was opened with a prayer by J. R. Whitworth of Matador. Worshipful Master John Stokes of Afton conducted the ceremony. Those attending included Masons, their wives and friends. Refreshments of cake, coffee and hot chocolate were served in the dining room adjoining the lodge hall.

City to Close for Thanksgiving

Matador will close today in observance of the holiday. Most places of business will not open Thanksgiving Day according to a partial survey made by the Tribune.

The First State Bank, West Texas Utilities, county and city offices will be closed, as well as most stores. County Judge Forrest Campbell said the courthouse would be closed Thursday but will be open Friday.

The three cafes in town will remain open, and probably part or all of the filling stations. Matador schools will have an extra day, dismissing for Thursday and Friday.

The secret of the peace of God was made manifest in a message of thanksgiving Sunday night at the First Baptist Church, as Rev. Douglas Gossett, pastor of First United Methodist Church addressed the congregation, in a union Thanksgiving Service.

"We have thought of thanksgiving as a duty — something we ought to do," he said. "Giving thanks is so much more than this... it is an attitude which helps us in so many ways."

Using the scriptures from Philippians 4, verses 4-7, Rev. Gossett stressed the importance of beginning all prayers with thanks to God for every blessing. Quoting the prophet, "Rejoice in the Lord alway; and again I say, Rejoice," he suggested that prayer with thanksgiving helps in the individual's relationship with God, with others and with himself.

"It's a wonderful thing to feel thankful," he declared, "thankful for life, friends and loved ones, a job to do, for home, the church and its efforts for good; thankful for missionaries and hope for peace, and most of all, thankful for Jesus. We should be thankful for being thankful... And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus."

Special music was a solo by Wayne DuBose, Baptist Music and Youth Director who led the choir and congregation in hymns in keeping with the occasion.

Incentive Aid Will Pay Off Proposed New School Bonds

If the Motley County voters approve the new school financing plan which is being proposed in an election December 2, the state's incentive aid will pay off the indebtedness without raising taxes and without raising property valuation.

Incentive Aid is the money saved by the state in operating one school system instead of three in the county, through the Motley County Independent School District. A conservative estimate of the aid is \$575,000 over the ten year period. By using the incentive aid to maximum advantage, the district can pay the principal and interest on the proposed bonds with little or no increase in tax, depending on how many bonds are authorized.

Proposition (1) which covers the adoption of section 20.04 of the Texas Election Code, must be voted favorably in order for any bonds to be authorized. It will be used to separate the district's maintenance tax from any taxes required for bond principal and interest. It is separated so that the necessity for future increases in assessed valuation is reduced.

The district's bonds will receive up to 3/4 of 1% better interest rate if voted under the Education Code (\$9,000). The entire financing plan, including \$565,000 in new bonds, can be carried without increase in assessed valuation.

The \$140,000 in bonds to be voted under proposition (3), provides for a new gymnasium, which, combined with the new school facilities would make a total of \$565,000 and will require an increase in taxes, but only 9c in the \$100 assessed valuation. This is an increase of 6% in taxes.

If only the \$450,000 in bonds in proposition (2) are authorized for the construction of a new building and approved, the present tax rate of \$1.50 would remain unchanged. If all propositions are adopted the tax will increase 9c, an increase of 6%. As an example, a taxpayer who pays \$100 annually in school taxes, would pay \$106.

Opening quarter, Matador halfback Clede Campbell stole a Mustang pass and the Matadors advanced to within an eyelash of the goal line only to have the Mustang defense smother a Matador fumble. Halfback Wied put the Mustangs on the board when he went across the double stripes from 1 yard out and then Fields sent the P.A.T. through the uprights.

In the second quarter, both teams battered up and down the field. Matadors' quarterback, Steve Stevens enveloped a Mustang flying pigskin but time ran out and the half closed at 7-0. The Happy Cowboys are the district 2B champs with an 8-2 record. The Matador Matadors posted a 3-4-1 season record and are losing four senior lettermen.

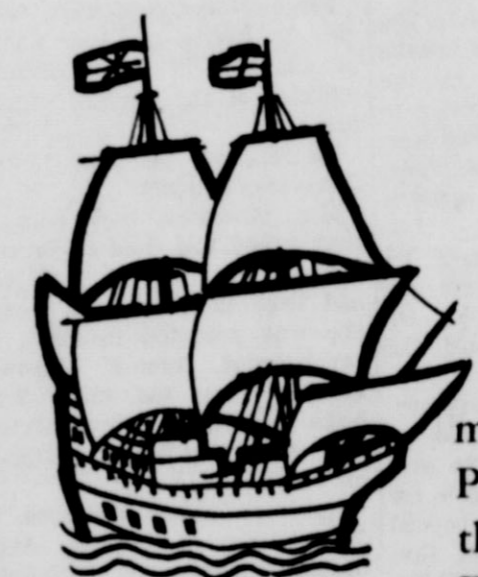

V. V. Scott, head basketball coach, would be well satisfied if Matador exchanged places with McAdoo in the winner's circle on the final rating chart.

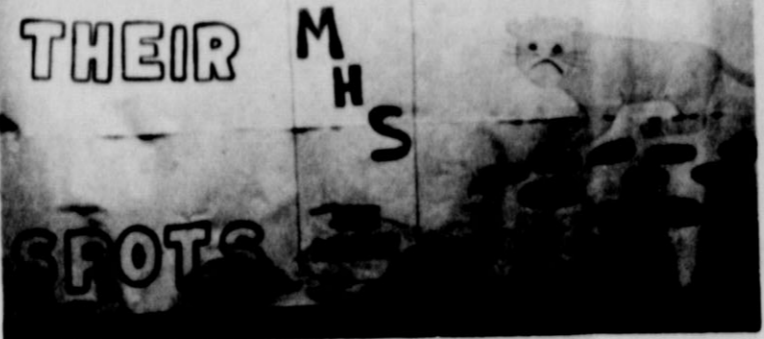

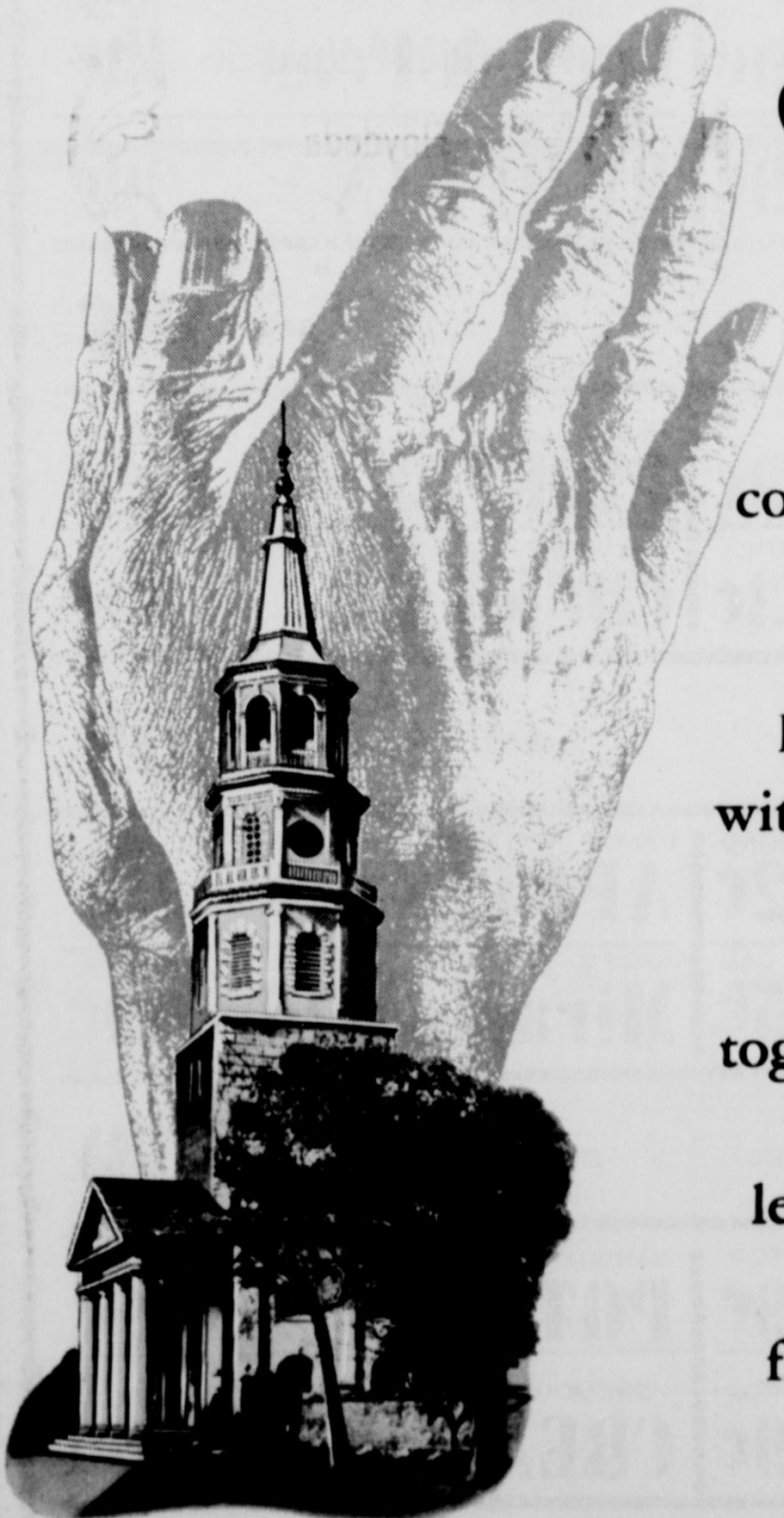

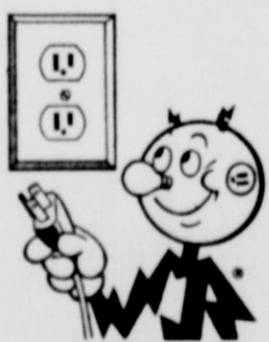
