

At present, the county has only 11 districts ince Roaring Springs absorbed Flag Springs and Darden Canyon in 1944 and hopes to spread its tax burden thinner over a greater area by bringing the five students registered in the Bird community to Roaring Roaring Springs after the June 29 election.

Loss of more than 50% of the county's scholastics is attributed o the decided shift of populaion to urban areas, evident hroughout the south. Mechanized farming is believed to be the chief cause of population shift. Modern farming equipment makes it possible for one man to farm 500 acres in this area with greater ease than 100 acres was farmed 20 years ago.
