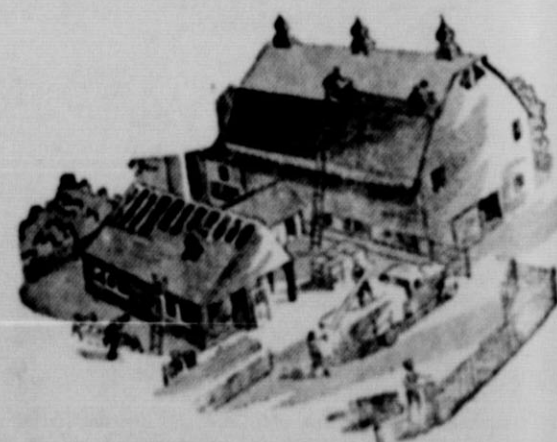

Many Placed By Employment Office

635 people of whom 479 were males contacted the USES Office during the month of January, 1945, to obtain information or to apply for work.

Of the number applying for work, 80 were placed locally and 111 were referred to out of town plants designated as producing important war materials and urgently needed workers.

73 veterans called at the office, 35 wanted jobs and the remainder desired information on other veterans' rights. 31 were placed in employment and 20 were directed to the proper agency for the desired assistance.

The USES office has noted an increase in interest in the essentiality of jobs and a desire on the part of the applicants for essential employment.

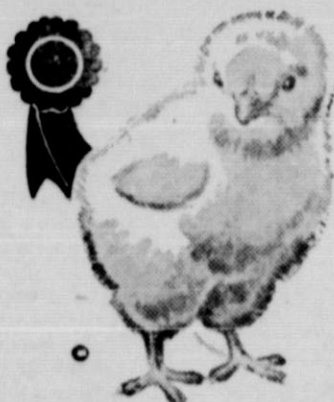
