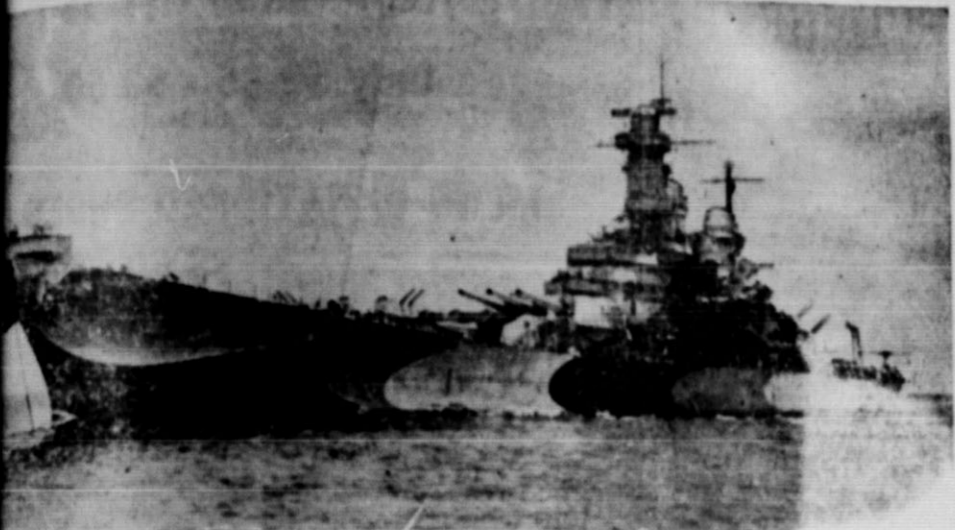

## MISSOURI IS SCENE OF JAP SURRENDER



Japan formally yielded to the overwhelming might of the Allies, Sunday September 2, (Saturday night, U. S. Time) in a solemn surrender ceremony aboard the mighty battleship Missouri in Tokyo Bay, restoring peace once more to a war-ravaged world. Proudly bearing the name of the home state of President Harry S. Truman, the fighting USS Missouri was named by General of the Army Douglas MacArthur, Supreme Allied Commander, as the locale of the formal ending of the war in the Pacific.

China and had raged almost three years and nine months for the United States and Great Britain.

First was Admiral Nimitz for the United States, then the representatives of China, the United Kingdom, Russia, Australia, Canada, France, Netherlands and New Zealand.

After the last signature had been affixed, MacArthur turned and presented the surrender pens to Lt. Gen. Johathan M. Wainwright, hero of Corregidor, and Lt. Gen. A. E. Percival, British defender of Singapore when it was overrun by the Japanese. On behalf of Emperor Hirohito, Foreign Minister Shigemitsu signed for the government and General Yoshijiro Umezu for the imperial general staff.

## Several Veterans Receive Discharge

Sgt. Carl D. Mize is among several veterans of World War 2 who have received Honorable Discharge from the armed forces the past week.

Sgt. Mize served with the 184th Infantry, 7th Division, in the Aleutians, Marshalls, Kwajalein, Leyte, Okinawa and at Siapan. In addition to the Purple Heart award, received for wounds April 17, on Okinawa, he wears the Good Conduct medal, and Asiatic Pacific campaign ribbon with 4 combat stars. He was overseas 24 months, returning home last week. He is the son of former residents, Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Mize, now of Abilene.

Cpl. Clois L. Scott and S/Sgt. James E. (Buck) Scott, brothers, received Honorable Discharges the same week recently.

Cpl. Scott entered the army on Dec. 6, 1941 and served three years overseas, returning to the states April 22, this year. He was in Australia, New Guinea and Biak Island. He has four battle stars on his Asiatic Pacific ribbon, the Purple Heart, Good Conduct, Combat badge and the American Defense ribbons. He served with the 41st Division.

Sgt. Scott entered the army June 16, 1942 and served nine months overseas with the 87th Division, in England, France, Belgium and Germany. He has three battle stars on his European theater ribbon, the Good Conduct and Combat Infantry badge. He returned to the states July 11, 1945.

They both worked in or near Matador before entering the service, and both returned this week for a visit with their sister, Mrs. Ward Rattan.

T/5 Charles M. Russell and his wife visited here the past week with his father, W. M. Russell after receiving an Honorable Discharge August 15th, from Ft. Bliss, Texas. He was in the service 5 year and overseas 2 years, 5 months. He participated in the campaigns of Southern France, Rome-Arno, Naples-Foggia, the North Apennines, Po Valley and Rhineland Central Europe. Decorations and citations include American Defense Service Medal, Good Conduct, European-Africa and Middle Eastern Service medals.

Sgt. Brady T. Glenn, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Glenn, Roaring Springs, received an Honorable Discharge August 28 from Ft. Sam Houston, after spending the past year and 10 months overseas. He has been in the service over 4 years.

He participated in campaigns on New Guinea, Bismark Archipelago, Luzon and South Philippines, and decorations include Combat Infantryman Badge, Asiatic ribbon with 4 bronze stars, American Defense Service medal and the Philippine Liberation medal with 2 bronze stars.

## Service Officer Named

Bryan C. Handley of Paducah has been appointed as Veteran's County Service Officer to serve Cottle, Motley and King counties. He will be in his office in Matador from eight a. m. to five p. m. on Monday and Tuesday of each week; in Guthrie the first and third Wednesday of each month, and the remainder of the time in Paducah.

Mr. Handley attended a school for Contact Representatives in Waco, supervised by the Veterans' Administration and also received a two-week course of instruction on Veterans' Affairs and Benefits and accompanying forms from the Assistant Director, Veterans' State Office.

His principal duties will be to assist Veterans and their dependents in filing claims, to act in an advisory capacity on the "G. I. Loan", insurance and any other problems that might arise.

Mr. Handley will be located in an office in the courthouse until other arrangements for quarters, possibly in the Legion hut, are made.

Two cursing, roughly-dressed bandits robbed the First State Bank at Morton, Cochran County, Wednesday after forcing employees and customers into a vault at pistol point, while a third stood guard beside a maroon automobile left running at the curb.

Amount taken was reported as being \$17,692.46 in an account appearing in the Lubbock Avalanche.

Douglas Meador, editor of the Motley Tribune, whose office is next door east of the bank, was one of the first persons to enter the bank after the robbery, according to the Avalanche, and ran into the bank to find employees locked in the vault.
