Both Courtney and Brooks were treated at Traweek Hospital for injuries received.

Brooks had served a jail sentence in Albuquerque, N. Mexico, for burglary, and was under 2-year suspended sentence for burglary at Midland, Texas, and also two felony indictments for burglary at Tulia.


