Heavy mite infestations in grain sorghum have been reported in South Plains counties, so if they do appear in your field, the following nformation should be of value. The Banks grass mite or white mite has a life cycle of 2 weeks. Each female is capable of laying 200 to 250 eggs, and heavy populations can build up in a relatively short period. With the cooler weather we have been having, a little longer time will be required to complete the cycle, therefore heavy populations should not develop as quickly as they have in the past.
