Long before white settlers came Long before white settlers came to
Texas, the Tejus, Apache, and Comanche Indians held this stately oak in reverence. Love potions were brewed from its leaves. If a tea made from its leaves was drank by a warrior under a fullmoon, he would return safely from war. The Treaty Oak
tree is the sole survivor of a grove of oaks, known as the Council Oaks, under which Stephen F. Austin signed the first boundary agreement with the Indians. In 1927 the short-trunked tree with, nobble crown and wide spreading branches was nomi-
nated to the American Forestry Association's Hall of Fame for trees in Washing ton, C.D., where it was pronounced the most perfect specimen of a North Ameri can tree. In 1937, the tree's owner wanted to cut it down, but citizen interest caused

HOW NUTRITIOUS ARE TV DINNERS FOR TOTS?
With the advent of the microwave oven and the increasing number of women working outside the home, it was just a
matter of time before it happened -- TV dinners for tots. Using packaging with pzazz and cartoon "spokesmen", these products are attracting a lot of atten A recent study of the Americ A recent study of the American Fro-
zen Food Institute indicates that 62 perzen Food Institute indicates that 62 per
cent of children under 13 years of ag prepare one or more meals each week by themselves. Furthermore, 38 percent of
mothers surveyed said they allow their
children between 5 and 8 years of age to
use a microwave oven; this figure jumps use a microwave oven; this figure jumps
to 48 percent from the 9 to 12-year old group.
Ift's never too early to start kids on a lifelong plan of good eating. In general, to allow for growth, calories shouldn't be restricted. If obesity is a concern, the
emphasis should be on increasing physical activity, not limiting food intake. While fat should not be restricted for youngsters below the age of two, the
National Cholesterol Education Program National Cholesterol Education Program
recommends a limit of 30 percent to 35 recommends a limit of 30 percent to 35
percent of total calories from fat for children, to help prevent heart disease later in life. Though there are no specific recommendations for sodium, many Amer1cans, including children, consume more increase blood pressure in children witha family history, it makes sense for kids to go easy on the salt shaker.
With these guidelines in mind, a
comparison of 21 entrees and dinners comparison of 21 entrees and dinners
(Environmental Nutrition Newsletter, October, 1990) made especially for kids, showed that most of the children's products provided between 510 and 750 milligrams of sodium per serving. Not surpris-
ingly, for some of the fat content was also ngly, for some of the fat content was also
very high, especially those that contain items like fried chicken and fish nuggets. The dinners surveyed ranged from 7 percent to 47 percent of calories from fat. Cankidsconsume TV dinners and still
have a nutritious diet? Here are some suggestions for minimizing the damage of convenience-type dinners while maximizing their nutritional value:

juices or milk (low-fat milk for kids over 2 years of age).
- Don't rely on TV dinners too often. Just because they're prepared at home doesn'tmake them nutritous. Somekid's fast-food meals. Futhermore, some nutritionists suggest that finicky eating habits might be prevented ifchildren don'texpect special treatment at meal time and be come accustomed to eating what every ne else in the family eats.
Kid's TV dinners can be an occasional meal. Just be sure tochoose carefully.
