DDT's Effect Varies With Insect & User's Know-How. Housewives Told

"Don't try to use DDT as an all purpose insecticide. For use against each insect DDT requires a different application." That was the advice given to the nation's house. wives this week by Dr. Heber C. Donohoe, research director and entomologist of the Peterman Laboratories and former U. S. Dept. of Agriculture specialist, who added, 'And it's a good thing to remember that DDT has little or no effect at all on certain insect species."

DDT has enjoyed wide notoriety following its development by the Army and many persons have felt that merely using the product would bring a speedy end to all their insect problems, the scientist stated. It doesn't work that easily. DDT requires careful handling if the best, or even satisfactory results are to be obtained.

In the case of roaches, DDT powder or liquid formulas will not kill these pests any more effectively than will several good products, although they may remain effective for a somewhat longer period after treatment. Most dust preparations require 2 to 7 days to finish off a roach. DDT, added to some of these in proper quantities, will speed up the kill. Roaches are destroyed both by direct dusting and walking through effective powders, chiefly through surface contact. Powders should be dusted into crevices and placed in unbroken lines in front of hiding places and in areas fre-

quented by roaches. Housewives who study their insect problems and select insecticides designed for specific purposes will have won half the battle against undesirable pests. The other half may be won by rigid adherence to the application instructions on the





Those who grew black-eye peas last year averaged approximately 2,000 lbs. per acre of green peas, and 200 to 300 lbs. of dry peas, on dry land farms - We believe this can be doubled under irrigation.

The price paid in West Texas for green peas last season, by East Texas canners, averaged 3¢ to 3ic per pound, and for dry peas 8e to 12c per pound. Green peas were trucked more than 500 miles away for canning purposes.

Based on these figures, a number of farmers made \$75.00 per acre on peas, net profits, plus \$1.50 per acre conservation payment by AAA for growing a summer legume crop. From all indications there will be a stronger market this season than last, as other canning factories will be in this market for peas.

What Crop Can You Grow On The Plains That Will Show A Better Return Per Acre?

Hale County Foods, of Plainview, are interested in buying your pea crop. We will start canning pear about August 15th, and will pay the market price throughout the canning season. Peas should be plant ed after July 1st for the canning factory market. We are assured plenty of labor from South Texas for harvesting peas this fall.

For more information, regarding seed, inoculation, labor, etc., get in touch with us and let us explain what it means to YOU to plant peas this year. Be sure to see your county AAA office to qualify for the conservation payments.
