### Crowell To Invade Roaring Springs Baseball Diamond

Trying their teeth on the tough ones first, Roaring Springs Yellowjackets will open the baseball season Friday (March 17, 3 p. m.) when they meet the Crowell class A Wildcats on the Roaring Springs diamond. Altho the Yellowjackets will field a team composed mostly of last year's district championship players, tough-sliding is expected against the Wildcats.

The Yellowjackets have augmented their pitching staff with high school freshman Alex Barron, providing much-needed reserve power on the mound. The Yellowjackets will play a return game at Crowell, Tuesday, March 21.

### Movement Sweeping Texas As Half Of Counties Organize

HONEYMOON of a natural gas line lobbyists in Austin may be on the wane. Hundreds of thousands of Texans are shaking off the apathy in regard to the state's almost priceless natural resources depletion. They are weighing the tragic situation which permits Detroit residents and industries to burn Texas natural gas at a cheaper rate than in many Texas towns in the gas fields.

A small group of interested Motley county citizens, representing every precinct, last night heard Robert G. Dillard executive director of the Texas Good Roads Association make a thought-provoking address. The meeting was held in the District Court room at the courthouse.

Before Mr. Dillard departed Motley county had formed its own chapter of the association with County Judge C. W. Giesecke Jr. as President, Mayor Douglas Meador and vice-president and banker Elmer Stearns as secretary-treasurer. Every member present joined the association and also became a member-soliciting representative.

The dynamic speaker, armed with charts, photostatic letters, facts and figures, made an astounding address. The large chart showing the many pipe lines extending from Texas to the great cities of the north and east, looked something like a medical chart with the lines as arteries pumping away forever the life blood of Texas' natural resources, and almost tax free.

He summarized the great gas cartel which is waxing fat on profits from Texas gas burned in homes and factories in New York, Detroit, Chicago and thousands of eastern and northern cities. He pointed out that a tax of 1¢ per 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas, which would cost the average home user about 65¢ per year, would produce \$52,000,000 annually in taxes. After deducting the \$12,000,000 which would go to schools, Texans would have \$40,000,000 left to build and maintain the 165,000 miles of rural roads which at present are a threat to Texas' future.

He said that the value of farm land is set by the land's accessibility to improved roads and that improved roads to the farms, grasslands and timber lands of Texas would aid in securing the future against the time when agriculture must again support the burden of (continued on back page)

AUSTIN, March 11—Railroad Commissioner Olin Culberson will run for governor on a platform hitting "run-away" cost of state government. The stocky state official announced his candidacy Saturday, formally telling Texans what most have known for a long time. Culberson, 63 years old, said his campaign actually has been under way for about a year and he has organizations in 134 counties.

"Firmly believing that a change in attitude is necessary toward the wasteful operation and run-away cost of our state government, I am formally announcing my candidacy for governor," his statement said.

Culberson said he would open his campaign in Hillsboro, his former home, in May. Culberson's legal residence is now Edna, where he owns a dry goods store. He is a former railroad employe, county clerk and county judge of Hill, and has served on the railroad commission since 1941.

## IN MEXICO

# Man Claims He Examined Disk Wreck

LOS ANGELES, Calif.—A Los Angeles businessman told reporters Thursday he saw an ultra-streamlined flying saucer in Mexico last week, wrecked on a mountainside.

He was told, he said, that a man 23 inches tall died in the crash, and that his body has been embalmed for scientific study.

There was no confirmation of the account from any source in Mexico, and the Air Force in Washington said it hadn't heard of it.

Ray L. Dimmick, sales manager of the Apache Powder Co., described the metal in the ship as being of tremendous hardness. He said he was taken to the scene by which crashed about three months ago, he continued.

The saucer was powered by two motors," said Dimmick, 53, widely-known amateur golfer hereabouts and considered an expert on chemicals, explosives and metals.

"It was about forty-six feet in diameter, built of a strange material resembling aluminum."

Dimmick declined further discussion, except to say that high Mexican officials believe the machine came from some other planet, and that top United

## States military officials have viewed it.

"I think the government ought to make its position clear," he continued. "If it doesn't want to disclose these things for security reasons, why not say so? If it feels it is unwise to make the information public for fear of panic, there should be some way found to handle the situation diplomatically."

Reminded that the Air Force announced last December it was dropping its investigation of flying saucers because of a preponderance of evidence that they do not exist, Dimmick said: "I'm big enough to take the consequences of what I've said and stand my ground."

 taxes—when the natural resources are exhausted. Mr. Dillard pointed out that the one cent per 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas which the consumer would pay would be exactly the same amount of tax which the recent legislature imposed on Texas smokers for each package of cigarettes.  
 He said improved rural roads is the number one problem of Texas agriculture and that the Rural Roads Association (all members work without salaries) is merely an organization of groups which have at various times over half a century tried to secure aid for the critical situation.  
 Mr. Dillard pointed out the need of improved rural roads for school buses, mail carriers, farmers, ranchers and Texas' future security. He said at the present time Texas may lose its great storehouse of natural gas within 20 to 35 years altho the present reserve is estimated at 99 trillion cubic feet. He said 57 trillion cubic feet of that gas is already contracted for sale to out-of-Texas users.  
 Mr. Dillard said the fight is a hard one and requires the support of every Texan to insist on his senator and representative that the just tax be supported. "Then," he declared, "Motley county will have in the neighborhood of \$100,000 annually for better rural roads as will the


