Other cadet officers named were Marvin G. Twenhafel of Mercedes, adjutant, captain; Raymond C. Giesecke of Matador.

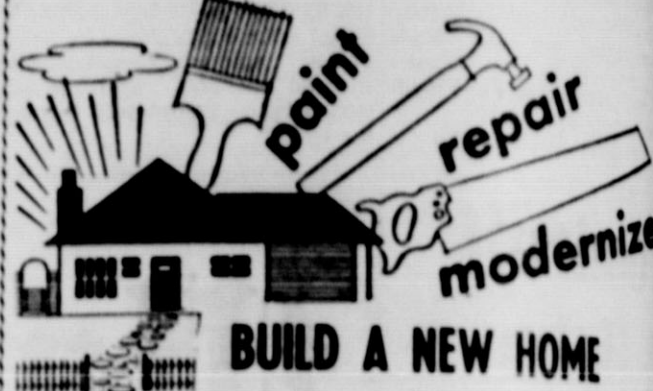

Before the search ended Tuesday, two or more agents in twenty-one of the FBI's fifty-two bureaus over the nation were at work on the case. Agents worked in Texas, Kentucky, Missouri, Indiana, Arizona, Oklahoma and Pennsylvania.

Two Dallas FBI agents, disguised as fishermen, spent days with rods and reels at Possum Kingdom, making one fishing camp after another when it was learned Whitaker had gone on a fishing trip and might be hiding there.

Earlier in the summer Whitaker had worked with a carnival making Texas stands. He left it at McKinney in July in the nick of time. Agents missed him there by two days at a boarding house where he and his wife had sung religious hymns in the evening with the family operating the establishment.

Agents mingled with carnival crowds as the show moved on to Alvarado, Leonard, Sherman and Round Rock. They pitched

hoops in the pitch shows, they threw balls at the cats, they talked with the carnival hustlers but found no further trace of Whitaker.

The couple's relatives in Oklahoma and in Missouri were constantly shadowed and even friends and acquaintances of the outlaw were followed.

The FBI and Sheriff Decker knew the kind of car Whitaker was driving. They knew it bore Arizona license plates. Agents trailed this car over much of the nation and they talked with many people who had been in contact with the wanted man, but until Tuesday they were always a little too far behind him.

Whitaker still had the car when arrested, but he also had made a \$900. down payment on a new car.
