

Matador Ranch Directors Considering Offer

Directors of the Matador Land Cattle Company are considering an offer of £7,000,000 for 800 acres of ranchland in Texas Panhandle.

General Manager and Director of the firm. The offer was disclosed at the meeting of shareholders held in Dundee, Scotland, April 16.

An excerpt from Mr. MacKenzie's letter containing the statement, is as follows: "A definite offer has now been made

for the shares of the Matador Land and Cattle Company, Ltd. This news, given to shareholders after the annual meeting in Dundee, April 16, has come after several months of speculation about the future of the company's 800,000 acres of ranchland in the Panhandle district

of Texas. Just before the 20 or so shareholders dispersed, the Chairman Mr. W. D. Macdougall, rose to report the offer. He mentioned no figure and said the board had no time to consider it. Mr. Macdougall afterwards told a reporter: "These people took four

or five months to make their offer, and we will naturally need some time to consider it. It will have to be given very careful thought." It would be some time before they make up their minds he said. He added that the American report that the offer was of £7,000,000 was very near the

mark." Mr. MacKenzie's comment on the statement was: "As stated above, no decision has been reached by the board on the offer. Should the offer be passed by the board of directors, the final decision would rest with the shareholders, and this will take time." Mr. MacKenzie had previously promised the Tribune it would be advised immediately on any public announcement regarding negotiations for sale of the Matador shares and the letter was in keeping with the promise.

Pal Walter Martin was born in Hillsboro, Texas, September 25, 1872 and was married to Miss Lilla Gordy, October 26, 1899, in Waco. To this union nine children were born, five of whom survive. They are Walter Martin of Kermit, Mrs. Rosa Clawson of Vernon, Mrs. Addie Murphy of Whiteflat, Mrs. Lilla Spray of Matador and Mrs. Millie Price of Rising Star.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin moved to Whiteflat community in 1891 and lived on their farm about four miles northwest for over half a century. They moved to Vernon in 1942 and Mrs. Martin died four years later. Mr. Martin was a charter member of the Whiteflat Baptist church, and was active in the welfare of his community during the struggling pioneer days.

TOTAL of 18,240 pounds of excellent beef was displayed on hoof here Saturday at the 9th Annual Junior Livestock Show.

Dayton Graham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Graham took the top prize of \$40 for the Grand Champion steer, but Pat Reeves, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Reeves walked off with a total of \$116 in prize money. He had a winner in every classification of the show with the exception of fat hogs.

Two girls, Kelly Ann Green, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Green of Roaring Springs and Mary Folley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Folley of the Flomot community, invaded the Flomot show for the first time. Miss Green won the second prize in the heavy steer classification and a \$30 prize. She also received the \$15 award for showmanship. Miss Folley received a \$20 cash award for fifth place in the heavy calf division.

Pat Reeves showed the Reserve Champion calf. Local chapter of the FFA carried home a total of \$230.50 in prize money. Reeves received fourth place in light calves, light calves, first in light calves and reserve championship. Chapter President Charles Keith received \$42.50 for 3rd in light calves and 6th in heavy calves. James Graham received 3rd in heavy calves and a total of \$25 in prize money. Calvin Cooper received a total of \$22 for 8th in gilts and 6th and 9th in fat hogs. James Ketchersid and Ray Carman each received \$10 and Warren Tilson received \$5 in awards.

Cattle Bring \$6,068.19
The 20 head of Motley county 4-H and FFA calves were sold Tuesday on the Amarillo market for a total of \$6,068.19, according to County Agent Rufus Emons.

Dayton Graham's Grand Champion calf brought 40.25c per pound for a total of \$370.30 for the animal. Pat Reeves' Reserve Champion calf sold for 37.25c per pound for a total of \$283.10. Top winner in the awards, young Reeves also realized the most from the sale of cattle. He sold three head for a total of \$883.10.

Total sale weight of the calves was 16,345, an average of 817 pounds per calf. Average shrinkage per calf was 17 pounds. One of Charles Keith's calves gained 15 pounds while one belonging to Pat Reeves lost 85 pounds. The total average price per pound was 37.065c and the calves brought an average of \$303.41 each. Motley county calves sold above the average of 10 other counties offering calves at the sale.

Detailed results of awards in both divisions of the calf and hog show will be published in next week's Tribune.

Wasteful Federal Spending Lowers American Housing Standards Local Lumberman Believes

Wasteful Federal spending for unessential non-defense purposes will lower American housing standards unnecessarily during the emergency, according to Joe E. Campbell, local lumber and building materials dealer and member of the Public Affairs Committee of the National Retail Lumber Dealers Association.

"In the first place, the increased taxes collected to finance the excessive spending means that the public has that much less to spend on repairing and improving its homes," Mr. Campbell said.

"In addition, because the wasteful spending by the government adds to the inflationary pressure which has been forcing prices up, the government attempts to counteract that pressure by imposing unnecessarily harsh credit restrictions on new home purchases, thus preventing many families from acquiring a new home."

"It is true that shortages of critical materials will require some reduction in housing construction during the emergency. But there obviously is no urgent need for a 40 per cent cutback in new homes, such as has been recommended by the Housing and Home Finance Agency, when production of automobiles and household appliances, which use critical materials almost exclusively, is being cut back considerably less.

"Adoption of conservation methods would enable the building industry to construct at least

80 per cent as many new homes as were built last year with 30 to 40 per cent less critical material, if credit were not so rigidly restricted to offset the extravagant and unnecessary spending for non-military purposes in Washington."

AUSTIN, April 21—Highway slaughter maintained its high rate in Texas last month. The department of public safety to-

day reported 196 killed compared with 175 in March a year ago. This year's traffic fatalities toll soared to 541 compared with 498 in the first three months of 1950 a 9 per cent increase.

Public safety experts estimated this year's final death figure will be 13 per cent above that of 1950, when a record number of men, women and children were killed on Texas highways and streets.

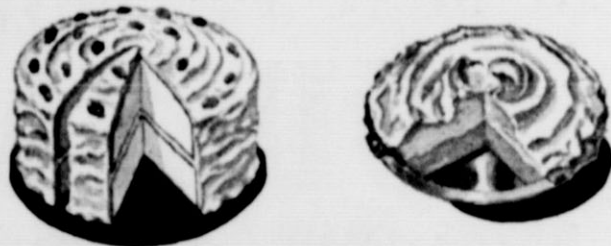

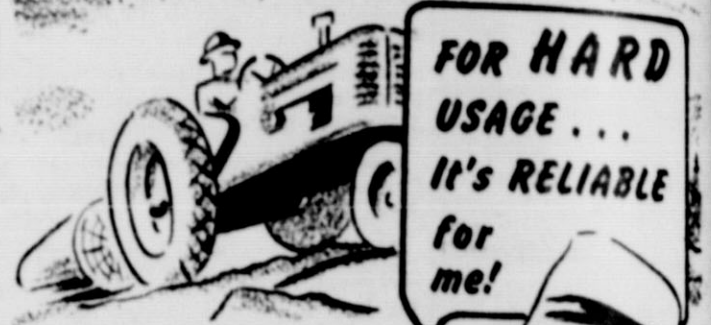

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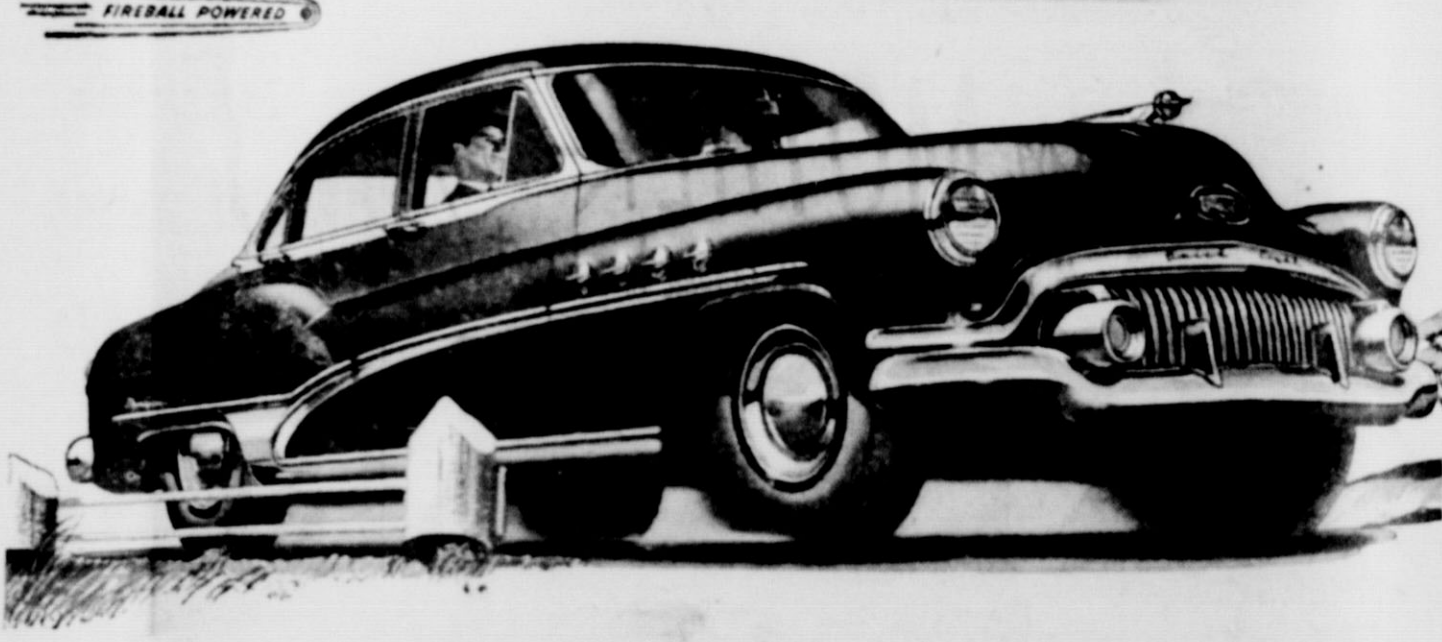
