SEALED PROPOSALS addressed to County Judge C. W. Giesecke, Jr., and Commissioners' Court of Motley County, Texas, for furnishing all necessary materials, machinery, equipment, superintendence and labor for the construction, improvement and repair of certain bridges in the County, and to issue time warrants in payment of a portion of the cost thereof, will be received at the office of the County Clerk at Matador, Texas, until 10:00 o'clock A. M., on the 9th day of October, 1950, and then publicly opened and read.

A CERTIFIED or CASHIER'S CHECK for five per cent (5%) of each bid, made payable without recourse to the order of C. W. Giesecke, Jr., County Judge of Motley County, Texas, must accompany each proposal or bid, as a guarantee that the bidder, if successful, will enter into contract and make bond in accordance with the statute.

A PERFORMANCE BOND in an amount not less than one hundred per cent (100%) of the contract price in respect of such proposed improvements, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the contract, and upon the payment of all persons supplying labor or furnishing materials, will be required, such

BIDDERS are expected to inspect the site of the work and to inform themselves regarding all local conditions.

SPECIFICATIONS covering the work may be examined at the office of the County Clerk at Matador, Texas, and copies may be obtained on deposit of \$25.00. The full amount of the deposit will be refunded to the successful bidder upon execution of contract and furnishing performance bond as above specified, and be returned to all others upon returning said specifications in good condition; otherwise the deposit shall be forfeited.

ATTENTION OF BIDDERS is directed to the provisions of House Bill No. 54, passed by the Forty-third Legislature, at its Regular Session, requiring that not less than the general prevailing rates of per diem wages for work of a similar character in the locality where the work is performed, shall be paid all laborers, workmen and mechanics employed in the construction of public works.

### HOUSING GAINS OUTSTRIP RISE IN POPULATION

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22—The number of Texans has increased 19.6 per cent since 1940, while the number of places for them to live has jumped 33 per cent, the Census Bureau reported Friday.

There are 3.2 Texans for every dwelling unit in the state, the report shows. The 7,672,432 Texans whom the census takers counted last April were living in 2,398,125 dwelling units. Ten years earlier, Texas had 6,414,824 persons living in 1,804,884 units.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Roaring Springs, Texas, on the 14th day of October, 1950, on the propositions and at the place more particularly set forth in the election resolution adopted by the City Council, which is as follows:

**"A RESOLUTION**  
Calling an election on the question of the issuance of \$20,000.00 Waterworks system revenue bonds, \$30,000.00 Sewer system revenue bonds and \$25,000.00 Waterworks system tax bonds.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Roaring Springs, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of the said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned;

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROARING SPRINGS, TEXAS:**

1. That an election be held in said City of Roaring Springs, Texas, on the 14th day of October, 1950, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

**PROPOSITION NO. 1**  
"Shall the City Council of the City of Roaring Springs, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Thirty (30) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate of not to exceed Five (5%) per cent per annum, for the purpose of purchasing, improving and extending the Waterworks System for said City to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's Waterworks and Sewer Systems. Said Bonds, and other Bonds authorized to be issued may be combined into a single issue."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2**  
"Shall the City Council of the City of Roaring Springs, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Thirty (30) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate of not to exceed Five (5%) per cent per annum, for the purpose of constructing a Sewer System for said City, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's Waterworks and Sewer System. Said Bonds, and other Bonds authorized to be issued may be combined into a single issue."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3**  
"Shall the City Council of the City of Roaring Springs, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of Twenty Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the

maximum maturity being not more than Thirty (30) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Five (5%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of purchasing, improving and extending the Waterworks System for said City, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall, within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed directors of said election, to-wit:

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions on each proposition, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on such proposition.

5. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature, supra. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall and at two other public places within said City not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. There being no newspaper published within this City, the Mayor shall cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in the "Matador Tribune", a newspaper published within Motley County and having a general circulation

in the City of Roaring Springs shall be not less than fourteen days prior to the date of said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws generally applicable to general elections.

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### LETTER FROM CHARLES SANDERS TO MOTHER IS WRITTEN NEAR KOREA IN FIGHTING AREA

A letter sent by Charles Sanders to his mother, Mrs. J. F. Hallford of 910 N. Second street, Las Cruces, N. M., will be of interest to friends here, since the Hallfords are former Matador residents, and Charles was born here. The youth is now an electronics man on the USS George Fryer. He graduated from electronics school at Treasure Island, Calif., in March, and after returning home for a month's leave, he reported back to his ship April 5 at San Diego. He graduated from Las Cruces Union High school in 1948 and enlisted in the Navy in March, 1949. He was 19 last December.

The letter, as it appeared in the Las Cruces Citizen, issue of August 24, is as follows:

Dear Mom: I don't know when this letter will be mailed, but it shouldn't be but a few days. We didn't go to Japan after all, but came right on to Korea with the troops and supplies. We got here yesterday (August 2) afternoon about five o'clock. We are tied up at the docks at Pusan or however you spell it. It is a sea-port on the east coast of Korea. The battle front is only about twenty miles from here at the present time. Everything here though is nice and peaceful except for the fact that all the men on the docks carry pistols and rifles. Some of the country around here is beautiful. There are mountains everywhere you look with nice green grass growing all over them. It is hard to realize that men are dying in battle not over 20 or 30 miles away. We got word this morning that one of the men that we brought over (a Marine) was shot while riding to the front on a truck last night. A sniper shot him from the side of the road. I don't know how the rest of them are doing. You don't know how glad I am that I joined the Navy. I may be in the battle, but at least it is on a ship far enough away that I am pretty safe. Tomorrow we should be unloaded

and leave for Japan where I will be completely safe.

The South Korean people here seem to be grateful for the help we are giving them. Last night about 20 or 30 women and men that marched onto the docks waving American flags. They are a funny looking bunch.

Mom, I know you are worried about me being so close to the danger, etc. As you usually worry about the least little thing. There isn't too much to worry over tho. We haven't had the least bit of trouble on the trip over and I doubt if we will on the way back. Besides, I wouldn't have missed this for anything. I will have something to tell about when I get to be an old man. Ha!

(August 9 postscript) Well, we are in Japan now. I went on liberty here last night and intend to go into Tokyo the next liberty. It is only about 50 miles away. I don't know how long we will be here in Japan, but I don't think it will be too long. There is a very good chance we will go back home within a month. I haven't got too much to write as it is time to go to work in about five minutes and I want to get this off. Will write more soon. Charlie.
