Ranch Gets Large Loan

The Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance company has made a \$6,700,000 loan to the Matador ranch, the president of the firm announced Tuesday in Dallas. Peter M. Fraser said the life insurance company made the loan to an American syndicate which recently bought the ranch from the Matador company, a Scottish firm, for \$20 million. He said the money has not been paid out.

De Mille of the Plains) is author and producer and will act as master of ceremonies. In addition to the comedy, satire and laugh-provoking antics of the Lions, "The Mavericks" of Afon (Goodwin children trio) will entertain with the singing of currently popular songs. Music for the show will be provided by Mike Smith and his Panhandle Playboys. The revue embraces in the Lions cast, "South Sea Island Beauties", "The Can-can Girls", and "Selections from the Ballet". Those not accustomed to laughter are warned to remain by their firesides. The show is not suitable for anyone afraid to laugh (and perhaps scream). It is not intended to entertain anyone who does not wish to relax for a little time from the worries and problems of a complex and war-torn world. But for the rest of you, a feast of fun has been prepared. Prize In Every Package During intermissions the can-can "girls" will sell candy under the direction of Lion Henry Ford. Every package of candy (Lions guarantee it to be obnoxious) will contain a prize but some packages will contain in addition, a gift certificate, which will entitle the holder to a order from the stage. The prizes range from a set of six books to a turkey, including a block of stock salt, a bale of hay, candy lubricating oils, canned fruit (pruned) table lamp and other worthwhile items. The value of the prizes is about \$122. If the Lions sell all of their candy they will receive but \$120 (25¢ per package), thus they could give the candy away, keep the prizes and be ahead, but they need the money for the Christmas fund. Admission is \$1 for adults and 50¢ for children. Curtain time is 7:30. The date is Friday night, November 30. No seats are reserved. The first arrivals will be seated first.

 "Chinese prisoners expect to be killed," Thomas said, "because they have been told we will kill them if they are captured. When I was first in combat we captured some prisoners, gave them food, clothing and cigarettes. They expected to be killed. After several days of good treatment and plenty of food, they were sent back to their own lines after promising to tell the other Chinese how they were treated. The men in my outfit 'blew their collective

tops" at the plan, but it worked. Hundreds of Chinese came out and surrendered for several days.
 Thomas' estimate of South Korea as an ally is not very high. He thinks the South Korean is doing better than he has ever done and is satisfied for the war to go on under its present arrangement. The South Korean civilian is getting rich off the black market and will take any thing that is not completely secure and protected.
 Present rate of exchange for the South Korean won is 6,000 to \$1 US military script. A few days before he left Korea Thomas visited a black market and saw a pair of fine nail clippers which sold for 11¢ at the PX. The black market price was 18,000 won or \$3.
