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Matador Residents Helped Organize Floyd County; Attend Reunion Held At Floydada

FLOYDADA, May 28—Floyd County pioneers from near and far gathered here today (Monday) for their 23rd annual reunion and to celebrate the county's 61st birthday.

They heard John Hamilton, Matador, former district attorney, pay tribute to the men and women who "made our present way of life possible."

The speaker paused in his address to ask how many were present when Floyd County was organized in 1890. There were 13 hands raised. He asked how many voted in the organization election. The response was negative.

Pioneers living in the county when it was officially organized were R. A. Thompson, Amarillo; Ned Bowers, Matador; Ed D. Smith, Matador; A. D. Beauchamp, Matador; R. C. Bennett, Lockney; Mrs. Minnie Lewis Smartt, Floydada; J. J. Skiper, Floydada; Mrs. M. H. Ragle, Lockney; Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Scott, Floydada; F. W. Denham, Lubbock; Mrs. E. C. Henry, Floydada; and D. C. Sparks from Arizona.

The old timers elected Irvin Bennett as president, succeeding Omar Parrish; Homer Steen, vice-president, and re-elected Mrs. Maud E. Hollums, secretary and George Fawver, treasurer. Mr. Bennett was unable to be present.

Mr. Hamilton told his audience that they had witnessed the greatest change in the history of man since they came to this area. He said they had seen everything from the covered wagon to the jet airplane.

"Remember the first telephone?" he queried. "It was a wonderful invention but it led to confusion. Remember when the boy proposed over the telephone and got eight answers?"

Remember the first auto? It was wonderful. And it replaced the Missouri mule in increasing the vocabulary. And there were more arms broken cranking an automobile than there are people in the country. Then came the planes and where we go from here no one knows."

Mr. Hamilton said he would like to see the return of the "town hall meeting days." He said we are losing interest in public issues.

Among speakers at the old timers gathering was Ned Bowers of Matador.

Flomot Cemetery Association Nears Goal For Fence



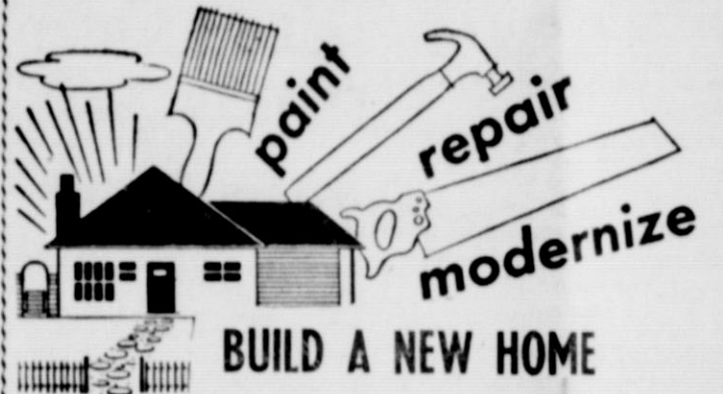

Just "Can't Get Over" Easy's Fence

Few years ago, Easy Roberts took a lot of kidding when he planted that hedge of Multiflora roses — along his property line. Folks said he was getting pretty high-falutin'.

But today plenty of people who laughed at the idea slow down when they drive by Easy's place — just to look at those roses. Most beautiful sight you ever saw.

Good citizenship and training were found to exist in the school student body. It was also found that health and recreational facilities were adequate and that students were being properly trained in basic studies. School buildings were found in a good state of repair and teaching supplies, equipment and materials were found superior to most schools of comparable size.
