Presently automobiles began backing away from the curb and within a few minutes the streets were emptied like a theatre when the performance is ended.

morning, almost at the same hour rain was falling last Thursday morning. Electric power

was again interrupted early this morning by the heavy lightning accompanying the rain.

Rain in the Matador area, however, was much heavier than last week's rain. "Rough estimate" is that more than one inch of precipitation had fallen here by five a. m. this morning. Heavy skies and lightning in "all directions" indicated more rain might be expected (perhaps before the Tribune is in the mail).

Brief flurry of rain and hail struck Matador about 9:30 Tuesday night but passed quickly, leaving slight trace of the south-west wind out of the south-west, strong, changing to the east in the afternoon prevailed yesterday.

Mercury readings have been in the neighborhood of 90 degrees for the past two days.

If the 'dry-farm' wheat lands of Motley county were being irrigated at specified intervals, they could not be in better condition. Range conditions are equally splendid. Heavy 'flash' rains last night will benefit dirt-water storage and keep the grass growing.

Some row crops have been planted and will develop rapidly with the continued "scheduled" rains and warm temperatures.

**Rains-Out Clean-Up** Rain checks were issued on the city clean-up sponsored by the Matador Lions Club which was scheduled to start at 6:30 this morning. The drive was aimed at curbing the excessive growth of weeds which has resulted on vacant lots due to the unusual rainfall in the past month.

At time of going to press no announcement has been made with regard to postponement of the drive but it is assumed that it will be scheduled again sometime next week.

## Street Numbers ARE DELIVERED

Street numbers (about 1,500) were delivered last week at the city hall as the first step in the Matador Lions Club sponsored project to mark all streets and business houses in the city limits. Money for the numbers was advanced by the club.

Total cost to each home or business place owner will be \$2.50. Rented property is to be numbered by the landlord. Probably within the next week every home (and business place) in town will be visited by a member of the Lions Club. Forms have been printed to provide a receipt and permanent property address record for each house number sold. A separate receipt will be issued for each sale. The purchaser will be asked to list other lots he may own in the same block. Vacant lots listed will be merely a record to show that a street number has been reserved for the vacant lot when a building is erected on it. The only charge will be for each home doorway, or separate doorways in the case of apartments.

No one is obligated to buy a house number, but each resident will be solicited. The entire plan is voluntary, selected as a fair method of paying for the permanent street markers which will be erected as soon as the house numbers are sold.

The street markers will be erected at the city's expense when they arrive. Also through action of the city council meeting Tuesday night, the city will pay for wood material and paint to black as a background for the bright metal numbers so they may be uniform and seen with greater ease. The black wood background will be given with each set of numbers.

## New Map Shows Block Numbers

New unofficial map of the city of Matador, printed elsewhere in this issue of the Tribune, shows the block numbers as they will affect the numbering of homes and business places in the city. The map is part of a project sponsored by the Lions Club. Numbering starts in the northeast corner of the town section. With the new map it is easy to locate the block number of any home or business place in town (exact property number can be figured by allowing right hand as even numbers when looking north on north-south streets (left hand is odd numbers) and right hand as even numbers when looking east on east-west street (left hand is odd side). Each 25-foot frontage will be allowed a number. If it is vacant the number will be skipped, but kept as a record when a building is erected on it. If a home is erected on two, three or more lots, it should be numbered with the nearest number to the doorway.

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## New Street Lights Blaze In Malador

New street lighting system installed in Matador made "its trial run" Tuesday afternoon and brought a new splendor to the city's night skyline Tuesday night. Main street lighted from Spears sign south to the L. C. Harp home, achieved a "city-like" effect.

For the first time ample lighting flooded the Matador school plant, with a string of lights north to the Tra-week hospital.

The new-type lamps installed in the business section flood the entire area. The lamps produce sufficient light to permit the reading of a newspaper across the street, yet there is no distracting glare. Largest lamps are erected around the court-house square. The wide streets surrounding the square are lighted almost like day, yet there is no glare or confusing shadows. The system of lights, installed by the West Texas Utilities Company, was perfected by the General Electric Company. Utility company officials declare that nowhere in the nation are more modern street lights than the system placed in use Tuesday night.

## Nominee Elected By Unanimous Vote

**Vet School Explained** Principal address at the meeting held in the Methodist church basement, was made by Fred H. Brownlee of the Veterans Vocational Training school for this area, with offices in Childress.

"You businessmen would be interested if some stranger arrived in Matador and announce that he was going to start a business with an annual payroll of \$30,000," Mr. Brownlee declared, "yet that is the amount that will be spent with a single class of 25 veterans. You men are paying the taxes. If you do not bring this money back to your county it will go elsewhere. Your taxes will not be lower. If you have two classes the amount spent by the government in 12 months in Motley county will be \$61,200. At present Cottle county has about \$333,000 coming in annually and Childress county has about double that amount through Veteran Training schools. You men are paying for the program but you are not getting it!"

He urged all businessmen to aid instructor Varner McWilliams in organizing more classes in the various training courses offered by the government.

Mr. Brownlee said the average veteran's education is equal to a sixth-grade school student.

BUILD THIS 10-INCH BALSA RACE CAR

Dear Dad:

This snappy little racer not only is a novel toy, but you—and junior—can make it in a weekend. Powered with two Eveready No. 935 flashlight batteries which drive a small electric motor, it will coast over any smooth surface and when the front bumper is touched, the motor automatically stops.

You can build this car from these instructions and you can obtain additional construction details from the March issue of *Mechanix Illustrated*. Before starting the actual construction, visit your local hobby shop for the necessary balsa wood, wheels, gears and other materials. Once the material is on hand, start construction by enlarging the body and chassis patterns to full size directly on the balsa wood. Cut out the base first, notching the bottom for the gears. Mount the gears, motor, axle and then carve the front to accommodate the slide switch. Run the wires to the switch along the bottom, as shown, and either bolt or cement the aluminum battery box in place. The

top is held in place with a snug fit on the three dowels. If necessary, a rubber band can be stretched over the top section to hold it more secure. The gears are worm-and-pinion units of the type used in 00 gauge trains and are connected to the motor shaft with a piece of rubber tubing which acts as a coupling. The wheels used in the original model were of the rubber tire type, commonly used on model airplanes. If desired, you can carve or turn your wheels from balsa wood and paint the tires black. The Eveready No. 935 batteries are set in a medium battery box. After the outside surface is finished off, cut out the streamlined front axle pieces and cement to the top section. Now give your complete car a few coats of wood filler and follow with three or four coats of your favorite color model airplane dope. Install your batteries and you're off to a good start by a flick of bumper switch!

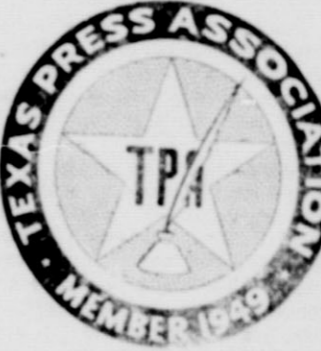

Legion hut by 12:00 (noon) of that day.

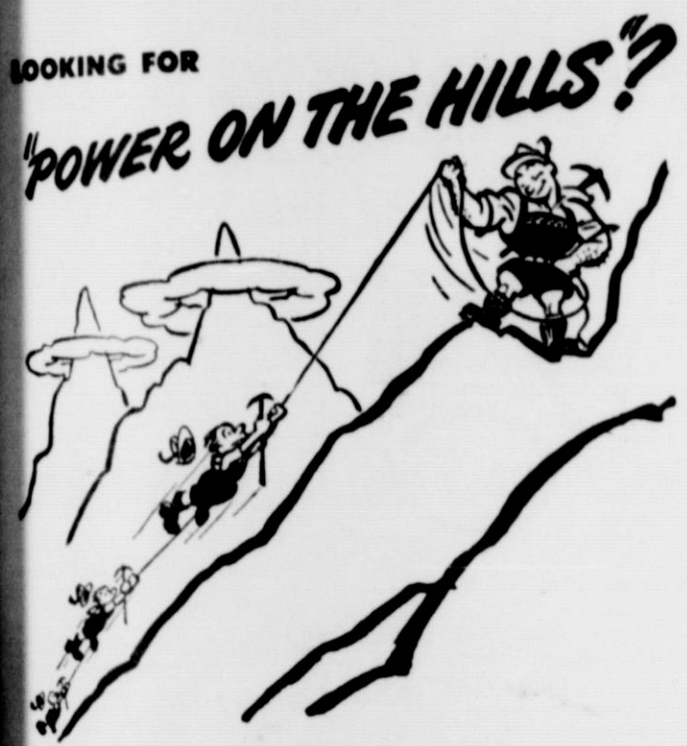
