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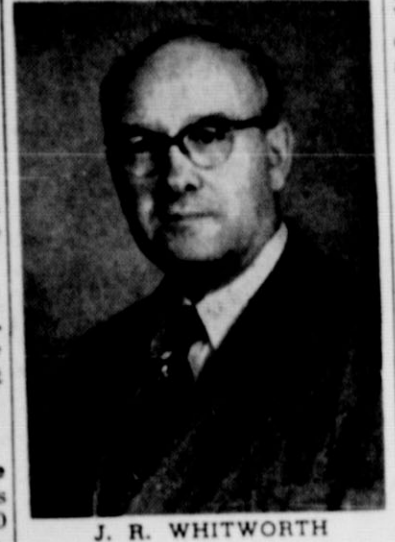
RAIL DUST

TURN ANY DIRECTION and the country looks the same but change is affecting almost half of Motley county. Islands of communities in the sea of grass land that was for 70 years the Matador ranch, hope to become a peninsula, or a part of the mainland of West Texas' great agriculture and stock-raising empire. Sunday issue of the Amarillo Globe-News carried a front page banner story, reprinted below. Editor's Note: Sunday, June 8—"Five more blocks of the famous Matador Ranch have been sold by the new owners, one of the large tracts going to a group of Panhandle men. American interests last July purchased the 900,000 acre spread from the original British and Scottish owners and divided it into 15 separate units.

Matador Ranch Land Sells

"Purchasers of the approximately 70,000 acres of the colorful Alamocitas pasture in Oldham county are listed as Mansfield Cattle Company, Jack Mansfield, C. C. Wimberly and Montgomery brothers, all of Vega, and Billy Curry of Garden City, Kansas. Purchased along with the land were approximately 2,800 head of cattle.

"The other four tracts are in Motley county where the Fred C. Koch interests of Wichita, Kansas, are reported to have purchased the Rodatam (ranch headquarters), Wolf Creek and Teepee cattle corporations sections of the vast ranch, containing approximately 116,000 acres.

"Purchase of parts of the famed Matador, once the largest spread in North America, began in April of this year, when two Midland men, Clarence Scharbauer, Jr. and Foy Proctor, purchased 114,000 acres of what was known as the Alamocitas Cattle Corporation ranch in the Panhandle.

The other businesses included a hotel about the present site of Bob's Oil Well, operated by Browning and McAdams and a hotel on the south side of the present courthouse square, operated by H. L. White and Lon King. There was only one residence in Matador at the time the above picture was made. After the saloon was closed the building remained vacant for some time until J. D. Morris opened a grocery store in it during 1894.

Religious Groups Start Movement To Insure Dry Status

TIME, THE SCENE SHIFTER, has produced some amazing effects since the last customer left the Dew Drop saloon here more than 59 years ago. The one room frame building was located on the present First State Bank site. The saloon was one of the first business enterprises in this community and it was closed as result of a local option election held December 5, 1893. Since that time Motley county has been dry theoretically, apparently and politically, except for a brief period following the repeal of prohibition when beer was sold in two or three cafes.

Military Funeral will Honor Korean Victim

FULL MILITARY HONORS will pay tribute Friday to Motley county's first Korean War dead to be returned home for burial. Funeral services for Pfc. James L. Britton, 22, son of Mrs. Iva M. Glascock of Matador, will be held in the Landmark Baptist Church Friday afternoon at 4 p. m. Private Britton was killed by an accidental shot in Korean soldier quarters, April 7. The funeral services will be conducted by Rev. Berry Watson, Methodist pastor of the Matador church.

The election held in 1893 may not be legal. The religious groups have asked for the July election to insure a continuation of the county's present status. The old election is being attacked because of irregularities dug from county records. Officers have been making arrests on liquor violations since the 1893 election and no objection was raised until two months ago.

At that time an appeal was filed with Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin, on a liquor violation conviction in Motley County Court. The appeal claims irregularities in the old election.

County Attorney Howard Trawick said some irregularities do appear in the old records. The question is whether they are sufficient to invalidate the law election laws at that time required election results to be canvassed within 11 days. The results in 1893 were canvassed 13 days after the election.

It was also required that election returns be published in four consecutive issues of a Motley county newspaper. Judge Henry H. Campbell, Motley county's first judge, and the man who organized the Matador Ranch, in his order declaring the results published, said the results had been published four weeks, omitting the word "consecutive."

About 10 years later Judge T. T. Bouldin issued a corrective order to include the word "consecutive." He made a mistake, however, referring to it in one instance as the Texas Maverick and in another as the Matador Maverick.

Sidewalk speculation in Matador is the percentage by which the county will again vote dry. Average observer believes it will be less than two to one. A few believe it could vote wet and that would be embarrassing, since the churches asked for the election.

Until the July election, regardless of any possible flaws in the old election, Motley county is dry, officials declare.

Ninety-seven children and workers were registered the first day of the school, and 111 have been registered to date. Of this number, 99 have enrolled.

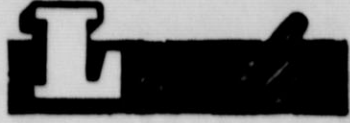

"Under" Voters To Obtain Exemptions

A certain amount of confusion regarding "free votes" frequently arises during election years. State Comptroller Bob Calvert has issued a statement, which includes changes in the Texas election code made during the 52nd Session of the Legislature. Except from the statement is as follows: "Certificate of exemption without cost. Every citizen who is exempt from the payment of a poll tax by reason of the fact that he or she has not yet reached the age of 21 years on the first day of January preceding its levy (January 1, 1951) or who is exempt from the payment of a poll tax because he or she was not a resident of the state on the first day of January preceding its levy (January 1, 1951), who shall have since become eligible to vote by reason of length of residence or age, shall not later than thirty (30) days before any election at

which he wishes to vote obtain from the Assessor and Collector of taxes for the county of his or her residence a certificate of exemption from the payment of a poll tax and no such person who has failed or refused to obtain such certificate of exemption from the payment of a poll tax shall be allowed to vote."

TRULA N. DODSON SERIOUSLY INJURED IN HIGHWAY CRASH

John Thomas Dodson, of Fort Bragg had a narrow escape recently when the vehicle he was driving hit into some loose gravel as he attempted to avoid hitting an approaching west-bound car, as he was rounding a turn.

His wife, Trula Neil, 22, was seriously injured in the May 24 accident as the Dodson car rolled

off to the side of the highway after hitting into a stump on the right of the highway shoulder. Mrs. Dodson, rushed to a hospital shortly after the car was toppled, was reported to be suffering from a pelvic fracture. Her husband sustained head face lacerations in the accident.

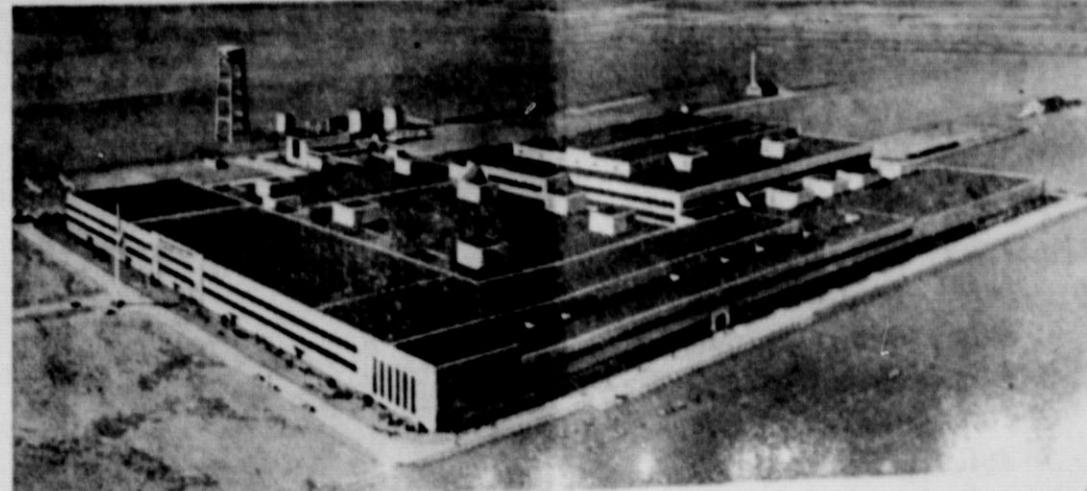

cattle went with the transactions. Figuring the cattle at current prices, it is apparent from the sale of stock that the land with part of the mineral rights has been valued at about \$30 an acre. The over-all land sale is about one-third of the land in the entire spread.

"Jack Mansfield yesterday said he and his partners had purchased the west half of the old Ala-

moctitas pasture north of Abilene and west of the block previously purchased by Scharbauer.

"Although no purchase price was revealed, it was estimated that the Scharbauer and Procter purchase amounted to 24 million dollars but no cattle were included in their purchase.

"The Matador was the handle's last ranch to be controlled by foreign interests, 77% of its stock in the hands of British and Scotch investors, majority of the present owners (unsold portions of the ranch) are said to be from New York and the East."
