

NEW FEDERAL LAW PROHIBITS HIRING SCHOOL CHILDREN

The Tribune has been asked to call the attention of Farmers to the Federal law passed during the 1949 session of Congress which makes it unlawful to emplay children under sixteen years of age in agriculture during school hours. The entire responsibility for determining the age of the worker is placed on the farmer who employes the child or worker and if there is any doubt he is advised to require a certificate of age.

The penalty for employing those of school age is or may be a fine up to ten thousand dollars for the first offense and for the second the same fine plus a jail sentence of six months.

The law applies to local workers as well as migratory workers. The farmer may use his own children on his own farm of farms provided he does not violate the compulsory attendance law that requires children to attend school.

> - This Is -Your Paper **Not All Pictures** Are Good Ones

By William R. Nelson

PICTURE may or may not be A worth "10,000 words", as the Chinese proverb claims, but it cortainly represents a pretty penny in costs, time, space and judgment, if published in a newspaper. In addition, it is seldom desirable to republish a picture, so all of the effort, time and money expended is

for a single use. Editors appreciate the interest shown when readers suggest publication of pictures, and they comply as often as possible. But publishing a picture in a newspaper is not as easy as it may seem.

Pictures are only "worth 10,000 words" Pictures when they con News, Too vey desired information. That immediately classifles them as news and means they should be selected for their news value. Unless a photograph is of someone or some event currently in the news, publication has little or no meaning.

Assuming that a picture has news value, it then must be of such quality it will reproduce well in the paper. Many photographs which are entirely satisfactory for an album cannot be reproduced distinctly enough to be recognizable in a newspaper. Publishing such pictures is a disappointing waste of space, effort and money.

There are other factors, too, such as permission of those in the pic-ture for its publication, its news value or the amount of interest in it among the paper's readers, and whether there is time to make a cut. If not taken

specifically for the paper, on its order, a Incongruity photograph

may not be timely and therefore its use may seem incongruous Even if timely but received too late to get a cut made, it may not be practical to use it in a later issue because reader interest will have waned by then.

For these and many other reasons, the editor is always the best judge of whether or not a picture can be or should be published.

If the paper publishes other pictures, some not local in origin, in the very issue for which your's was rejected, it is well to remember that in addition to the above factors, there is still another. It is that some pictures, always of news value, are furnished to the paper in forms that make their use easy and inexpensive, because they are also supplied to many other newspa-
