





Health News

Measles and chickenpox have been widespread throughout the State during the past few weeks and in the week ending March 5 measles reached a total number of cases, 3909, that was the second highest in history. Chicken pox was almost twice the seven year median, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has stated that there is an unusual number of adults suffering from this so called "childhood" di-

"Both these diseases are extremely contagious", Dr. Cox said, "and the strictest isolation and canitation percautions are necessary to halt their spread. Dishes, toys, towels, or anything that has been around the patient can carry the germs to other members of the household, and all such articles should be thoroughly disinfected before being handled by others susceptible to these diseases.'

The State Health Officer :ecommended that a physician be illed immediately when a child that his advice be followed im plicity until complete recovery Dangerous complications often accompany or follow measles and a child may have his entire future health endangered unless he receives competent care during his illness.




