According to officials of the two organizations, any discarded chairs which anyone might have and would like to donate to the hut, will be appreciated very much.

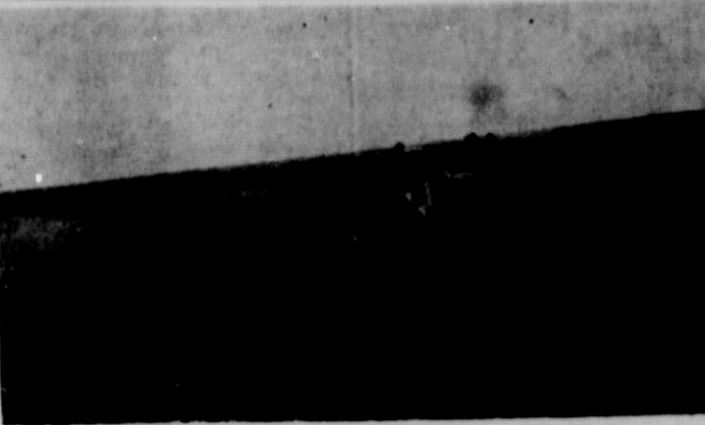

"Called on account of rain" city-wide cleanup drive sponsored by the Matador Lions Club and scheduled for May 5th, has a new billing date. The drive will be held Thursday, May 19, starting at 6:30 a. m.

An appeal is made to every citizen to aid in cleaning weeds and trash from their own property and adjoining property that may present unsightly and unhealthful conditions.

Reports indicate that pollution cases on a nationwide basis show a far greater number than on the same date a year ago.

Circulars have been ordered by the club and will be distributed by members of the local Boy Scout troop previous to the drive. It is expected that approximately two hours will be required in the business area and all business and professional men are asked to participate.

### 'Appreciation Day' Money Tops \$400

Matador business and professional firms' "Appreciation Day" fund has now exceeded \$400, according to sponsors. Coupons which make some fortunate person eligible for a prize each Saturday afternoon, are absolutely free. They are given with merchandise purchases from sponsoring firms and may also be received for the asking without making a purchase.

Before the awarding event each Saturday afternoon at 4 p. m. (courthouse square) any member of the audience without a coupon, is invited to come forward and request one.

### Death In Wake Of Sundown Tornado; Lubbock Flooded

MOST FAVORABLE crop and range conditions in eight or more years, have resulted in Motley county from the "well-spaced" slow rains since the first of January.

Rainfall late Saturday that brought the official May total to 3 inches, completed a stormy weekend that resulted in four or five violent deaths in the South Plains area. A murderous tornado struck the small oil town of Sundown, about 40 miles west of Lubbock, shortly after five p. m. Friday, killing a young Church of Christ minister and his three-year-old daughter. His wife and small son were seriously injured.

A Lubbock woman was electrocuted when she picked up an electric lamp in her flooded home. Another woman near Plainview was reported to have been killed by lightning.

Thousands of dollars in damage to some of Lubbock's finest homes resulted from the flood conditions produced by more than five-inch rainfall Friday night. For a time all roads out of Lubbock were blocked and many people were rescued from their homes in boats. A severe hailstorm struck in the vicinity of Lorenzo about 8:30 Saturday night, resulting in much damage to wheat and young row crops. In places the hail covered the ground to a depth of four or five inches for hours after the storm had passed.

### Impressive Total

The total rainfall in Matador since the first of January is impressive as compiled by County Agent J. R. Emmons last night. The 24-year average rainfall in Motley county for January is 7.1-inch. The January 1949 rainfall (snow and sleet) was 3.83 inches. The February 24-year average is 6.6-inch. The 1949 February total was (less) 2.89-inch. The March average is 5.9-inch and the 1949 March total was 1.05-inch. April has 1.9 inches average and while the past month total only 1.6 inches, six rains were well-spaced and slow, allowing little if any run-off. The May rainfall up to last night totals 3 inches while the 24-year average (including full month of May) is only 3.5 inches. Thus the 24-year average rainfall, including the full month of May, is 7.64 inches and a total of 9.53 inches has already been registered here.

Mr. Emmons said the Spur experiment station has reported before last week's rains that moisture penetration had reached 28 inches. Best ground-season condition is considered when moisture reaches 36 inches penetration.

The most favorable feature about the 1949 rainfall (including slow melting ice and snow) is that most of the precipitation has been slow with complete penetration and little run-off.

Interesting feature about last year's rainfall is that the total was only 13.02 inches for the full 12 months as compared with 9.53 inches to the 12 of May in 1949. Last year 2.2 inches of rain fell during the entire month of May, and none had fallen between the first and 12. Total rainfall last year from January first through the entire month of May was 5.97 inches.

Three local men, Frank Pohl, Loyd Fulkerson and R. L. Webb appeared before the Interstate Commerce Commission, in a hearing held Monday in Amarillo.

Purpose of the hearing was a plea to obtain faster motor freight schedules into Matador and other towns served by motor freight in Western Texas.

## ROBBERY VICTIMS ARE RELATIVES OF LOCAL RESIDENTS

Delayed  
Two victims of robberies at Tolar, Texas last Thursday and Friday nights are relatives of local residents, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Campbell, Sr. and Mrs. Sterling Price. It was learned here after reports of the thefts appeared in daily newspapers.

Mrs. Conde Wood, whose 1946 sedan and an automatic shotgun were stolen, is Mr. Campbell's sister, while Clay Carl, 55, Tolar mail carrier, who was held up Friday night, is a brother of Mesdames Campbell and Price.

Billy Ray Hemphill, ex-convict, who was suspected and

charged at Granbury with robbery and theft and armed robbery in connection with the holdups of the two Tolar residents, was arrested in Oak Cliff early Saturday by Dallas police.

Dallas officers said they traced Hemphill to the home of a relative and forced entrance into the house when they were unable to get anyone to come to the door. Hemphill made no resistance.

The 1946 Sedan, also watch and billfold stolen from Carl, who was held up by a man hiding in his parked car Friday night were recovered by the Dallas police. They also recovered the automatic shotgun stolen from the home of Mrs. Wood.

Hemphill told Dallas detectives that he buried the .410 gauge shotgun with which he held up Mrs. Wood and her two daughters-in-law, prior to stealing Mrs. Wood's car.

The car was found abandoned near Tolar shortly afterward, but Mrs. Wood was not through with her bandit. On returning to her home after a short absence Friday afternoon, she discovered that someone had entered the house and eaten a meal from food left in her refrigerator.

Carl Friday night had attended a Masonic lodge meeting in Bluff Dale, leaving his car parked in front of a Tolar grocery.

After a friend drove him back to Tolar, he entered the car and started the motor. Then a man rose in the rear compartment, pushed a shotgun into Carl's back and ordered him to keep driving.

The car was headed west. After traveling two miles, Carl was ordered to turn north and entered a rural road leading to the Asbury Cemetery.

"Get out with your hands up," Carl's abductor ordered, and when he obeyed, the man took his wallet, containing \$30 in currency and about the same amount in checks and his watch. He then forced Carl to unhook the trailer attached to his car and drive back to the highway, where the mail carrier was ejected.

## Health News

Measles and chickenpox have been widespread throughout the State during the past few weeks and in the week ending March 5 measles reached a total number of cases, 3909, that was the second highest in history. Chickenpox was almost twice the seven year median, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has stated that there is an unusual number of adults suffering from this so called "childhood" disease.

"Both these diseases are extremely contagious," Dr. Cox said, "and the strictest isolation and sanitation precautions are necessary to halt their spread. Dishes, toys, towels, or anything that has been around the patient can carry the germs to other members of the household, and all such articles should be thoroughly disinfected before being handled by others susceptible to these diseases."

The State Health Officer recommended that a physician be called immediately when a child shows any beginning symptoms of chickenpox or measles, and that his advice be followed implicitly until complete recovery. Dangerous complications often accompany or follow measles, and a child may have his entire future health endangered unless he receives competent care during his illness.

"It is not advisable to treat

these childhood diseases too lightly," Dr. Cox said. "They are sometimes responsible for nothing more than a few days discomfort, but we cannot count on that."
