MATADOR HATCHERY TO DONATE CHICKENS FOR METHODIST ORPHANAGE

THIRTY SIX TRAYS OF EGGS ARE NEEDED FOR GREAT INCUBATOR

The Matador Hatchery under management of Lewis Newman will set the great 4300 egg incubator on May 26 and donate the entire hatch of chickens, free of all cost, including transportation, to the Methodist Orphanage at Waco, Texas. Mr. Newman, who is paying all cost of incubation and transportation personally, is in need of good heavy-breed eggs to complete filling the incubator. Those wishing to make a donation of eggs will kindly see Mr. Newman immediately and not later than Monday or Tuesday, that he may know exactly what number he may depend upon.

Drop Causes Loss To Public Income Of \$12,500,000 In Two Years

TEXAS MOTORIST GAS TAX AVERAGE OF \$27

Private Motor Transportation Has Become Fourth Basic Necessity

(Special To The News)
 AUSTIN, Tex., May 17—Texas got both bad news and good news concerning her state highways during the week, but the bad news was temporary and the glad news is expected to last longer, the Texas Good Roads Association reported. The bad news came when the highway department announced that only 911,904 Texas motor cars were registered up to May 1. This means, the Association pointed out, that more than 124,000 Texas motorists will put up their cars this year and not replace them. Last year 104,689 car-owners quit battling the depression and high motor taxes, and gave up their machines. Retirement of these cars means a heavy loss in public revenue. The average motor vehicle fee is \$10, and the average Texas autoist pays \$27.80 a year in gas tax. As a result, the cars retired last year caused a loss in public income of \$3,957,244, and this year that loss will be repeated, in addition to which the new decline will bring the year's total to well over \$8,500,000—an aggregate drop of \$12,500,000 in two years. But even in this cheerless picture, W. O. Huggins, president of the road association, found rosy rays of promise. "The quarter of a million Texas motorists who have given up their cars will not keep on walking when conditions improve", he declared. "Private motor transportation has become the fourth basic necessity. The story of the couple whose house leaked so bad they had to sleep in the sedan, is not as absurd as it sounds. These retired motorists will furnish a rich market for auto sales the moment the upturn is general. "There is just one big if. Auto sales and auto taxes will come back strongly provided we keep our roads in readiness, and even improve them. It is a hard job now, with road funds heavily reduced. But the highways themselves earn enough money to do it, if we leave them the money which is rightfully theirs and do not seize it for other purposes."

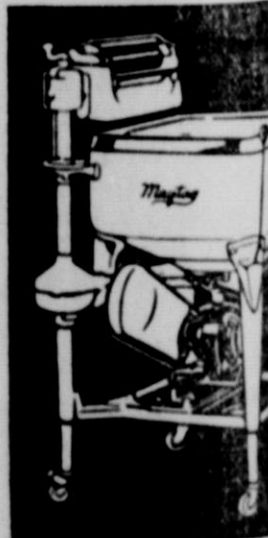

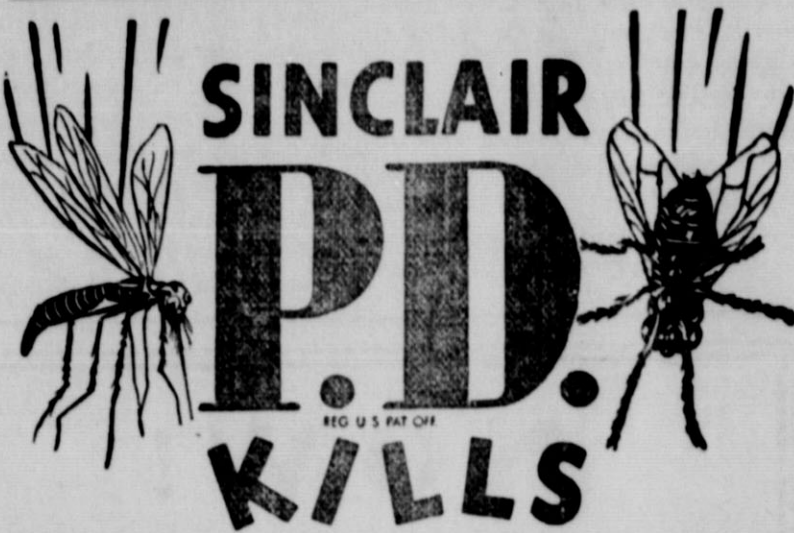

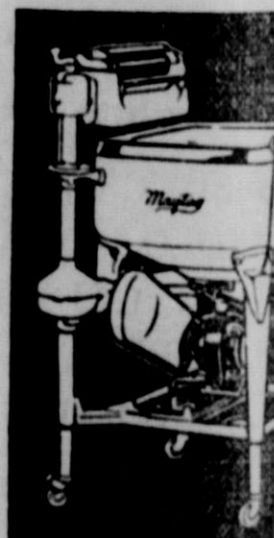
