give startling results. If managed as well as the best 20% of the farms are managed, output of the average acre could be doubled. In most areas the output of pasture land could be increased three or four times. Our cleverest feeders get 60% more out of their feed than do average feeders. Production per cow, sow or hen could be increased 50% to 100% if animals and methods as good as those used by the top 20% of our farmers were con-

used by the top 20% of our farmers were employed by all farmers.


There are two ways of achieving higher production per acre without increasing costs. The most practical method is to raise the level of most practical method is to raise the level of management efficiency without increasing present working forces per farm. The other method is for the farm family, with modern power and machinery to farm more acres. This second method has obvious limitations. For there would not be enough acres to go around without eliminating many farm families. Do we want larger farm units and reduced farm population? Many think

However, many farmers are now faced with adopting either one or the other of the above methods. Farmers must meet today's high op-erating costs and still maintain living standards without forcing prices beyond the reach of the average consumer. 


