Nation Shocked At Death Of Lone Star Chieftain

Allan Shivers To Fill Vacant Place

Plane Brings Body Back From Houston

AUSTIN, Texas, July 11—Government is a business with 41-year-old Allan Shivers, Texas new Governor.

GOVERNOR Beauford Halbert Jester returned to Austin Monday in a flag-draped casket airborne from Houston, where he was discovered dead in a sleeping car berth, early Monday morning.

The rangy and handsome Lieutenant Governor, who ascends to the Governor's chair because of Beauford H. Jester's death, knows government from the basement up.

Shivers worked as nightwatchman in the Treasury during his student days at the University of Texas. Selling shoes was another job that helped the big East Texas boy get an education.

He was Texas' first governor to die while actively in office. Death came in his sleep while he was on his way to Galveston for physical checkup and vacation. He was fifty-six. Death was attributed to coronary occlusion, blood clot.

Shivers' real political career dates from 1935, when Jefferson County sent him to the State Senate. At twenty-six, he was the youngest Senator.

Twelve years later, dean of the Senate, Shivers was elevated to Lieutenant Governor. Texas voters chose him while Shivers was a major in Europe helping set up Allied military government.

Shivers accidentally "took" one French town during World War II.

As German troops retreated in Eastern France, he was assigned to set up military government at Vitte. The assignment was routine except for the fact that the town had not been occupied by Allied soldiers.

A convoy dropped Shivers near the town limits and he went in alone. Luckily, the Germans withdrew without leaving any snipers.

Several months later, still in France, Shivers received a telegram announcing his election as Lieutenant Governor of Texas.

Conservative politically, Shivers nevertheless won his first political fame in the state's strongest labor district, Jefferson County. His legislative record foretells that Shivers will follow a middle-road course.

Shivers outlined his philosophy last January upon taking office for a second term as Lieutenant Governor.

Malador Child In Colorado Accident, Seriously Injured

Mr. and Mrs. Lee Burns Saturday were called to Alamosa, Colorado, to the bedside of their son, Clinton Lee, 7, who was seriously injured in a highway accident.

The child, and his sister, Karen, were visiting their grandparents at Mesita, Colo.

Also injured in the accident was Arvin Burns, 18, brother of Lee Burns. The former was driving the car in which he and his nephew and another man, were riding.

According to a letter written by Mrs. Burns to Mrs. R. E. Campbell, Jr., the car was hit by a pickup that entered the highway from a country road at an intersection.

It hit Arvin's car broadside with such an impact that from point of contact it knocked his car 72 feet sideways. The patrolmen said the skid marks on pavement showed that the man in the pickup slid his brakes 45 feet before he hit Arvin's car.

Clinton was knocked through the door, 114 ft. out on the prairie. He was lying in a bloody heap, unconscious, his forehead wide open and a gash under his right eye laid open.

A neighbor a mile away heard the crash and rushed to them. A Mexican who was irrigating, said he saw the crash and saw Clint flying through the air. He is bandaged all over, 6 stitches in his forehead, and 2 under the right eye. His face is swollen, and no skin left. He landed on his face. Two stitches were also taken on his chin.

X-rays showed his back is not hurt. Arvin is cut badly and X-rays showed chips off his vertebrae. He hit on his back and slid some 20 feet. The man with them suffered broken ribs and chest injuries.

Attending physicians have assured the family that all the injured victims will recover.

Mr. Burns is employed in the soil conservation office here.

Parents desiring to transfer children from one school district to another, are warned that July 30th is the last day which transfers can be approved.

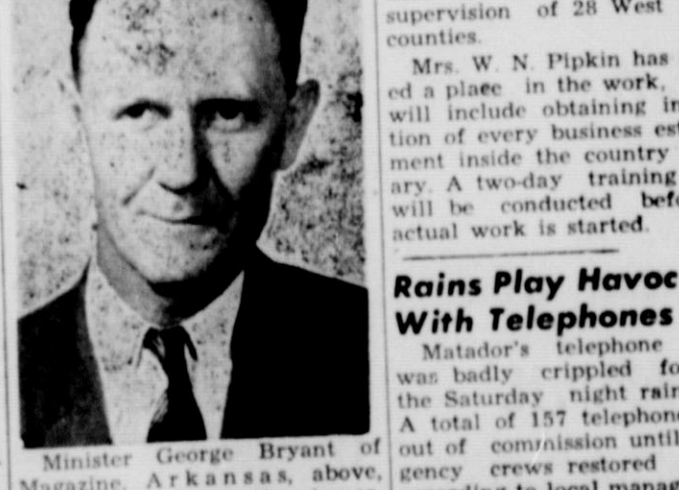
AFTON PIONEER IS CLAIMED BY DEATH

Salt Is Necessary In Drinking Water For Hot Weather

A deficiency of salt in the human system can cause serious consequences, and for this reason Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer advises every person whose work is such that it causes excessive perspiration to add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water taken during the day.

Farmers, mechanics, carpenters, construction men and all others whose work causes them to sweat profusely are in danger of having their body salt content seriously depleted, and as a result may suffer from heat

cramps or heat fag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat, and when the thermometer hits the high register, the human body may lose as much as 40 to 50 grams of salt during a single day.

In many industrial plants, workmen are furnished with and urged to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Many find this a pleasant way of taking extra salt, but others prefer to add the needed amount of extra salt to their food and drink.

"Take your extra salt in any manner that is agreeable to you," says Dr. Cox, "but take it. Heat cramps are very painful and exhausting. They are characterized by cramps in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases there may be nausea and vomiting. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until a deficiency exists, then the ab-

dominal muscles begin to cramp."

According to the State Health Officer, it is a wise precaution to keep the body supplied with salt, and thus avoid much possible suffering and loss of time from heat cramps.

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County Agent Says New Weed-Killer May Damage Crops

Reports continue to come in from different sections of the state that show proper precautions are not being followed in the use of 2,4-D. Orchards have been defoliated, tomato and other truck crops have been and are being hurt, and cotton is being damaged in almost every section of the state says J. R. Emmons, Motley County Agricultural Agent. The users of 2,4-D must remember, he adds, it will not only kill the weeds that are objectionable but may also damage desirable plants around the house and farm. Here are some precautions that should be followed by every user of 2,4-D, as worked out by a committee of Texas A.

Daytime Bandits Rob Big Amarillo Market

(NOTE — Following news story is from the Sunday Amarillo News-Globe. J. O. (Jewel) Hutto, is a former resident of Matador and graduate of Matador high school.)

A pair of armed bandits took \$11,139 in cash and checks—the

biggest highjacking haul in Amarillo's history—Saturday morning from the wall safe of McCart Super Market, 1001 Taylor. The gunmen herded 11 employees into a ladies' rest room at the rear of the store and at gunpoint forced J. O. Hutto, manager, to open the safe.

"I'm sure it's one of the biggest hauls in the past 24 years," said one veteran Amarillo policeman, "and I believe it's the biggest robbery Amarillo has ever had."

More than half of the loot was in cash. Hutto said it included Friday's receipts which had been removed from the store's cash registers and placed in the safe at closing time Friday

night. There was no money in the cash register.

The robbery occurred about 6:55 o'clock, slightly more than an hour before the market was scheduled to open for business.

Operating with clock-like precision and efficiency, the bandits were gone within 15 minutes after they arrived.

They entered the market through a rear door at which bakery trucks were loading for their early morning run. The front doors were locked.

Dallas Elliott, 1915 Tyler, shipping and receiving clerk, and Dale Ealy, 818 Pierce, pastry truck driver, were first to be herded into the rest room.

One of the robbers made for the front of the market where Hutto, Bill Foster, 1601 Buchanan, and Billy Rose, 1014 Fillmore, were working at the vegetable rack.

"This is a stickup," he announced, showing a snub nosed, .38 caliber, nickel plated pistol into Hutto's side.

"I thought it was a prank," said Hutto, "kidding, Bud." The gunman declared, "There are some more men at the back of the store covering me so you had better get on back there."

After dispatching Hutto, Foster and Rose toward the rear of the market, the gunman accosted Levi Debose, Negro porter, who was mopping the floor nearer the front.

"This is a stickup!" he declared again menacing the porter with the gun.

Dubose also suspected a prank and grabbed the gun with which he was being jabbed in the ribs. Dubose said he recognized the gunman as a man who had worked at the market one day about a year ago.

"I mean business, Levi," said the man, addressing the porter by his first name.

Debose relinquished his hold on the gun and joined the others in the rest room. The robber who waited in the rear of the store then rounded up six bakery employees from the bakery department located upstairs and placed them in the makeshift cell.

Stalling for time, Hutto had tossed the keys to the inner door of the safe to a hiding place behind a stack of boxes in the hallway of the supply room.

Hutto told the men that no one being held knew the combination to the same, he hoped to keep the men there until the arrival of Chester Odom, assistant store manager, whom he thought he might be able to summon police.

"I know he can open the safe," said one of the men, indicating Hutto. "I've seen him close up

the store a lot of times at night." "Open that safe, or I'll put a slug in you!" ordered the other gunman.

Hutto was then marched to the northeast corner of the store, near the show window facing Tenth, where wall safe is located.

He opened the outer door of the safe and told his captor he would have to return to the rear and get the keys to the inner door. Returning to the hallway, he retrieved the keys and opened the safe. He was then returned to the rest room.

The bandits took the safe's contents and left, admonishing their victims that "whoever sticks their head out that door in the next five minutes will get killed."

Meanwhile, Odom, who usually gets to the store between 7 and 7:30 o'clock, had stopped for coffee enroute and did not arrive until shortly after the bandits had left.

Hutto said he and his companions remained in the rest room about two minutes after the men left. He then ran to a telephone and notified police.

Five police cars were at the market within a matter of minutes. Ironically, the first police car to reach the scene had been parked in front of Piggly Wiggly Store No. 2, 1500 Polk, which was robbed the morning of June 22.

An area-wide alarm was spread by police and road blocks were thrown up all over the Panhandle.

The bandits left few clues at the scene of the robbery.

Describing the men, Hutto said the first to enter the front part of the market appeared to be between 23 and 28 years old. He was about 5 feet, 10 inches in height, weighing about 140 lbs.,

with brown hair and fair complexion. He wore a pair of levis, a tan T-shirt and tan coat. One of his eyes seemed to be bad.

The other man was about the same height but slightly chunkier, weighing about 160 pounds. His hair was dark brown and his complexion fair. He appeared to be between 25 and 30 years old. He wore brown trousers and a white, sleeveless T-shirt with a brown stripe. He carried an Army-type .45 caliber nickelplated pistol.

Both wore an accent that would be noticeable in this part of the country. Hutto believes he has seen the second man around town somewhere. Elliott says he is certain that he had seen the man before Saturday morning.

Hutto said the first gunman seemed to be rattled at times, but the other he described as "tough." Both men apparently knew the layout of the store well, he said.

Hutto said the cash and checks were in bags. There were about 15 bags in all, 12 of which bore the markings of the First National Bank. One was a Price Armored Car Service bag.

The loot also included 80 rolls of pennies, totaling \$40. Hutto said the crooks even took the store's petty cash fund.

The market manager said he may have caught a glimpse of the bandits' get-away car. He said he saw the back of a black 1940 or 1941 Plymouth sedan as it pulled into the alley behind the store as he was opening the safe.

This led officers to believe that the two might have had a cohort operating the car. Police said the descriptions of the two men involved in the Saturday morning holdup fits closely that of the two men who took \$138.60

in the Piggly-Wiggly robbery last month.

Joe Murphy market manager at Furr Food Store No. 1, 220 East Tenth, next door to McCart's, was on the job in the Furr Food Store while the robbery was in progress. He said neither he or any of his four fellow-workers noticed anything amiss in the vicinity.

Police placed pickup orders out for the arrest of several known Amarillo police characters for questioning.

Meanwhile, store officials checked employment records in an effort to discover the identity of the man Debose said he recognized as a former employee of the market.

The market is owned in partnership by E. J. McCart, Sr., E. J. McCart, Jr., Robert McCart and Morris McCart.

Morris McCart has requested that persons who cashed checks at the store Friday notify store officials immediately so that payment can be stopped.

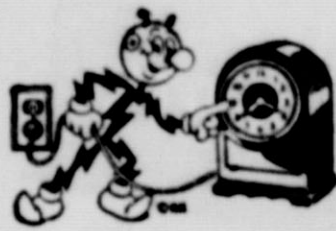

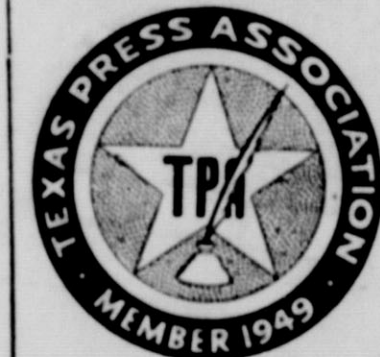

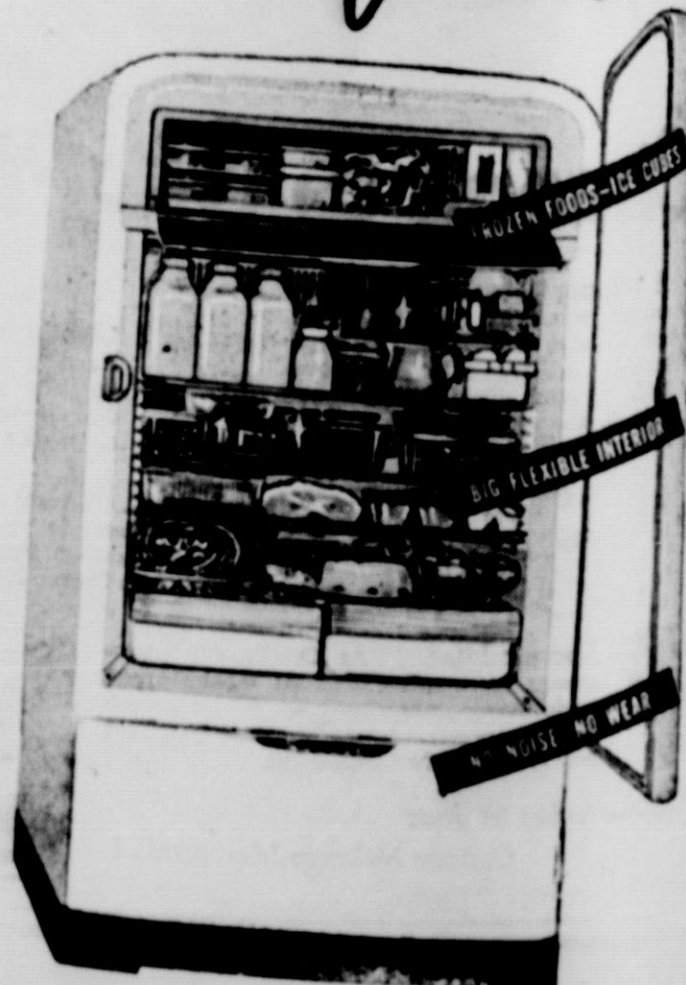

"The biggest business in Texas is the government of Texas," he said. "And because this business operates on your tax dimes and dollars, it is your business too."

Government can improve, Shivers said:

1. By stopping the "tendency of the judiciary and executive to absorb the functions of the legislative."

2. "If we Texans hope to protect state authority from further encroachment by the Federal Government, then we as a state authority must not continue to encroach upon government at the local level."

3. "We must have a full-time legislature whose members meet annually and who receive year-round pay." (A constitutional amendment for this purpose will be voted upon Nov. 8.)

4. "We must have an annual budget prepared by a legislative agency and enacted into law by the Legislature each year."

5. "We must approach expenditures and consequent taxation with the understanding that the foundation of business should not be undermined by superlatives."

6. "A legislative council should be created to function between annual legislative sessions. This was authorized by the Legislature."

7. "We must increase to four years the tenure of elective and appointive officials who now serve for two years."

He urged additional welfare legislation, and increased aid to education.

Shivers wrote the Enabling Act for old age assistance in 1935, and helped draft the present Texas Employment Commission plan. Several years ago, Shivers authored the law extending Texas' boundary twenty seven miles into the Gulf of Mexico, upon the theory that the traditional coastal limit depended upon the distance a shore-based cannon could defend.

More recently, Shivers recommended that Texas negotiate with federal officials to settle the title land dispute. He fears Texas must lose the whole area unless it compromises.

The new executive comes from pioneer Texas stock. His great-grandmother, Mrs. Elizabeth Shivers, a Mississippi widow, brought her three children to Texas.

Shivers was born at Lufkin, October 5, 1907.

Accompanying the body from Houston was Adj. Gen. K. L. Berry, a longtime personal friend of Jester. An honor guard of twenty air police stood by as the casket was removed from the plane and transferred to an ambulance for the trip to the mansion.

In Houston the procession from downtown to Ellington Air Force Base was led by two State Highway Patrol cars, four jeeps carrying an honor guard from Company E, 143d Infantry, National Guard of Houston. Then came Air Force staff cars.
