





But it is true, and farmers everywhere within easy automobile distance of big cities would like to get hold of the plunderers.

The County Farm Bureau Federation of Suffolk County, New York is going after the city dweller who steals from the farmer's fields an opportunity to explain the social theory under which he conducts his pillage. The Federation is spreading a net for such marauders and they will receive swift, sure justice if caught at their depredations. The example of Suffolk County might well be followed by other counties.

Suppose a farmer should drive into New York City or Chicago and grab from the shop counters such articles as won fancy. What chance would he have against "city law." There is a law that holds good in the country, too, and the organized farm bodies ought to see that it is enforced. A fund for capture and prosecution would have beneficial results.

"TOO THICK TO SEE A JOKE"

The average man takes pride in being rated as an intelligent fellow, but if this intelligence is challenged, some trouble is likely to follow. The greatest insult to him who follows the funny papers as a daily study, is to charge him with being too dense to get the kick in a joke. This is unforgivable barbar-ism which leads to fight. But charge the same bunch of conceit with being too heavy to understand the psychology of self-behavior and he takes it as a compliment. He will admit that to work the brain seriously would crack his conscience.

This same self-rated good fellow would work for a week to find a laugh or do a cross word puzzle, but he would not look twice to find a job. Wit with humor is the spice of life; when, however, it becomes the sole food to a soul-less man, the windy glutton be-comes a nuisance to himself and to others; all of which leads to the type of empty acrobats in words, too common in our day.

We have need for a system of mental tygiene quite as much as that of physical hygiene. Indeed to men in jail it is the most important duty of each day to each individual. It must be self-taught with persistent healthful practice in the generation of useful ideas. INADEQUACY OF HIGHWAYS

Paralysis of snotor traffic in many sec-

few years unless the Nation's highway con-struction is revised and accelerated is a men-ace seen by highway and traffic authorities. Surveys undertaken over large areas by the Federal Bureau of Public Roads and by private organizations indicate clearly that within the next half dozen years hundreds of millions of dollars must be added annually to the \$1,000,000,000 a year now being spent

on highway construction and maintenance.

It is not that the country is not building roads rapidly enough, but that the roads being built are not wide enough to meet expected future needs, and, in some instances, even present needs

Of the 145,000 miles of roadway in the United States, 63,618 miles are paved with concrete, brick, macadam, asphalt or some other hard surface, but of this paved mileage the major portion, is already outgrown by traffic. Where there is need for an 18-foot road there exists but a 14-foot highway, and where traffic conditions demand a roadway wide enough for four streams of traffic

there is room for only two or three.

America's "good roads" program is relatively young; so young, in fact, that up to this time the public cry has been for mileage and more mileage, without a thought for durability or width. The fact that the public is now awakening to the inadequate width of the average improved highway is evidence tha tthe first craving for mileage is well on the way toward safety.

There remains some areas where mileage must remain a big factor for some years. Texas is one of these areas. Here we are but well started toward the goal of hard-surfaced highway systems, penetrating every portion of the State, and connecting every important point. But, along with this "first stage," Texas is also developing a demand for wider and more durable highways.


