# Area Cotton Crop Brings In \$225 Million

By H. I. KIEFER

From Lubbock Avalanche in any year in history.

Authoritative estimates were that 500,000 to 600,000 bales the largest cotton crop ever grown within a comparable area upon earth.

The crop represents a cash value conservatively placed at a minimum of \$225 000,000.

The closest this area ever came to the million-mark before was in 1937, when 959,000 bales were ginned. The next largest year was 1947, with 944,000 bales.

The 22 cotton producing counties of the region, with a total area of about 20,000 square miles will harvest about 10 per cent of the staple grown in the U.S. and 25 to 30 per cent of that grown in Texas.

The U. S. Cotton classing office at 1702 Avenue H supplied the official records which established that the 1,000,000-bale ginning mark had been reached and passed. More than 99 per cent of the staple grown in the area is classed as to length, color and quality as fast as a sample from every bale ginned can be rushed to that office.

The office, incidentally, is the largest of its kind in the world, now employing approximately

The treasury has a stockpile in its mints of something like \$13,-000,000,000 in silver dollars, despite the fact that minting of that coin was stopped in 1935. The last big batch was turned out in 1921.

Mining Kings Liked Them The silver dollar reached the height of its popularity as a edium of exchange in the 880s and '90s during the heyday of such fabulous mining kings as Colorado's "Haw" Tabor and Meyer Guggenheim.

Tabor always carried a pocket full of the big clanking coins which he liked to throw onto the stage of the Leadville opera house when a trim figure drew his admiration. Some of the silver barons used the dollars for dooring as an obvious motif.

A part of the present demand or silver dollars, the Denver mint believes, may be attributable to the growing demand for coin in this country.
