J. E. JAMESON

J. E. Jameson was born in Webster County, Missouri, December 29, 1869.

His parents moved to McLennan County, Texas when he was 5 years old, where he grew to young manhood. He, with the family moved to Foard County, in the fall of 1890.

In the summer of 1891, in the first revival meeting held in the town of Crowell, he gave his heart to God, and joined the Methodist Church, of which he was a member until his death, Oct. 18, 1951, at his home near Matador. For sixty years "he walked with God and was not, for God took him."

He was married to Ida Taylor at Crowell, Texas, May 17, 1898. To this union four children were born, two of whom died in infancy, and two who survive: Mrs. Grady Starkey of Quitaque and J. E. Jameson, Jr., of Matador.

Ed Jameson was not only a member of the Methodist church but in his quiet unassuming way lived a christian life for 60 years.

He was my brother, and through the years we have been like Jonathan and David. I, with all the family, shall miss him, but we know where to find him.

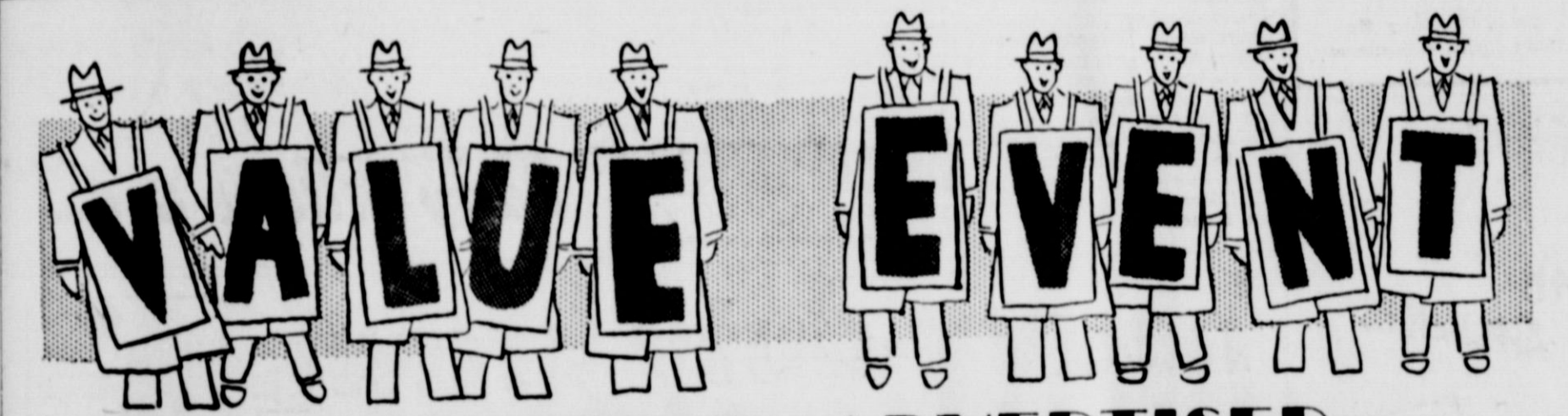

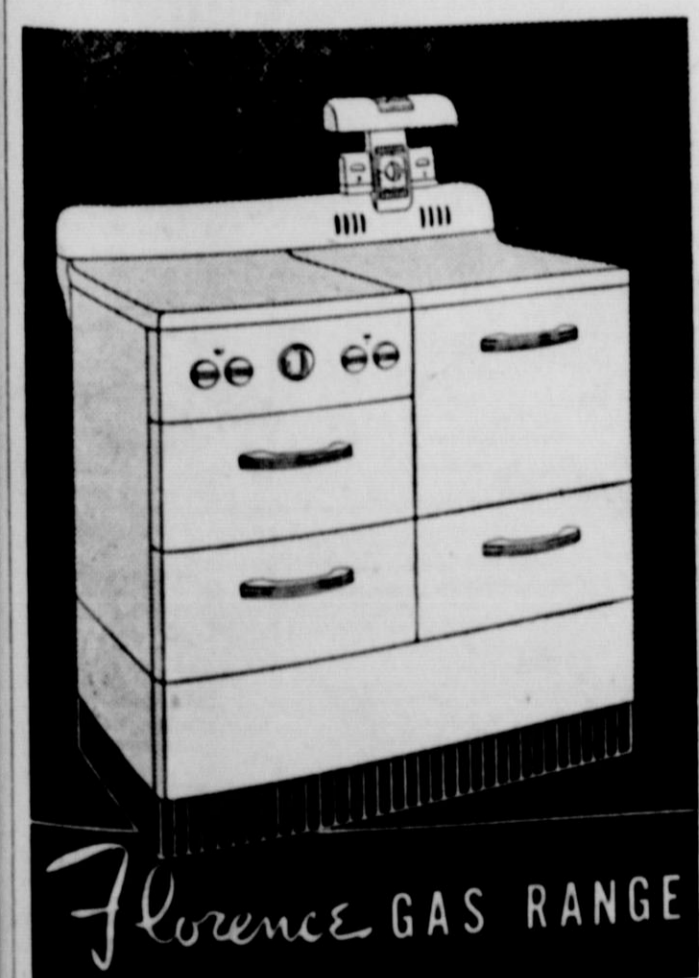

Most schools have a penalty study-hall for those misbehaving in class, such as talking, chewing gum, or not paying attention however, Matador High school has found the demerit system very satisfactory.

Each demerit counts three points off the conduct grade, which is shown on the report card each six weeks. Parents should pay particular attention to this grade to find how their children are cooperating or not cooperating, as the case may be, with their teachers.

Anyone getting ten demerits is suspended from school for three days unless his parents re-

enter him in school. He is warned that he is on dangerous ground when he has five demerits.

Our new report cards also have a column showing the student's attitude toward school work, recitation, and conduct. Under each heading is a list of reactions and an X is placed before the one that best describes the person's reaction.

A list of demerits, as well as

merits, is kept on a permanent record as long as the school exists and has a great and determined influence on the pupil's future.

DRY WEATHER COMES BACK TO TEXAS

AUSTIN—Drought is creeping back across Texas, apparently only temporarily by the end of the month.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that drought conditions have spread eastward and southward to again cover the state, except along the coast and some extreme eastern counties.

The dry weather has delayed the growth of small grains and has retarded growth of small grain and winter legume crops that were already up to a stand.

Development of range and pasture was slowing down last week in East and South Texas and again became dry. In Central and Blacklands counties growth of new feed was at a

near standstill, and in the West and Northwest cured range feed was short.

Except in irrigated sections, growth of small grain pastures was being checked by dry weather. Supplemental feeding of hay and concentrates continued to increase.

Seeding of wheat and other small grains was limited last week to a few dustings in the extreme Northwest. Small grains that were up to a stand made virtually no growth, and some crops were dying. Army worms were on the increase.

Harvest of grain sorghums continued in the High Plains, with some of the northern counties nearing the halfway mark.

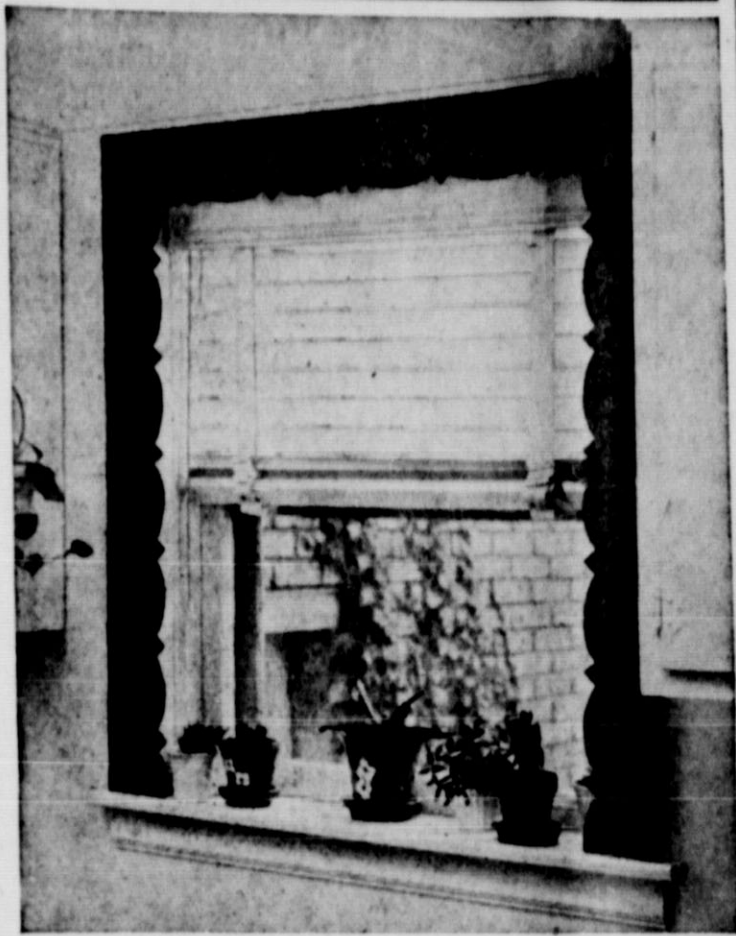

"If the government acted in a businesslike manner it could

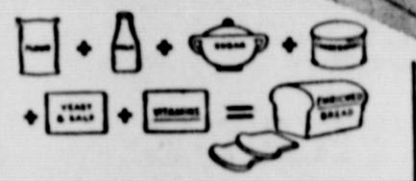
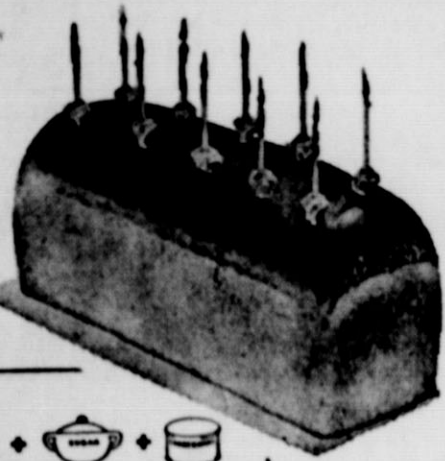
save enough on military items alone to more than offset the amount to be collected by this measure.

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
