At intervals his winnings would appear large but on the last night he lost everything to the professional whose soft white hands dealt cards with amazing dexterity. When his last dollar was gone the tall man looked in amazement at the bare board before him, then in an instant his fist was closed and he struck the gambler. The man fell from the bench to the floor and blood trickled out of the corner of his mouth, floating cigarette studs in its wake. Finally he roused but the Texan was gone. At the bunk house we found his bed as he had left it; the cheap suitcase missing.

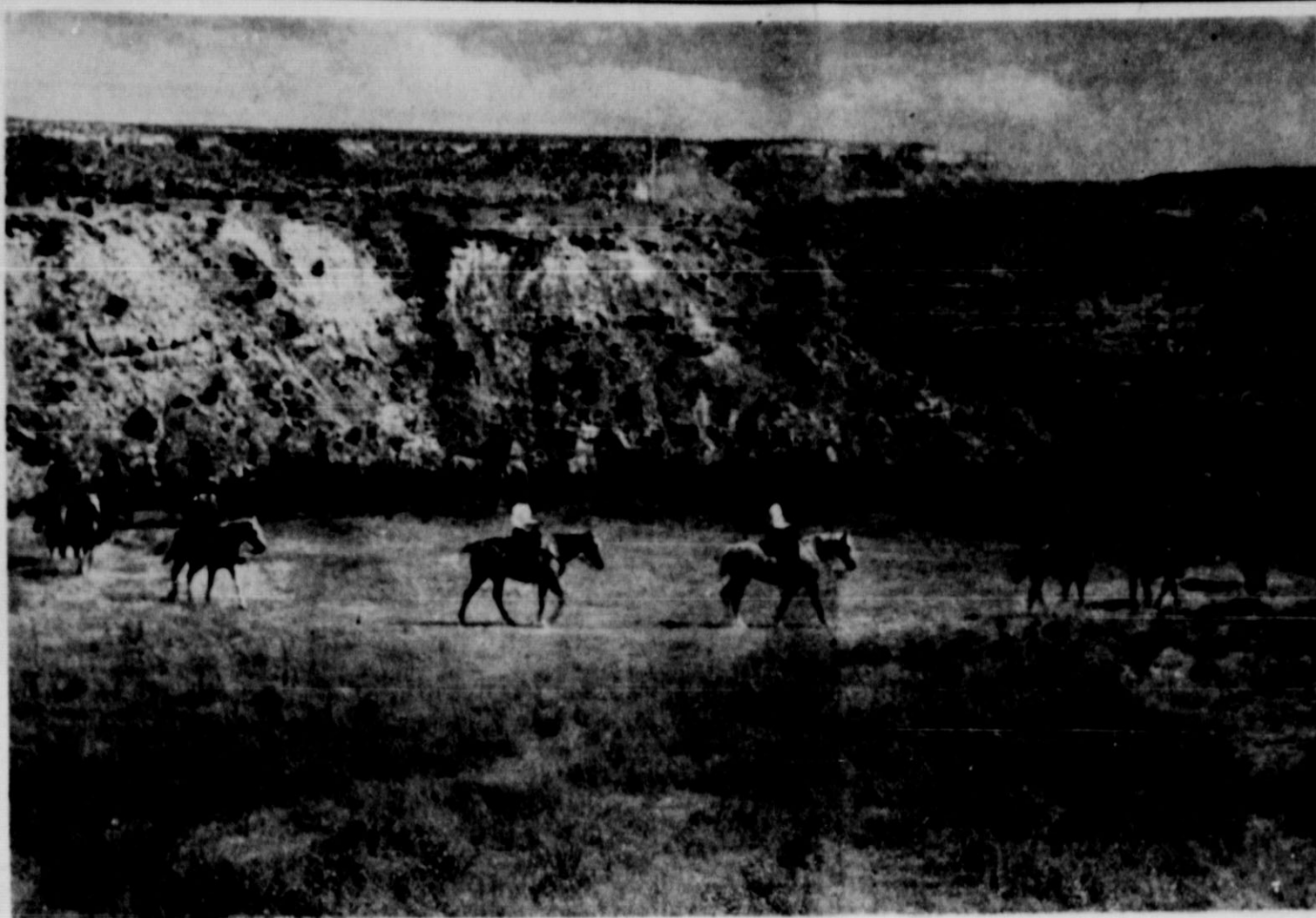
## HOME ON LEAVE

## Estimate on Cotton Set at 25,000 Bales

### ANTELOPE IS SHOT BY GAME POACHER

A four-prong buck antelope was shot and killed in the Rodam ranch pasture Sunday about noon west of Matador. The animal, a member of the herd of antelope placed in the Mott pasture several years ago by the State Game Fish and Oyster Commission, was killed with a 22 bullet hitting directly behind the ears. The poacher was apparently frightened away by approaching cars as the animal was killed near the fence on U. S. Highway 70. A passing motorist notified officers and Sheriff John Stotts investigated the incident. The antelope herd has become very tame and is frequently seen near the fence, undisturbed by passing automobiles. The motorist who saw the buck kicking after being shot, did not see an automobile in the vicinity Sheriff Stotts declared. The Mott camp pasture is a state game preserve.

### Saturday Closing Set Up To 3 p. m.

Saturday closing hour of the First State Bank here will be extended from 12 noon until 3 p. m., beginning October 6th, it was announced this week.

Through the summer months the bank custom is to close at noon on Saturdays but at the beginning of the busy harvest season the closing hour is extended until 3 p. m., the same as other days of the week.

### Warm, Dry Weather Maturing Much Of County's '51 Crop

SIZE of Motley county's 1951 cotton crop is a subject which has been receiving much discussion during the past week. County Agent Rufus Emmons who is perhaps the best informed person on county crop conditions, estimates the yield at 25,000 bales, aside from any unforeseen disaster.

"We have between 85,000 and 90,000 acres planted in cotton," Mr. Emmons declared. "We will probably be lower than the county's average yield of one-third bale per acre. Although some reliable estimates have been as high as 30,000 bales, I believe a 25,000-bale estimate is conservative. Many factors, still unknown are to be considered. A late frost would increase the yield while an early frost might greatly reduce it. Some boll worms are to be found in late cotton but the number is not alarming. Cotton with 5% or more infestation should be poisoned."

Cotton gins had passed the 100 bale mark at noon yesterday. Roaring Springs had ginned 48 bales, Matador 46 and Flomot eight bales for a total of 102.

Mr. Emmons said six farmers have already requested pickers in applications filed at his office. He said Lorenzo Aguilar of the Texas Employment Commission has been assigned to Cottle and Motley counties to aid in securing pickers. Farmers are requested to file need for pickers with the county agent's office or with any gin.

Mr. Emmons estimated that with favorable weather conditions the cotton harvest should get in full swing between the first and 15th of October.
