Big Loser
in County

Blue Cross group hospital service has sustained a severe loss in operation in Motley county during the past year, according to information furnished Motley county Farm Bureau secretary Bert Brown. For every dollar collected from premiums in the county, one dollar (\$1.48) and 40 cents has been paid in claims.

Blue Cross members carrying comprehensive service are entitled to 90 days with full benefits and 90 days with one-half benefits. This protection is available to the members and each dependent listed on application. If available time is not used within contract year, it does not accumulate to be used in following year. Contract begins on date which the member enrolled.

Farm Bureau members in good standing for six months may make application to join provided their income from agriculture for past six months has amounted to 61% of gross income. Members with less than 51% income may join another group or five or more sign up together. Bureau member employed by company with Blue Cross service, may transfer to company group insurance.

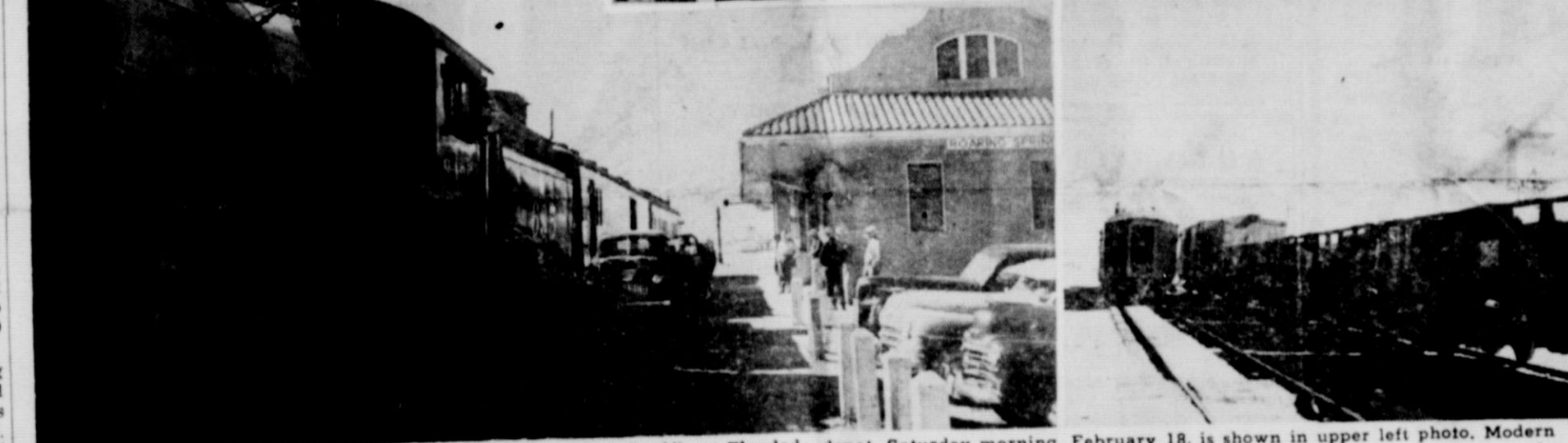
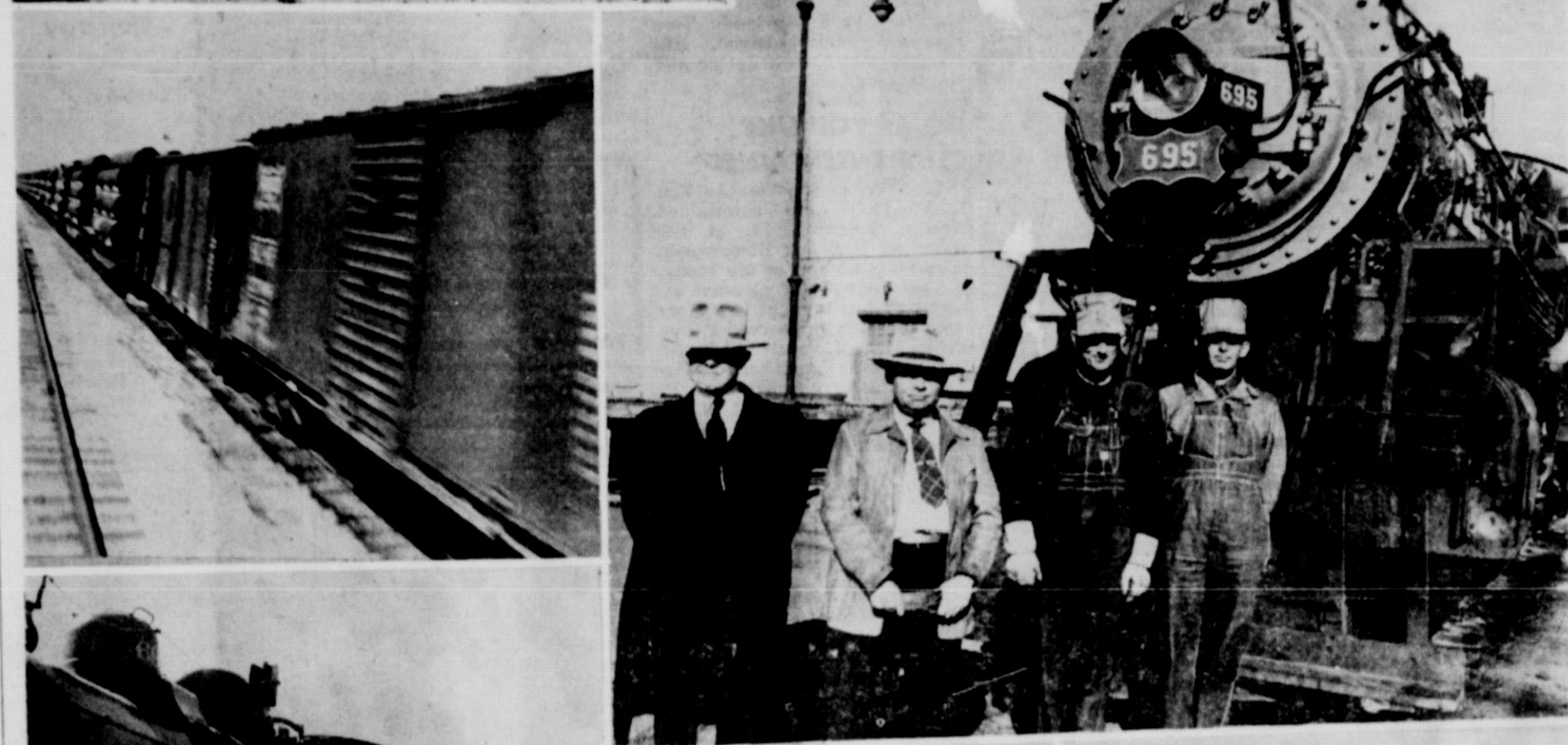

Appointed For Life



Worley's Secretary Is Candidate

Last week a "long surmised" news story broke with the announcement that President Truman had appointed another 18th Congressional District Congressman, Eugene Worley, to a lifetime job on a Supreme Court Bench.

Released with the story was the "also surmised" announcement that a former Amarillo woman, Mrs. Altavene Clark, secretary to Congressman Worley, and former secretary to Congressman Marvin Jones, would be a candidate for the office.

Mrs. Clark confirmed the announcement Saturday night in a telephone message from Washington, D. C. to editor Douglas Meador of the Tribune.

At present it is not known definitely when Congressman Worley's resignation will become effective. Texas Governor Shivers will schedule a special election when dates are established.

Mrs. Clark has served as Congressional secretary from the 18th District for the past 16 years and is familiar with the problems of the area. She served Congressman Marvin Jones effectively and was retained by Congressman Worley when he assumed office.

Mrs. Clark is scheduled to be in Amarillo this week. In a letter to the Tribune received Monday, she declared, "Shortly after I get home, I hope to announce detailed plans concerning the campaign and to give each voter my views frankly and honestly on all public questions of interest."

Near Jail-Break Is Discovered

Empty for the first time in several months Motley county's jail Tuesday morning was receiving a routine inspection by Sheriff John Stotts and Deputy jailer Jinks Wilson.

Pressing against the bars of a north window the officers discovered one bar broken (and set back in place) and that another bar was in the process of being removed. The near break had been achieved through the aid of an iron pipe removed from the plumbing. Sheriff Stotts believes the would-be escapees were frightened from the attempt.

Last week Sheriff Stotts transported three prisoners to Huntsville, making a total of eight since the first of the year (one prisoner was taken to the state reform school).

The officers declared sufficient heavy blankets were in the cells to have made escape possible had the other bar been broken. Welders have been employed to repair the damage.

Funeral services were held at Plainview Tuesday for Laverne Roach, 24, years old prize fighter who died in New York last Thursday as result of head injuries he received in the ring the previous night.

Roach, an idol of Plainview citizens, was the husband of a niece of Mrs. Elbert Reeves of Matador, and was guest of the Matador Lions club here about two years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Reeves attended the services which were held at the First Baptist church, Plainview, at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Dr. A. Hope Owen, pastor of the church, officiated.

The popular middleweight boxer's body arrived in Amarillo by rail at 11 p. m. Monday night.

Roach died about 12 hours after he was knocked out in the last round of a 10-round bout with George Small of Brooklyn. He was appearing in a series of "come-back" fights following retirement from the ring in 1948. Well ahead on the judge's score cards until the ninth round, Roach received two blows to the head in the tenth and the referee stopped the fight. Roach collapsed in his corner soon after the bout ended.

Attitude Of Driver Is Cause Of Most Accidents Study Club Members Learn

More men drivers than women cause the greater number of accidents on highways, 15% of the population cause 85% of these accidents; mechanical troubles cause 10% while the person behind the wheel is responsible for the other 90% of accidents—these and many other interesting statistical facts were brought to the attention of El Progresso Club members by Highway Patrolman Dan Saunders of Plainview in regular

meeting of the club last Thursday. The meeting was held in the district court room at the courthouse.

Although drunk drivers are often responsible for highway accidents, Mr. Saunders said, it is more often true that carelessness or recklessness of a sober driver can be blamed. "Sitting behind the wheel of an automobile seems to give the meek, most hen-pecked man a sense of power which often leads to traffic violations, highway accidents and even death," he declared.

"Some accidents happen for no apparent reason at all," he said in describing one in which a woman hit a train at a crossing, after passing a line of waiting cars to reach the intersection. He displayed a group of photographs of gruesome accidents which happened in Hale County last year, which he investigated.

Mr. Saunders also stressed the inadvisability of using one's personal car to convey an injured person to the hospital. "It is better to let the victim lie as quietly as possible until an ambulance can be summoned," he said explaining that hospital attendants know how to move a person with a minimum of pain, while the average person might cause further injury and possible death of the victim by attempting to move him, which often resulted in a law suit against the person trying to render aid. "The only time we rush a person to the hospital ourselves, is when he is bleeding so profusely that loss of

blood might cost his life", he stated.

At the conclusion of his talk, members discussed with Mr. Saunders, various traffic laws and means of apprehending and correcting violators.

Also on the program was Mrs. Freeman Thacker, who discussed "Safety in the Home", stressing especially, various dangers connected with installation of gas appliance outlets. Mrs. John Hamilton was program leader and the president, Mrs. Frank Pohl conducted the business session.

HEALTH OFFICER ISSUE WARNING AGAINST FLIES

Millions of flies help to cause the illness and death of thousands of children and adults each year in the United States. Hundreds of these casualties may be in the State of Texas this year if residents fail in their responsibility for developing the best possible sanitation measures in the area where they reside. Typhoid fever, summer complaint, and other intestinal diseases can be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of infection.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, speaking in this connection recently said, "Be sure that your windows and doors

are tightly screened so that stray flies from a careless neighbor will not endanger your family. Be sure that flies are kept away from food, drink, and utensils used in the preparation of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of flies. Infections from this source can be picked up and spread to human beings through contact with food, drink, and utensils. Keep all garbage covered until collected or buried. Eliminate all breeding places for flies and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling communicable diseases and preventing unnecessary illness."

Dr. Cox said that the State Health Department would furnish upon request a pamphlet outlining safe and practical methods recommended for use in fly control.

CAR DEALER GROUP WARNS OF BUYING "PIG-IN-A-POKE"

Texas citizens are warned by W. A. Williamson, vice-president and manager of the Texas Automobile dealer association, to beware in the purchase of new cars from others than factory authorized new car dealers.

"Allegedly new automobiles are being offered for sale now in many places by unauthorized dealers but those who buy from these sources learn to their sorrow that they have sacrificed not only the manufacturers' warranties but all the maintenance service and protection to which a new car buyer is entitled.

"The established, traditional distribution of new automobiles through the years has been made by local authorized dealers franchised by the manufacturer", Williamson said. "When cars or trucks are not purchased through these legitimate channels, buyers may well be getting a 'pig in a poke'.

"Even though a car may appear new, unless it carries with it a manufacturer's warranty, and has been given the recommended pre-delivery service, the purchaser may find he has made a sad and costly mistake when he goes back to the seller of the car for service. Authorized dealers give this service to their customers as a part of their funda-

mental philosophy that the sale of a car is merely the beginning of their efforts to provide service and satisfaction to all with whom they deal.

"A big risk taken by purchasers of new cars through other than factory authorized dealers is the possibility of improper or incomplete make-ready service before delivery. Authorized dealers can be depended upon to give all their new cars a double check before delivery to insure that they are safe for operation, that brakes, lights, and all other safety devices built into today's fine automobiles are perfect and in good working order. It's a serious risk to buy a new car without this assurance of proper service and inspection at the retail level and without a factory warranty to provide proper maintenance checks as mileage is put on the new car by the buyer.

"The factory authorized dealers of Texas are working with the State and National associations in the public interest to stamp out the so-called bootlegging of new cars and new trucks so that all buyers may receive the valuable services and protection to which they are entitled."

His success was continuous and brilliant with an unbroken string of 25 ring victories when he was knocked out in the eighth round by Marcel Cerdan, March 12, 1948. Soon after that defeat he retired, moved to Plainview, married the former Evelyn Winkels and later went into the insurance business at Lubbock.

Mrs. Roach, step-daughter of Mrs. Reeves' brother, Herbert Castleberry, was with her husband when he died. They were making their home at Maplewood, N. J.

Besides his wife and two children, Ronnie Mac and Rickey, Roach is survived by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Roach; a sister, Miss Beth Roach all of Plainview; a brother, Bill Roach student at West Texas State College, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Ferguson, Plainview.
