**Meet The Faculty
Personality Sketch**

In beginning this series of per-
sonality sketches of the faculty
of Matador Public Schools, I
think it fitting to begin with one
of the outstanding and worthy
citizens of our community, Mr.
Vance Gilbreath.

Vance Gilbreath was born in

Tribune, Matador, Matley County, Texas, Thursday, October 4, 1951

Lampasas county in 1907 and
lived there until he graduated
from high school in 1924. He at-
tended Texas A&M College one
year, and he jokingly told me, it
took him ten years to get his
Bachelor of Science Degree in
Education from Texas Tech at
Lubbock.

Of course, part of that ten
years was spent teaching. He
taught his first 4 years at Bar-
ton, one year at Montgomery,
two years at Big Four in Crosby
county, seven years at Ralls, and
four years at Matador. He can
certainly tell some amusing
stories of his teaching experi-
ences, here's one I'll pass on to
you. While teaching at Mont-
gomery, he had the best job in
the county at \$90. per month for
six months, while other teachers
made only \$50 and \$60 a month.
There had to be a catch some-
where, and there was! He had
three students, who seldom came
at all, however, Mr. Gilbreath
did not lack for company. Be-
tween the coyotes close by and
the family of skunks under the
school house, he led rather a
hectic life. O' yes, he also recalls
there was a prairie dog town in
the front yard.

There were other interests in
his life other than teaching and
going to school, for in 1928, he
married Miss Wynona Ford
from Teepee Creek.

Mr. Gilbreath entered the
Army in 1942 as a private and
was released in 1946 with the
rank of Captain. He is now in
the Air Force Reserve and is a
member of the Squadron of
Plainview.

In the summer he farms two
hundred acres of land and tends
about seventy-five head of cat-
tle on his farm-ranch nine miles
southeast of Matador.

He is a member of the Amer-
ican Legion, VFW, Masonic
Lodge and Lions club. In addi-
tion to his duties as principal
of Matador High school, he teaches
a Sunday School class at the
First Methodist church.

He's living a full and very
worthwhile life, don't you







