The rows of barns are falling in, like windrows of hopeless dreams.

A 28-year old Texas Highway Department employee who was charged with murder with malice in connection with the early Sunday shooting death of James Peyton Legg, 34 of Afton, was freed Monday afternoon on a \$5,000 bond.

Eddie D. "Petsy" Timmons of Matador was arrested in Childress about 11 a.m. Monday where he was attending a THD engineering meeting. The arrest was made by Sheriff J. D. Spray accompanied by Deputy J. E. Russell, Texas Ranger Leo Hickman and Childress County Sheriff J. E. Benham.

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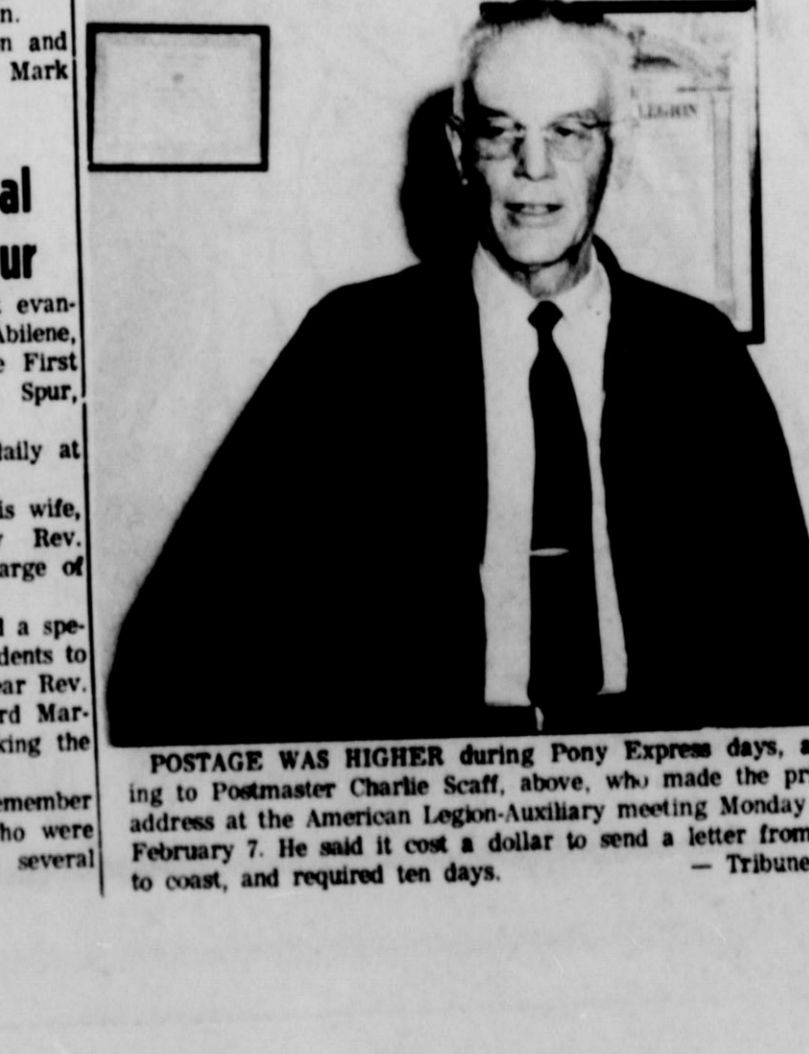

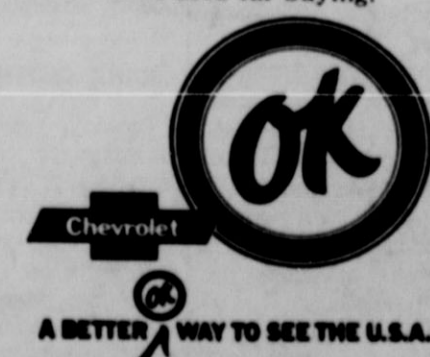

CHEMICAL BREAKTHROUGH IMPROVES MESQUITE CONTROL

LUBBOCK, Tex. — The federal government has approved use of a new herbicide for control of mesquite on rangeland in Texas and the men who know are calling it a major breakthrough in the state's war on 88 million acres of brush.

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this product registered at a time of the year when we can incorporate it into our 1972 spring spray programs," said John A. Matthews, Abilene, chairman of the Texas Brush Control and Range Improvement Association, a rancher's organization that has funded certain research projects to test Tordon 225 and has actively supported the effort to have the material registered for use.

Matthews said brush has moved in on 88 million of the 107 million acres of rangeland on which Texans grow 10 per cent of the nation's beef and 20 percent of its wool and the need for better control methods is urgent. "Despite our best efforts to control brush," he added, "brush has gained eight million acres on us since World War II."

Fisher said Tordon 225 consistently has killed approximately two times more brush than previous herbicides in tests on 20 range sites throughout the state. He expects ranchers to begin use of the new material on a wide scale this year.

"News that Tordon finally has been registered for use on the range is most welcome," added the 30-year veteran in brush control research. "It's what we've been working for." He explained that A&M had worked with The Dow Chemical Company since 1963 to develop data demonstrating that the new material is both safe and effective when used according to directions.

Texas ranchers first were given an opportunity to try the new chemical on rangeland during the 1970 brush spraying season under terms of an experimental label granted by the Texas Department of Agriculture. The material was not available in 1971 while evaluation of the experimental program and previous data continued.

and that application will be monitored by Dow personnel.

Grumbles said results can be expected to parallel those obtained in the continuing Texas A&M field research. In West Texas, figures from that work show that Tordon 225 at the one quart per acre rate killed 42 per cent of the mesquite on research sites compared to a 22 per cent kill using a half pound of 2, 4, 5-T, the previously recommended control method. Tordon 225 also materially increased the percentage kill of jotsbush, prickly pear and annual broomweed when compared with equivalent rates of 2, 4, 5-T alone.

In South Texas, according to Texas A&M Extension Range Specialist Garyn O. Hoffman, Tordon 225 at the suggested half gallon per acre rate killed 74 per cent of the mesquite, 68 per cent of the blackbrush, 61 per cent of the granjeno, 35 per cent of the lime prickly ash and 34 per cent of the whitebrush on research sites. By comparison, 2, 4, 5-T killed only 25 per cent of the mesquite and negligible amounts of other species.

Dr. J. B. Grumbles, Lubbock, director of brush control field research in Texas for Dow, said the label recommends use of one quart of Tordon 225 per acre in West Texas and twice that much in South Texas. He said cost is expected to range from \$5 to \$10 an acre. He added that only bonded aerial applicators who have attended special schools will be authorized to apply Tordon 225

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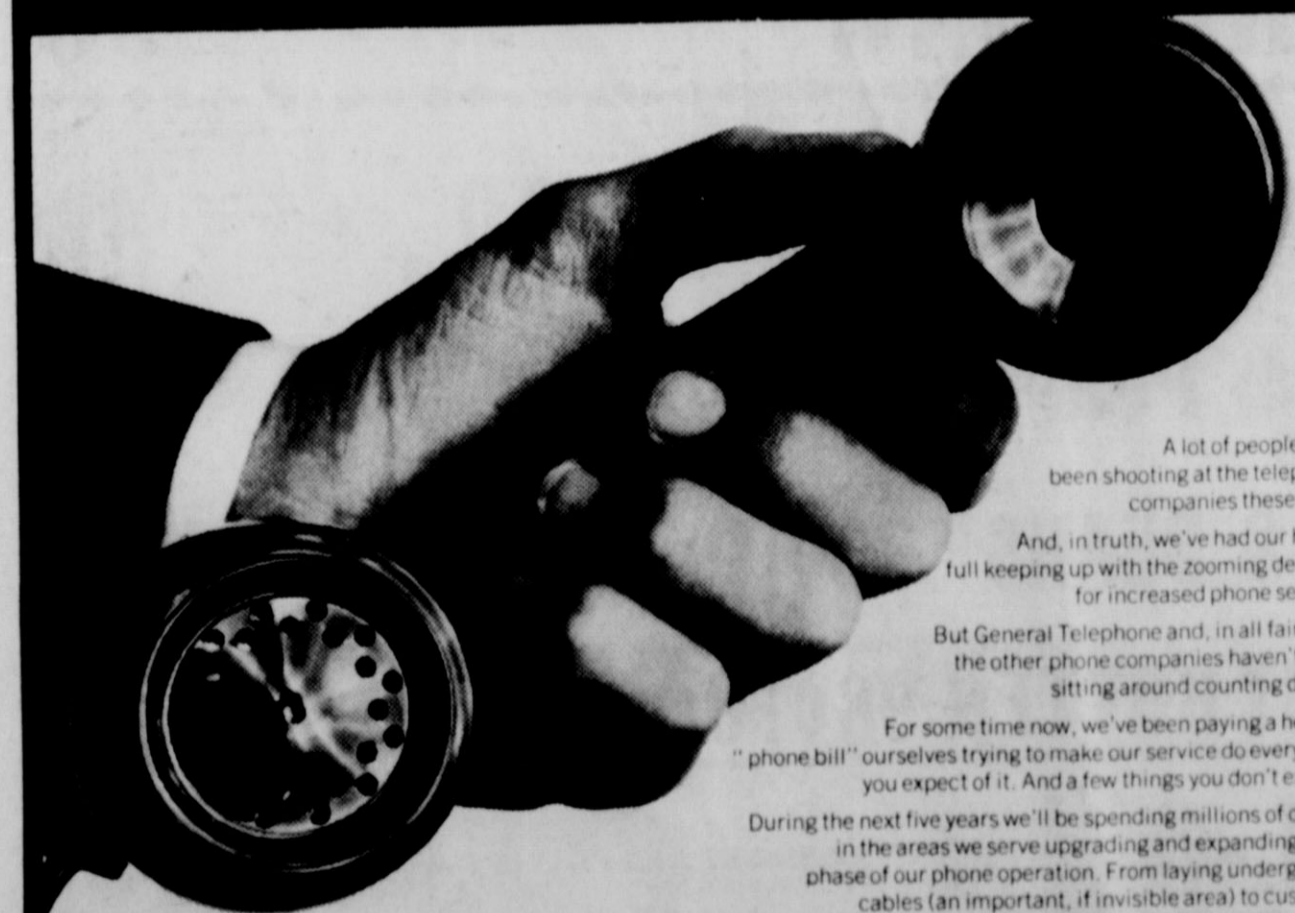
