

# County Left With Only One Run-Off in 2nd Primary

## Berryman Nominated in Brisk Race for Commissioner Place

### Corbin, Parrish To Clash In Run-Off

### Rogers' Race Easy For State Office

With returns from Saturday's democratic primary complete except for three small boxes in Kent county, County Judge Kilmer Corbin of Lamesa, and incumbent Sterling Parrish, of Lubbock, strengthened their one-two positions Tuesday in the four-cornered contest for the state Senate from the 30th Senatorial district.

The unofficial tabulations Monday, which were complete for 23 of the 24 counties, showed Corbin, 17,341; Parrish, 15,832; Ralph Brock of Lubbock, 15,117 and Dudley Brummett of Lubbock, 11,854.

Barring wholly unexpected and unindicated upsets, Corbin and Parrish will be opponents in the runoff primary August 28.

In Motley county Brummett received 413, Parrish 162, Brock 307 and Corbin 74.

In most of the state-wide races Motley county voters mirrored the choice of the majority. For U. S. Senator, Coke Stevenson received 597, Lyndon Johnson 271 and George Peddy 82.

For Governor, Beauford Jester received 625, Roger Evans 116 and Caso March 112. For Lieutenant Governor, Allan Shivers received 695 and Turner Walker 212. For Chief Justice of Supreme Court, J. E. Hickman received 616 and Charles Rowland 230.

For Associate Justice of Supreme Court, John Rawlin received 390 and James Hart 433. For unexpired term, John Garwood 329 and Jefferson Smith 448. For Judge of Criminal Appeals, Harry Graves 441 and W. E. Myers 355.

For Railroad Commissioner regular term, Ernest O. Thompson 627 and Tom Blakey 277. For unexpired term, William Murray 572, Clyde Austin 121 and Carlton Moore 106. For Comptroller of Public Accounts, Geo. Sheppard 692 and Clifford Butler 290.

For Commissioner of General Land Office, Bascom Giles 559, William Mayfield 91, R. J. Robinson 49 and Carl Smith 140. For treasurer, Jesse James 553 and Bruce Loyd 307. ## Railway Will Lose Local Postal Haul

### Early Service For Area Begins Aug. 1

Effective August 1, Railroad Route 111739 from Quanah to Floydada will be discontinued and a daily star route will be established from Vernon to Matador and certain other offices to Floydada and Lockney.

This statement is in a letter from the office of General Superintendent, 11th Division, Railway Mail Service of Fort Worth, to local postmaster E. F. Springer, means that Matador is going to have early morning mail service.

Beginning August 1 Matador will receive mail between 7:30 and 8:00 a. m., brought direct from Vernon by Mistletoe Rapid Transit motor line (same firm that has been bringing daily papers and Sunday mail).

It means that local patrons will no longer be forced to wait at the postoffice and inquire about what time the mail will arrive. It means that after about 33 years of mail service via the Q. A. & P. Railway, Matador will again receive its mail by motor transit. But much is changed since the chugging "line-car" plowed the rough dirt roads between Matador, Paducah and Floydada. Today fleet trucks glide over the faultless pavement on "60 miles-per-hour" schedules.

Improved Dispatch. Postmaster Springer declared that letter dispatch service will also be improved through the new schedule. Mail leaving here on the 8:00 a. m. dispatch for Spur, will arrive at 11 a. m., Stamford at 7:30 p. m. and Lubbock at 2:45 p. m. No change will be made in the 1:30 p. m. dispatch to Lubbock via Turkey. It will be in Lubbock at 11:30 p. m. No change will be made in the evening dispatch to all points east at 5:30.

Following are more excerpts from the letter to Postmaster Springer, Dated July 23, and signed by H. K. Coale, general superintendent. "We will use the existing messenger route at Roaring Springs as a means of supplying that office from Matador. It is expected that the Vernon-Lockney star carrier will pass Matador about 7:30 a. m. or 8:00 a. m. on his outbound trip and on return trip will pass Matador about 8 p. m. It is expected that the Roaring Springs postmaster will have the messenger (Arthur M. Harmon) make two round trips a day; one in the early morning, and the other in the late afternoon for receipt and dispatch of mails for his office, and he (the Postmaster) may designate the exact schedule for each trip to afford the best service."

Change in the antiquated mail service to towns along the route has been under consideration by the postal department for a period of years. (Protest of the Matador Lions Club at the service in a meeting last week, did not effect the change. However, the Fort Worth office of the Postal Department was aware of the protest).

## Soil Conservation Doubled For 1949

Plans may now be developed for a 1949 Agricultural Conservation Program offering farmers almost twice as much assistance for conservation practices as was available under this year's program.

For the current fiscal year, the Agriculture Department Appropriation Act sets aside \$150 million for the 1948 program, including administrative expenses. This was the amount Congress authorized last year for developing the 1948 program. Congress this year has authorized the development of a 1949 program amounting to \$262.5 Million.

Rolling constantly City of Matador's new International truck (equipped with hydraulic dump bed) is cutting its way through the filth heap in alleys and streets.

City officials are receiving daily more reports from satisfied citizens, pleased with the manner in which the new permanent cleanup plan is functioning.

Department of Public Sanitation employee John Lee is making good his promise to clean up the town, despite the magnitude of his task. It is believed that the first of semi-monthly rounds in the residential area may be completed within a week or ten days and at the same time maintain the daily business section service.

Residents will be asked to pay 75c per month for residential service, and business houses will be asked to pay a fair charge for the daily service according to the type of business.

Home-owners are asked to have trash and rubbish in containers (barrels, boxes, sacks or tubs) in their alleys. No pickup will be made outside of the alley area. Brush may be piled in the alley or in the street in front of homes and it will be removed as soon as possible.

OUT OF THE PAST, above envelope postmarked Teepee City, Texas, May 23, 1887, was addressed to W. V. B. Tilson of Tilsontown, Virginia and written by deceased Motley county pioneer W. R. Tilson. Teepee City was established in 1880 as the first post office in the county. The settlement was founded in 1876, as headquarters for buffalo hunters, Texas Rangers and early settlers. A. B. Cooper, father of Jim Cooper and Miss Nora Cooper of Matador, was postmaster. Much of the early history of the county was associated with the long "vanished city." No trace remains, except shallow places where dugouts were located and two unmarked graves. A Texas Centennial stone marker stands on the site, now in the Matador pasture. In the letter accompanying the above envelope, early settler Tilson told relatives in Virginia of the many advantages of the country and that he had purchased a "bunch" of cows. So far as is known the envelope, now the property of Tom Tilson, is the only one in existence bearing a Teepee City postmark.

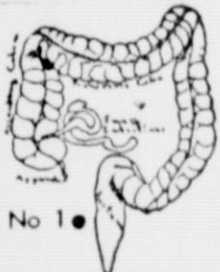

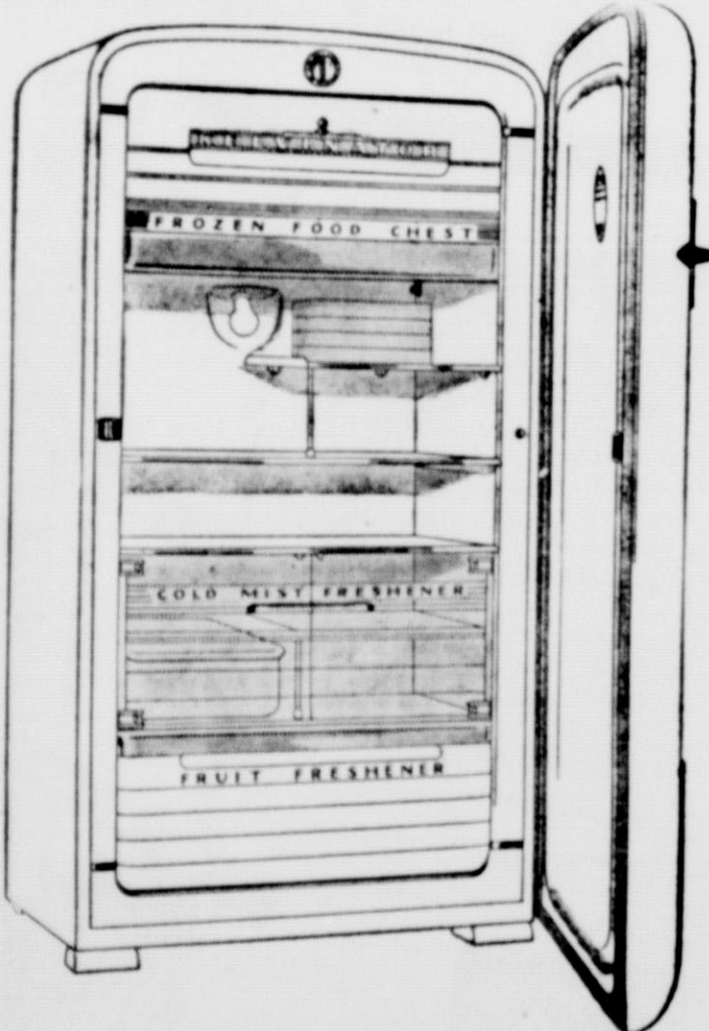

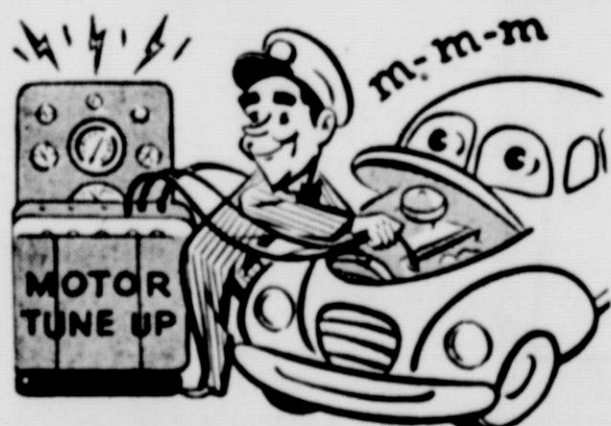
