He was arrested Tuesday, March 23, in Roaring Springs by Sheriff J. D. Spray and Deputy Bobby Williams, while in a pickup and in the employ of the Rock Island Company (Matador Ranch). He had been working for the ranch about a week. His arrest was the result of a letter.

After Campbell had secured a job he went to "Dood" Dameron, manager of the Matador Boot and Shoe Shop and offered to put up a 1961 Chrysler automobile as security for a saddle, hat and boots, riding pants, shirt and jacket. Mr. Dameron accepted the offer in good faith. Later he thought over the deal and wrote to the McCarty Motors in Douglas, Georgia, from an address which he

## MRS. A. L. FAIR HAS DIRECTED FHA IN MATADOR FOR 14 YEARS

For fourteen years, Mrs. A. L. Fair has directed the destiny of girls learning to be Future Homemakers in Matador. Her efforts have been rewarding. Five local girls have served as area officers of Area 1, all of whom, with one exception have attended national meetings in Chicago, Ill. Two girls, Frances Lancaster and Barbara Waybourn attended the national meeting as local officers because some area officers could not go.

Mrs. Fair estimates that about 390 girls have enrolled in homemaking since she has been here. However, this includes a repetition, since some of the girls were re-enrolled for second and third year classes.

Area officers have included Glenda Smith, Parliamentarian; Jan Barton, President; Christina Damron, Parliamentarian; and Scottie Robbins, Treasurer. All of these except Glenda Smith attended a national meeting. The first State Degrees in FHA were earned in 1955, and since that time, 33 local girls have earned their junior and chapter degrees.

Mrs. Fair (Ida Mae), has taught school 24 years, nine in Arkansas, one in Oklahoma and the remaining 14 in Matador. She has a Bachelor of Science degree from Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, and has done graduate work at Arkansas University, Oklahoma State and Texas Tech.

She moved here with her family, in 1951. Mr. Fair is also a member of the Matador School faculty. One son, Joe is enrolled in Texas Tech and working in Lubbock. Their other son, Lewis is practicing pharmacy in Shawnee, Oklahoma. They have one daughter, Ida Lee, who is married (Mrs. James Bryant) and living in Bryan, Texas.

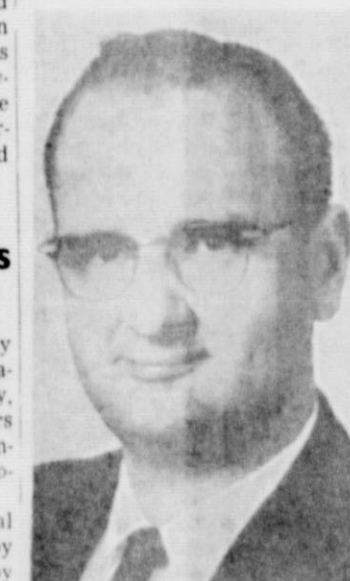

She had formerly taught in the Flomot and Roaring Springs school systems in this area, and taught one term in the Liberty school northeast of Muleshoe during the 1938-39 term.

Damron, at Paducah, and after living for a year at Muleshoe, they came to Matador in 1940. She was a member of the First Baptist Church here.

Survivors include her husband, two daughters, Mrs. Oscar Hughes (Christine) of Odessa and Mrs. Rex Martin (Marianne) of Matador; and two grandchildren, Shelly Ann Hughes and David Lewis Martin. ## Stock Show Prizes Will Approach \$700

CASH PRIZES in the 25th annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show to be held here Saturday in the Matador High School agricultural building, will be in the neighborhood of \$700.

County Agent Bill Palmeyer said yesterday that the money is waiting for the 4-H Club boys and girls and FFA boys who show the top animals.

Palmeyer paid tribute to the officers and directors of the Motley County Livestock Association, which sponsors the Livestock show. Malcolm Turner of Flomot is President. Other members of the board include Herb Martin of Flomot, Lewis Bostick and Bob Thompson of Matador; Bill Hand and F. E. Brandon of Roaring Springs. He also paid high tribute to the Flomot, Roaring Springs and Matador Lions Clubs in their support of the stock show.

At last countdown the prize money will be \$680 and may vary because of the number of projects entered. Palmeyer revised the list of possible entry projects to include 65 swine, 18 steers and 9 or 10 heifers.

He said present indications are that nine or 10 out-of-town buyers will be on hand to make offers for the top livestock in the show.

As usual the admission is free. Judging will start promptly at 1 p.m., Palmeyer said.

## Man From Roaring Springs Aboard Intrepid Assigned For Astronauts

All the eyes and ears of the world were attuned March 23 (Tuesday) to an expedition in space covering some 81,000 miles by Astronauts Air Force Major Virgil "Gus" Grissom and Navy Lieutenant Commander John Young who made three orbits of the earth in four hours and 54 minutes.

The U. S. Aircraft Carrier Intrepid was stationed some 165 miles north of the Dominican Republic, some 700 miles down range from Cape Kennedy. The big ship was named the primary recovery ship for the two passengers of the Gemini space capsule.

A Roaring Springs youth, Keith Brooks RM-3, son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Brooks, was aboard the Intrepid which waited in vain for the astronauts who hit the Atlantic some 50 to 60 nautical miles short of the ship.

A helicopter quickly transferred the two famous men to the Intrepid. Air from the blades blew away the welcome mat that had been spread on the Intrepid but it was quickly rescued.

Guest Speaker Observes

### Combining Business Career with Marriage is Challenge of Senses

"What greater challenge could there be to both husband and wife, than that of combining a business career with marriage?" Mrs. W. B. Conroe of Lubbock asked a listening audience of El Progresso Study Club members, their husbands and other guests, Thursday night.

Occasion was the annual Gentlemen's Night held by the club, and scene of the dinner and program was the basement of the First Methodist Church.

"No subject — outside, perhaps of the racial issue — is more written or talked about than the working wife," Mrs. Conroe declared. "Since men are married too, you know this could be considered from the standpoint of the man combining a business career with marriage."

"Each of us was given five physical senses," she continued, "and it is to be hoped that each of us, whether male or female, would have the additional good common sense to develop and foster five additional senses: A sense of humor, a sense of responsibility, a sense of adventure, a sense of fair play, and a sense of loyalty."

"Mutual appreciation, mutual admiration, mutual consideration — these are the keys that turn the lock to success for any partnership, whether it is in the world of commerce, or the one that begins with the vow, 'For better, for worse; for richer, for poorer; in sickness and in health.'"

**Biblical References**  
Mrs. Conroe devoted much of her talk to Biblical references to women who worked and were considered successful businesswomen, and to the relationship between Man and Woman as created by God "In The Beginning."

At the conclusion of her address, Mrs. Conroe, upon request related many interesting experiences of her trip to the Orient last year for the dedication of

the Dr. Minnie L. Maffett Nurses Residence in Taiwan.

"In my opinion," she stated, "the Japanese people are the only friends we have in the Orient. In Taiwan they accept our aid, and consider us as 'suckers' . . . others look on us with indifference. The Japanese people are friendly and courteous, and are as regretful as we are, that we were enemies during the last war. . . I went there with bitterness in my heart . . . but it soon disappeared."

The former Hope Clements, Mrs. Conroe graduated from Matador High School as valedictorian of her class. The Class Prophecy that year foretold that she would be "The First Woman President," a classmate, Mrs. Forrest Campbell (Jerry Tudor), president of El Progresso Club recalls.

Mrs. Conroe, immediate past-president of the Texas Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, was introduced by Douglas Meador, Publisher of the Matador Tribune. She is employed with a firm of Public Certified Accountants and is affiliated with numerous auxiliaries of the Business and Professional Women's organization, not only of Lubbock but of the State Federation as well. She was accompanied here by Mrs. Ruth Seveland of Lubbock.

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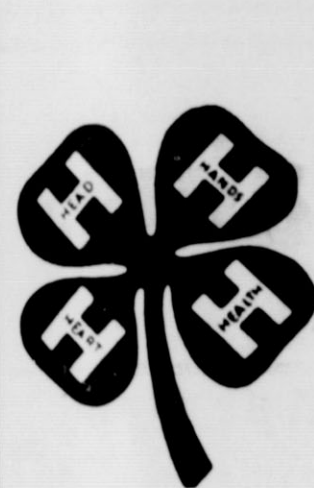

### 13. Q. COULD ELDERLY PATIENTS SELECT THE HOSPITAL OR NURSING HOME OF THEIR CHOICE UNDER PROPOSED MEDICARE PLANS?

A. Under the Eldercare program, the patient would have free choice of physician, hospital and nursing home. Under Medicare, free choice of hospital and nursing home would be impossible in some instances. For example, the bill states that only nursing homes "having arrangement with a hospital" are eligible to be in the program. Fewer than 1500 of the nation's 25,000 nursing homes could qualify. In some states only one or two nursing homes would be eligible for the program. This certainly would not offer free choice of nursing home to many elderly. In fact, it obviously would be difficult for a patient to get into a nursing home if fewer than 1500 in the nation would be eligible under the Medicare plan. Furthermore, to qualify for Medicare coverage, the patient would have to be transferred to a nursing home directly from a hospital.

If a hospital chosen by the patient was not participating under the Medicare plan, the patient would have to go elsewhere. If the patient's personal physician was not on the staff of a participating hospital, the elderly patient would have to accept another doctor.

### 14. Q. WHO WOULD PAY FOR HEALTH CARE BENEFITS FOR TODAY'S ELDERLY WHO WOULD BECOME ELIGIBLE FOR BENEFITS, BUT WOULD NOT HAVE PAID ANY TAXES FOR SUCH A PROGRAM?

A. Under the proposed Medicare tax plan, an additional tax burden approximating \$20 billion would be placed on the shoulders of today's and tomorrow's younger workers and their dependents. The \$20 billion is the estimated cost of the nation's present-day elderly during the rest of their lives. It is this money which, Medicare would shift all with a few simple words. Many elderly it is even more serious and difficult to imagine the nation's young wage earners with this huge tax burden which burdens the today's elderly can afford to provide for their own care.

Under Eldercare, the elderly who need help in financing their health care costs would receive the wide range of benefits. Today, the tax burden on workers would be substantially less.

### 15. Q. WOULD THE ELDERCARE PROGRAM CALL FOR A "MONEY TRUST"?

A. To qualify for Eldercare, the elderly person would submit a simple statement of income during the information period to that which he now gives in opening a bank account at a local bank. There would be no welfare type investigation, no listing of assets.

### 16. Q. HOW MANY PEOPLE NOW HAVE HEALTH INSURANCE?

A. More than 78 per cent of all people in the nation — and over 80 per cent of the elderly — already have protected themselves against the cost of illness through health insurance and prepayment plans. Eldercare would encourage the growth and expansion of health insurance.
