

# 3 Calves Will Enter 4-H Club Stock Show

SEVEN CALVES in the Matador County 4-H Club stock show here April 16, will be three times as great as last year.

At the meeting Monday night prizes were set for calves and judges announced. Judges will be Jack Idol, manager of the League ranch near Benjamin, and Dee Burns, manager of the Pitch Fork ranch, with John Stevens, manager of the local Matador ranch assisting.

Grand champion calf will receive \$12, fourth \$11, fifth \$10, sixth \$9, seventh \$8, eighth \$7, ninth \$6 and tenth \$5. The 1949 stock show is sponsored by the Motley County Farm Bureau, while in former years it was sponsored by the Matador Lions Club.

A new prize this year will be for showmanship. Secret judges will name the boy as winner whom they believe displays the best showmanship. Calves will be weighed several days in advance of the show.

Prizes for the pig division were not announced but will probably start at \$7.50. Mr. Emmons declared the calves to be entered in this year's show were fairly uniform in age.

Special effort will be made to secure sale of the calves locally, at the conclusion of the show. A qualified auctioneer will probably conduct the sale.

Attending the meeting Monday night, in addition to Mr. Emmons, were Bill Moss, Joe Gaines, John Russell, Elmer Stearns, John Stevens, Ben Edwards and Douglas Meador.

## Deep Plowing Is Given Test Here

Farmers interested in observing deep plowing in this area may witness "farmland turned upside down" on the 100-acre Ben Edwards farm, north of Pease river and west of state highway 70, near Whiteflat.

Four giant disc plows cut the soil 16 to 22 inches and in many instances turned up clay to hold the sand from blowing. The field following the plowing, was so soft it was almost impossible to walk over it and conventional tractor tires would sink deeply.

Rain is declared necessary for packing sufficiently to permit working. Cost of deep plowing is in the neighborhood of \$9 per acre, \$3 of which is paid for by the government.

## Machinery Firm To Sponsor Hand Book

Handbooks for the 1949 Motley County Agricultural Conservation Program are being sponsored (paid for) by the Jameson Machinery Company of Matador. Brief addresses were made by Coach Frank Kimbrough of West Texas State, Coach Del Morgan Texas Tech, Coach Collins of the School of Mines, Joe Kelly of the Lubbock Avalanche Journal and Frank Godsoe of the Amarillo Globe-News. They were all special guests at the banquet.

## Legion History Is Traced By Speaker

"A Republican doesn't have a chance in Texas," Willson declared, taking a rap at President Truman's playing poker in Key West on his vacation, "but we talk about chance with tomorrow before us and tomorrow is a chance... we are all gamblers... now you take marriage..."

"The American Legion was organized by 1,000 soldiers in Paris 30 years ago," he explained, "and today we have 17,000 posts and we are working on three millions membership. I didn't help organize the Legion. I was in Paris at the time but I was busy with other matters... the Legion today owns more than \$100 million in property and has spent more than \$70 million in the aid of widows and orphans... the American Legion is the foremost champion of liberty..."

"Ideals can not be destroyed by military might," Mr. Willson declared, "we have two wars behind us to prove that ideologies still remain... we must teach them another way of life... communism is a religion... but communism will not grow in the soil of democracy... gun powder has done more harm than good and the same may be true of the atom bomb... I believe we can show the world a better way of life... but I am not certain of all the answers. I think we should turn Legion duties to younger members... it is their world and we older members are getting too crabbed, miserly and narrow-minded to continue..."

Mr. Willson was introduced by Legionaire Randall Whitworth, Post Commander Albert Rattan and a few brief announcements at the beginning of the program.

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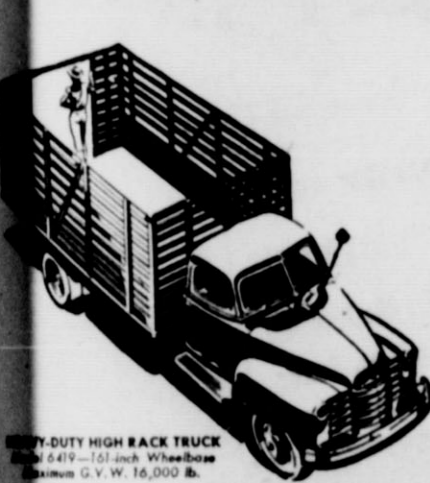
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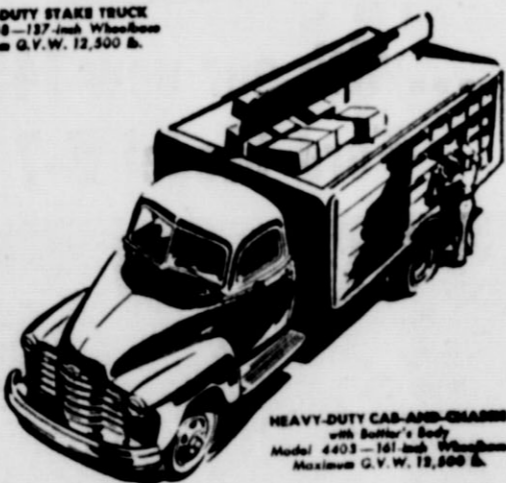
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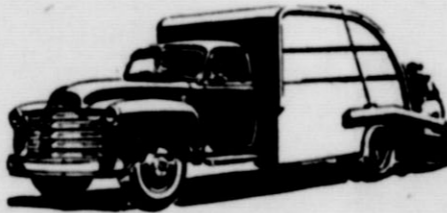
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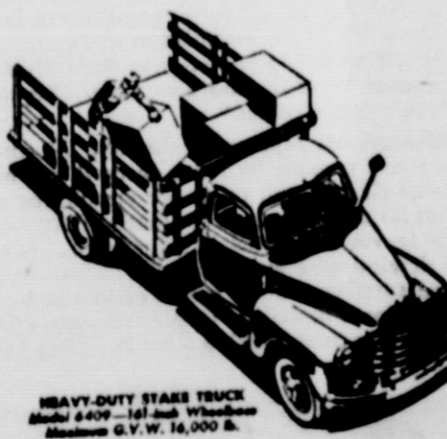
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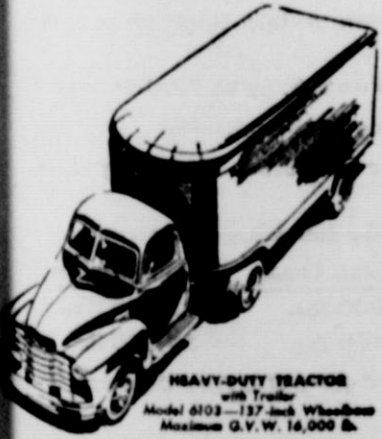
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### Brotherhood Hears Mt. Blanco Layman

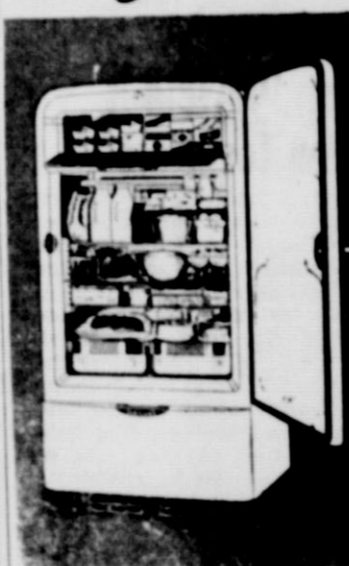

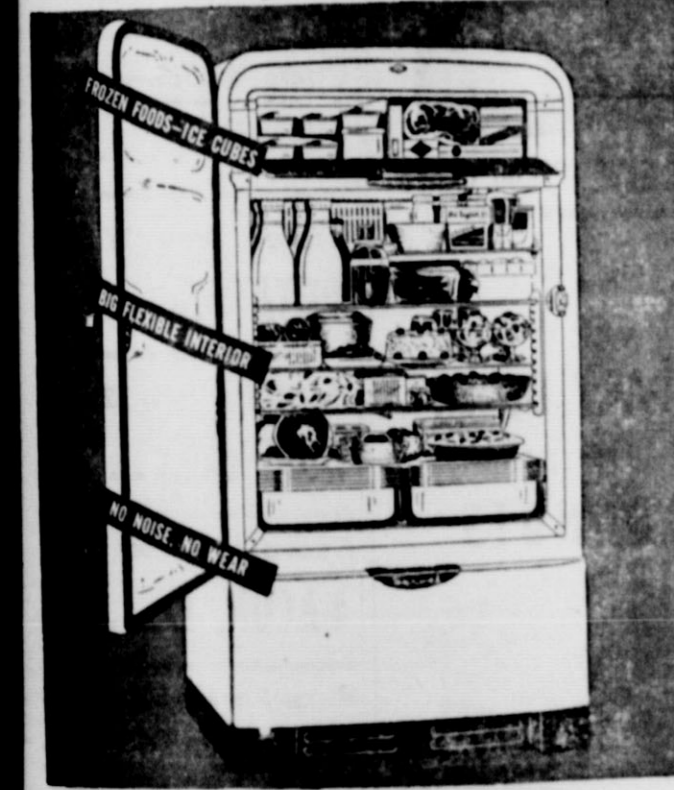

earn enough for food to feed his family—in 1914. Today, 12 hours of work each week will buy the family food for a week. Does that sound like farmers are getting too much for what they produce? Doesn't that show that price supports have kept food prices down, at a time when other prices and wages increased? In fact, wages went up about 500 percent when food costs rose only 150 percent.

What freedom would any farmer lose if he accepted high price supports? Maybe the folks who talk against high support prices are worried about the fact that farmers may be told to reduce the acreage of some crops. We wonder if farmers are too much worried about this possible reduction. We wonder if the experts know that a farmer would rather plant 90 acres of wheat, and be guaranteed \$2 a bushel, than he would plant 120 acres and have no guarantee of what he would get for his crop when he hauled it to the elevator.

Yes, the folks who worry about farmers losing their freedom should get out and talk to some of them. Then they might realize that most folks are more concerned about prices than they are afraid of losing liberties. It rather reminds us of the story of the fellow who didn't believe in conservation. However, he was a strong believer in grass hoppers. His land kept eroding, and he continued to fight grass-hoppers. The day he killed the last hopper the last inch of his topsoil washed away. Looking at his lost farm, he exclaimed, "Well, thank goodness I at least got rid of the hoppers."

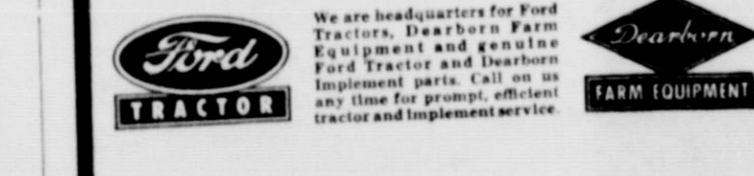

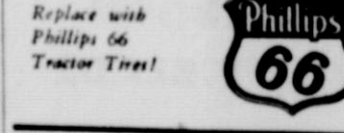
