You will be required to present

Following are the new regulations from the Texas Highway Department received recently by Sheriff J. D. Spray's office: When preparing the 1968 registration receipts, the vehicle identification number and title should be copied from the owner's certificate of title, not from his previous year's registration receipt. The vehicle identification numbers and license plate numbers will be the primary means of accessing the master computer file in the future and it is, therefore, most important that these numbers be shown correctly when the master records are created. You are requested not to issue 1968 license plates unless the applicant presents certificate of title and previous year's registration receipt as required in Sec (b) of the Certificate of Title Act V.P.C. 1436-1.
