Rabies Wolf Killed At Farm Door

John Lee, farmer, living about three miles northeast of Matador was attracted by his dog barking about 10:30 Saturday night. He investigated the disturbance to discover a coyote at his door and his dog under the porch. He dragged his dog out and the animal tried to enter the house. The coyote approached his door.

Lee shot the coyote but did not immediately kill the animal which circled the house and was finally killed in a water lot west of the home. Suspecting that the coyote might be affected with rabies, he severed the head and sent it to the state health department, under direction of Dr. A. C. Traweck, Sr., county health officer.

Late yesterday Dr. Traweck informed the Tribune that he had received a report from the Health Department at Austin and that examination of the coyote head revealed positive rabies infection.

The dog, in contact with the wolf, was severely bitten, Mr. Lee declared.

Management Changed In Food Firm

Pioneer Matador four retailing firm, Spot Cash Grocery and Locker Plant is under new management. Agreements were completed over the week-end whereby E. B. Brown of Lubbock and Houston, with over 25 years in grocery retailing experience, assumed management. Owner Vernon Doss announced yesterday that he had released complete management of the store to Mr. Brown. He said he would remain with the firm for a few weeks but made no announcement of future plans.

Brown's family is located in Lubbock but he will move to Matador as soon as he can rent or purchase a home. He has recently been employed by the wholesale grocery firm of Reed-Murdoch of Houston. He said no changes would be made in the store's present personnel. He assumed management of the store Monday and invoice of stock was completed Monday night. Plans are underway for extensive remodeling fixtures and rearranging of stock.

Garden-Fresh Vegetables Brown announced that special trucking facilities have already been engaged to bring garden-fresh vegetables and fruits from the Rio Grande Valley, to Matador tables. He said the private trucking service would provide a much wider selection of fruits and vegetables, improved quality and a substantial reduction in regular prices.

"We will offer only the finest of foods in all departments," Mr. Brown declared. We will enlarge the stock to include many items which are not usually offered in smaller stores. In event we are unable immediately to supply any item our customers we ask for only a few days to procure it. We will secure for our customers any item which is available on the market".

Brown declared that present policies of the store will not be changed with regard to operation on cash basis.

Sadler Says Our Future Is Deposited In Boys Of Today

"Boys are a bank in which we oldsters can deposit the future security of a nation," Representative Harley Sadler Tuesday night told his alert audience of men and boys in the capacity-packed Baptist church basement as principal speaker at the 11th Lions sponsored Father-Son banquet.

The Great West Texan, with his eloquence of sincerity, won the hearts of his listeners during the opening sentences of his speech. He held intense interest until the final word of his address.

Introduction was made by Boss Lion C. W. Giesecke, who asked for a moment of silent tribute to Lt. Paul Eubank. Only sound was the dripping of eaves in the tin rain pipes outside the church.

The accident resulted when Hall attempted to slow up as he approached Gladden. His car started sliding on the wet pavement and crashed into the rear of the pick-up in front of him, according to Sheriff Stotts who investigated the accident. Damage to the pick-up was estimated at about \$25, damage to the Ford about \$250.

Lt. Eubank, then a teacher in Matador schools, and Troop 60 Scoutmaster, 11 years ago spoke at the opening of the first Father-Son banquet. Many of the boys who were his students and served in the war which claimed his life, are now married and have sons of their own. Toastmaster for the first banquet was Jack Robinson Jr., now a lieutenant in the Army Air Forces, who served in the late war and recently re-joined that branch of service. Speaker of the first banquet was Dr. J. O. Ellsworth then of Texas Tech.

Paying tribute to his native West Texas, Representative Sadler declared: "Nowhere else on the earth is friendliness so evident as in West Texas. Love one another is one of the fulfillments of God's law. A West Texan's loyalty is never questioned."

He cited the danger of modern trends in education in which religion is treated lightly and pointed at the danger of modern evils which make possible one million habitual drunkards in the nation. He said that the responsibility of correct thinking and noble example is greater now than ever before.

Mrs. Wimberley, English instructor at Wayland College, and well-known in this section through her column, "Mrs. Poke

Bonnet", entertained her audience with a brief discourse on the subject of "Why have husbands—or fathers, (since they are usually the same person anyhow), numerating the various reasons "why" to the unexplained delight of her listeners.

"We need husbands (or fathers) to give us a name," Mrs. Wimberley declared. "We also need them for political reasons... how else would we know how to vote, if we didn't have them to advise us... they are good as companions in the home and also as escorts... and whether hidden behind the morning paper (or the evening paper), or engaged in listening to the radio—they are all yours for 50 seconds during station identification." Two-Hour Drive Is Planned

Motley county's annual Red Cross drive is scheduled to be over two hours after it starts, according to Roll Call chairman Ben Keltz. The drive will start Wednesday, March 3, at 10 a. m. and it will be over at noon. The county's quota is \$864.

"Nothing is to be gained by spending a day, week or ten days," Mr. Keltz declared. 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Full Voting Power Expected March 2

THREAT to snarl Matador city election to pave approximately 20 blocks through a \$40,000 bond election, March 2, was repelled through the work of a group of progressive citizens early this week.

Two blocks on south Main street from Baptist church to

turn west to grade school building, were affected by the "misunderstanding". Much of the blame for lack of understanding on engineers' plans goes to the Tribune because of "poor reporting." The Tribune assumed the curb and gutters would be placed along the same lines where present curbs (no part of the understanding) are located. Understanding of the council and engineers was different as were plans and estimates. Engineers' plans called for the street to be narrowed approximately 15 feet on either side (or lawns of property-owners extended 15 additional feet into the present street, with drainage slope to new curb).

The type of construction would have meant that the 100 foot Main street would have been permanently narrowed to 36 ft., or that later improvements to (See VOTERS IRON page 6)

Mayor Race Gets Wide Publicity

Candidacy of Tribune publisher Douglas Meador for the office of mayor of Matador, in which he offered to return to the city the \$600 annual salary, has received wide publicity throughout Texas.

The story was released Monday by Associated Press and was used by radio newscasters as far away as Dallas and San Antonio.

Lubbock and Ft. Worth newspapers printed the story on front pages.

Meador has received letters, telephone messages and personal congratulations from as far away as Fort Worth.

Radio listeners Tuesday night to a Tulsa, Oklahoma station heard comment on the announcement, with the suggestion that other small towns might find a partial solution to their municipal problems by following the Matador candidate's example.

Regarding the extensive publicity given his candidacy, Meador expressed his gratitude to friends in the newspaper fraternity. "However", he declared, "only the people of Matador can vote. I have been surprised at the number of people who have come to me (friends and neighbors) and congratulated me on my announcement. I appreciate their confidence. I was sincere in my original statement. I firmly believe "the best governed people have the least government" and I believe the mayor's salary can be used to a better advantage in paying for some of the many things this little town so seriously needs."

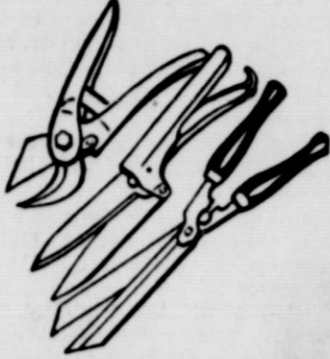
According to present arrangements, the play will be presented Friday evening, March 19.

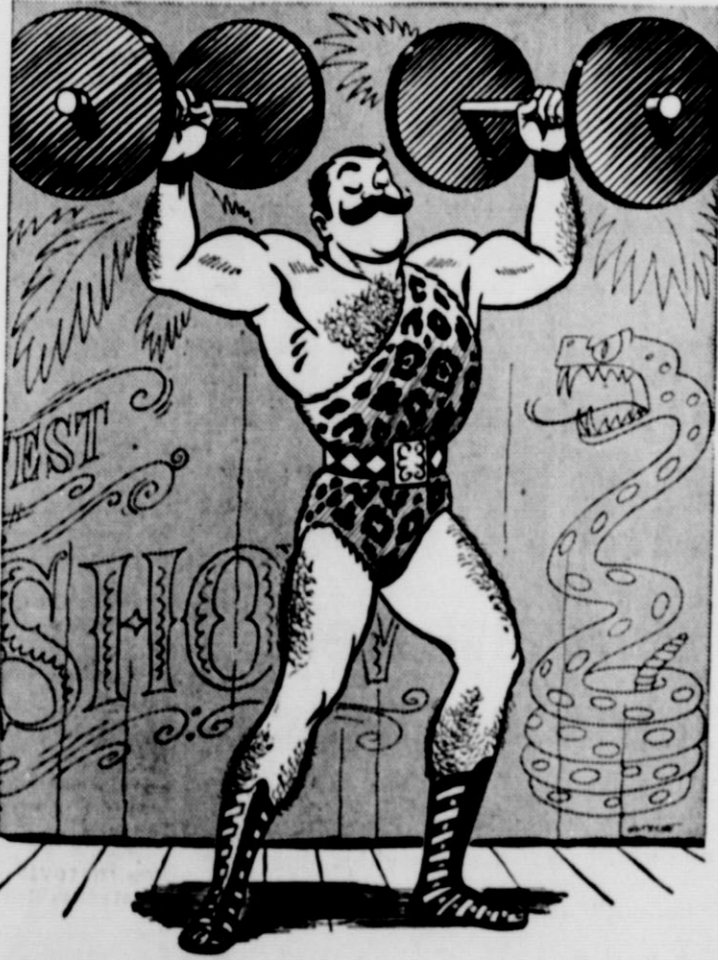

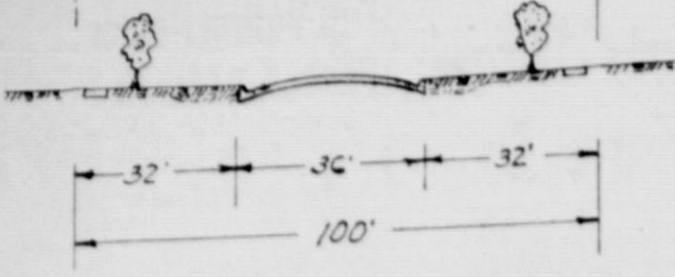

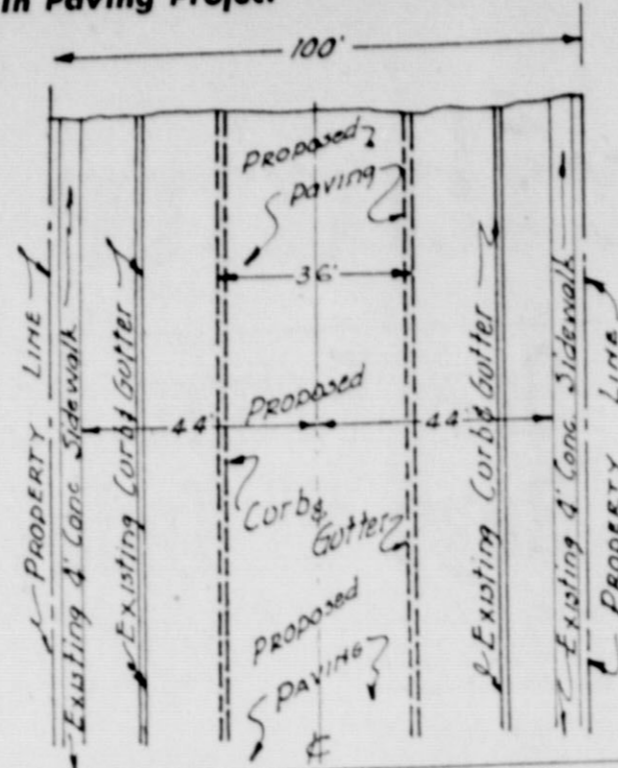
Engineer's Drawing Shows Original Proposal In Paving Project

Accompanying drawings were made by engineer Cecil Hawk of Lubbock especially for the Tribune. At the right is original proposal which would extend lawns from existing curb and gutter about 15 feet to paving on either side of the street.

Property owners are asked not to confuse this drawing with the completed paving. Paving will extend full width of street on south Main, additional paving to be paid by property owners in the two blocks. Lower drawing shows cross-cut of paving. About half of the 32 feet on either side of the paving is already absorbed in sidewalks, existing curbs and gutter. The election is Tuesday, March 2nd.

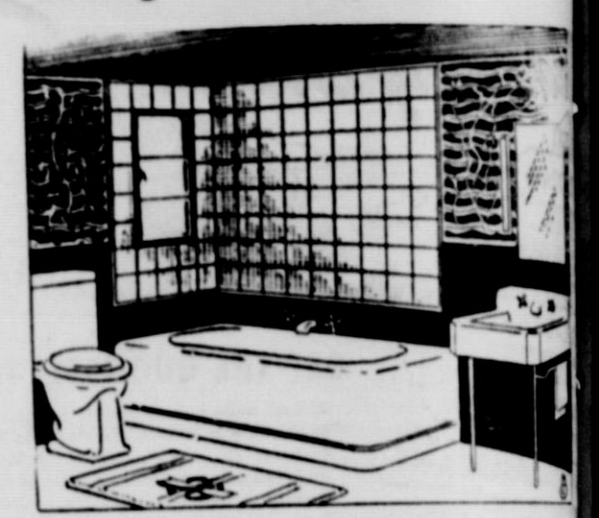

full width would have made necessary removing expensive curb and gutter to add additional paving. Many property-owners, formerly supporting the project, had voiced their opposition to this type of construction.

Now the snarl has been cleared away. An estimated 16 property owners in the two affected blocks will pay (out of their own pockets) for full width paving. The extra paving will be let in a "side contract" according to a spokesman for the group of property-owners. Also it is believed that the extra cost to these 16 property-owners will be in the neighborhood of \$1.25 to \$1.60 per front foot, it will not be more than \$2 per front foot.

(See drawing from engineers' plans elsewhere in Tribune but do not confuse with the full width paving, additional cost to be paid by property-owners in two blocks. The drawing is, had not change been made.)

The drawing is the type of construction which will be used elsewhere in the school and church circle, except the block between Highway 70 and Dundee street. (Methodist church) which will be full width. Proposed 36-foot paving and curb east and west from Main to school buildings will almost cover present (narrow) street, as will the north and south paving and curb from school to Highway 70.

Type of paving is as follows: Six inches of caliche base, covered with three coats of impregnated asphalt. The paving is exactly the same as state highway paving. Curbing and gutters will be same specifications as State Highway requires in construction of concrete bridges, except it will not be steel reinforced. Cement must test 3,000 pounds to square inch which requires about five sacks of cement to cubic yard of finished material. Paving north from Main street bridge to Spears gin will only be 24 feet in width and no curbing and guttering will be installed. All of street system affected by paving will be accurately graded to drain without peril to property in event of heavy rains.

Little opposition has been voiced against the paving project which will greatly enhance all Matador property and especially property "on the paving". It is believed that full voting strength of property tax-payers may be expected.
